Ladbroke Church News



You may think that with no vicar at present and the summer holidays here that nothing is happening at Ladbroke church but things couldn't be further from the truth. Our regular Sunday morning services continue, as does Pause and Pray on the first Monday of the month (see the Ladbroke Diary for details of times) and we are looking forward to two weddings during August. Homegroup is taking a short break over the summer but will resume in mid-September.

We have passed a milestone on our All Saints for All Generations project by submitting for Diocesan permission for the repairs, this is the equivalent of Listed Building consent. The activity team has pulled all its work of the last year or so together, added a big dose of reality, and come up with the proposed "new interpretations" and "community engagement" (AKA things to do) linked with our heritage. The project board in church by the organ explains what the proposals are. It is still quite ambitious as that's what The National Lottery Heritage Fund need, to even consider giving us the Stage 2 grant. The next step is to get feedback from the congregation and public to show we have your support, or what we need to change, so please give us your honest opinion.

Saturday 24th August is the date for our turn running the Tom Hauley Room coffee morning. We are a bit stretched for helpers as it is the Bank Holiday weekend so if you can spare an hour or two to help, please let Jackie know.

Heritage Open Days are only a few weeks away. Ladbroke church is just one of thousands of places across the country open and offering something special for this free event which this year is over 10 days, see **heritageopendays.org.uk** for all that is happening. Our dates and times are:

There will be guided tours and a special exhibition and activities for kids on the theme of maps. You can take part by offering to welcome visitors, helping with refreshments or just coming along. On the Saturday we will also be taking part in CHOTA - Churches and Chapels On The Air operating on the 7MHz amateur radio band using call sign GB4ASL (for All Saints Ladbroke).

While you have your diaries out, you may also like write in Sunday 6th October as our "bring and share" Harvest Lunch.

Finally, we would like to say thank you to Oscar who has been doing various tasks for us as a Duke of Edinburgh volunteer, including painting the boiler house door, and his hands, dark green.

As you can see there is lots happening and lots of opportunities to be involved in the Christian, heritage and community aspects of Ladbroke Church.

The meeting on 10th July covered quite a lot of ground, with a comprehensive report from our new SDC councillor Nigel Rock, so I've kept this summary to the key information that was news to me.

Attempted break in: a man attempted to break into a shed in Bridge Lane. When challenged he ran off, leaving the bike on which he had come and evidence on security camera footage.

SDC: Jeremy Wright our MP organised an HS2 meeting to which Ladbroke Councillors should have been invited but they weren't. Issues discussed included literal rather than appropriate responses to SDC/WCC requests eg intending to fell an oak tree at Kenilworth to get the required vision splay for traffic, rather than negotiating an alternative. Also there are concerns about the lack of an independent enforcement agency eg should HS2 have removed the hedge opposite the polo grounds during the nesting season?

The cash machine that was taken from the front of Fenny Compton Co-op used equipment stolen from a farm in the area which was subsequently dumped near Napton. There had been a black car going around farms the night before, it's another reminder to **REPORT ANYTHING SUSPICIOUS**.

Central government require land to be available for the housing for the next five years. Without this, developers could successfully challenge decisions not to grant planning permission. SDC have reserved sites, put forward by landowners and ranked red/orange/green by the planning policy officer, which can be upgraded to available sites. We do not have any reserved sites in Ladbroke, as proposed self-build sites are not included, however there is a reserved site in Fenny Compton (for 150 homes) and also one at Napton Brickworks (80). Our parish councillors, like our SDC and WCC councillors were concerned about the level of development locally and its impact on schools etc, Warwickshire needs 12 new schools but these have not even reached the planning permission stage. For the foreseeable future all Ladbroke students that wish to, would be able to go to Southam College.

WCC: has met most of its 2014-19 targets and is now on a new four year plan. The new Head of Highways thinks we are lucky to have roads in the top

25% across the country and verges cut three times a year. The flooding team has changed. Is the village planning anything special to celebrate VE day next year on the moved Bank Holiday (Friday May 8th rather than the previous Monday)? If you are looking for grants our WCC councillor's Community Grant scheme re-opens in September.

Planning: The parish council will make no representation regarding the equine facilities at (ie in the field opposite) The Croft.

The appeal to build two new houses behind the pub was dismissed on grounds that they would appear as free standing urban intrusions into a rural landscape, harming the appearance and character of the area.


Highways & Footpaths: the angle of the low energy head on the light in Bridge Lane has been checked and is correct. What to do about speeding through the village will be a separate agenda item at a future meeting, perhaps September's.

Village Hall: works on the new entrance and disabled toilet are expected to start at the end of August.

HS2: have suggested they and their contractors come to Ladbroke to meet the community and have proposed a list of things to discuss with us: development construction plans, local traffic plan, public rights of way, landscape design, noise measures and mitigation. The parish council will offer suitable dates in August for this meeting.

Self build site in Windmill Lane: the parish council do not wish to appear to be supporting this by getting involved with Landstrom's questionnaire to residents.

Next meeting: Wednesday 11th September, 7.45pm.



July 2019 Meeting Report

Having unearthed the parish by-laws and discovered that they prohibit parking on our village greens on pain of a £20 fine for each breach of the rules, Councillors are now to consider plans to convert the greens into wildflower meadows. Strange things crop up in the dog days of Summer!

On the plus side; there was a very full explanation by Cllr Gibb of the plans, after consultation with the parents, to plug a potential deficit of £200K in our Primary School's funding, by taking "in house" the running of the "Kids Club". It is hoped to make classrooms larger so that some classes can take 34 pupils, which will increase funding per head. They have £47K approved by the County Council with Section 106 money (from developers) for the PTA outdoor stage and a grant of £1K for CCTV, with more from a personal donor for IT equipment.

Interesting news too from Southam College which was reported to be at capacity. The knock-on effect of this is the area is deemed to be unable to take more housing. Leaks to the Village Hall roof have been stemmed and plans approved for the foyer which should also be in line for Section 106 grant aid.

Our County Councillor Bob Stevens reported that WCC still has no Finance Director and our farmers complain that HS2 diversions are hampering harvesting. Cllr Ekins quizzed him on these diversions and their impact on Deppers Bridge where HGVs were still driving over the railway bridge, because Station Road is closed. Cllr Gibbs claimed WCC was responsible for the diversion signage and re-enforcement of the ban on HGVs.

Our District Councillor Jacqui Harris promised to feed back these complaints but was also concerned about the lack of Police cover in our area (covering Harbury as well as Cherwell District and part of Northamptonshire). She wanted all Councillors to make representations to the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Chief Constable.

Planning

Councillors made no objection to felling of three trees at Saddlers, in the Chapel Street Conservation Area. They objected to the latest Dallas Burston plans for a new village with 2,000 sq metres of "retail space". Cllr Gibb said the scheme would damage local retail services and the proposed school would threaten our School's survival.

Clirs Rutherford and Allen had a meeting with Murphys about the work on the cutting SSSI east of the tunnel and its impact on the village. They were reassured that there would be no noise at night; the road would be swept and lorry movements restricted to 150 a day. A new access would be created to the north of the Business Park. "Defoliation" would commence after Christmas and they would be putting in a "Piling Platform" – whatever that is. They would not provide a footpath over the railway bridge as excavation could disturb asbestos.

Councillors rejected an offer for the District's Housing Enabler to organise a Housing Needs Survey. Cllr Allen claimed it would encourage more development. Chairman for the night, Keith Thompson, said it was against Parish Council policy and Cllr Summers who chaired the Neighbourhood Plan, said she never wanted one.

Properties

There was considerable discussion about the need for even more "dog waste bins". They cost the parish £350 each with a £110 fee for emptying them. The Treasurer reported that one was taken away as it was reported to be too heavy for the contractors to lift. Now Stratford DC want to charge the parish for supplying a replacement! District Councillor Harris will investigate.

Potentially the parish can have a grant from the County for resurfacing the cemetery path. The new tap there has finally been installed but needs to be inspected before it can be used. Quotes are awaited for repairs to the chapel roof. Cllr Summers reported that she had six volunteers to weed and tidy the graves.

Environment

Cllr Gibb reported on road closures and the consequent amendments to the bus timetable until 20th September. He said he wanted to charge WCC for storing the bus stop pole which was damaged, then moved by revellers, and was now stored on his premises for safety.

Other Business

There are still allotments available. The rent for the Parish Office was to be increased. There was no further news on the sports clubs' licences and the Councillors agreed to support any proposals, by any organisation, to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of VE Day.

Local Byelaws

Harbury has a number of byelaws that were passed in 1975. The full text is available on the parish council's website http://www.harbury-pc.gov.uk/pdfs/ pc-byelaws.pdf but this is a short summary:

The byelaws apply only to the village greens and the playing fields. Some byelaws are still very relevant:

- Dogs must be under 'proper control';
- No vehicles are allowed (without prior permission);
- No bill posting;
- No camping;
- Outside of approved games (eg a football match) no one can claim exclusive use of any part of the playing fields.
- Others are perhaps a symbol of times past: no cattle, sheep, goats or pigs allowed; no drying or bleaching of linen.

Anyone breaking any of the byelaws, and the most frequently broken one relates to driving and parking on the village greens, can be fined £20 (for each offence).

Then we welcomed our speaker, Erika Stevenson, who held us spellbound. Having qualified in cinematography and filmed dramas and documentaries for various TV companies, she was invited to film for a Dutch TV company in Afghanistan. Not too bad we thought, until she explained this was in 1989, the height of hostilities with Russia. The remit was not the war, but to penetrate a remote region in the northern mountains to film village life. The border crossings and roads were too dangerous to use, so they travelled disguised and in secret on foot over the passes of the Hindu Kush, four times the height of Ben Nevis and in the dark.

They suffered from oxygen shortage, fleas, upset tummies; were separated from each other and their equipment at times, slept on floors with their Afghan guides, were shot at while answering the call of nature and were cut off from the outside world for six months.

Even their eventual withdrawal was full of danger, as early snow sent them back on a more exposed route, risking bandits, avalanches and bombing. All this told in such a calm and factual way that it was hard to relate it to the lady standing there; we could only admire her for her fortitude and be grateful that she returned to tell such a vivid tale.

We hope all members enjoy the summer break but that we will meet at some of the events.

Folk Club

The July session of the Folk Club (the 416th) was busier than ever. I decided on a theme of 'This Land is Your Land' and to finish the evening with a finale featuring all performers singing Woody Guthrie's famous song. That meant that I had to fit all singers and musicians into two halves, dispensing with the traditional third. With no fewer than 19 acts to accommodate, it was a nightmare of organisation and we were clearly destined for a late finish.

I started with James Keelaghan's 'River Run' and then handed over to Bob Clucas, now a Harbury regular, who sang a song about a 'mermaiden' followed by the Bagpuss Miller's Song! Don showed off his guitar skills with a medley of Morris tunes and then the accompaniment for a ragtime song. In complete contrast, Janny and Maureen sang 'Let the Cold Winds Blow' in unaccompanied harmony and were then joined by Ian and Sue for 'I'll Fly Away' featuring Sue's flatfooting in the instrumental breaks. Our next singer, Gerda, now living in Cumbria, was making a rare appearance at Harbury although she was a regular during the very early years of the Folk Club. It was a pleasure to hear her thoughtful songs – 'Hard times Ain't Gonna Rule my Mind' and Kate McGarrigle's 'Mendocino'. Poacher's Pocket, now a three-piece band, were up next with 'Blue Cockade' and Campbell's own song, 'Moving On'. Along with hearty chorus singing from the audience, Des was on good form with 'Shallow Brown' and his own song, 'Rolling Back the Welfare State', surely destined to become a Folk Club standard. Pete Grassby gave us a song of the Cotswolds and then 'The Friend I Want to Travel With is You'. Closing a longer-than-usual first half, the Somerville Gentlemen appeared for the first time as a four-piece with two songs led by Ted – 'Wanton Seed' and 'Rout of the Blues'.

The Folk Club Choir opened the second half with 'Bright Morning Star', formerly an Appalachian hymn, and 'Queen of Waters' about life on Britain's inland waterways. I followed with 'Come Walk with Me', a song which urges people to notice the natural beauty of their surroundings. Rik had two contrasting songs - the traditional 'Brigg Fair' then Billy Joel's 'New York State of Mind', skilfully accompanied on concertina. Sue and Ted sang a favourite, 'Come by the Hills', and then Ted dipped into Flanders & Swann's repertoire and came out with the unusual 'The Society of Bedstead Men'. Robin, on his own this month, sang 'Striking for Another Land' and Connie Dover's 'I am Going to the West'. His introduction to the first song worried Pete and Liz because it sounded as though he was about to sing a song they had planned. However, all was well and they were able to sing Eric Bogle's 'Leaving the Land' without fear of duplication and they followed it with the well-known 'Bread and Fishes', as a tribute to songwriter Alan Bell who died earlier this year. Des was joined by Barbara and Gareth, as the a cappella trio 'Thrup'nny Bits', singing about 'Peterloo Man' and 'Manchester Yeomanry Valour'. By now, it was approaching 11pm as I asked Peter Scott to take the stage with the strangely satisfying story of 'Arthur McBride' followed by Tom Paxton's tale of another US president, 'Lyndon Johnson told the Nation'. Ian and Sue, the Harvesters, sang 'Railroad Bill' and 'Make Me a Pallet on Your Floor' by which time we were wondering if we would all need pallets to sleep on in the Club. The ever-patient Keith Donnelly sang a ditty about a kangaroo and a crab then finished with the 'Raggle Taggle New Age Travellers-O'. Finally, it was time for the finale, when at least 25 singers and musicians took to the stage for a rousing version of 'This Land is Your Land'.

Not only did we have a huge cast of performers but the audience was also present in large numbers too. Fortunately, the concert room in the Village Club provides comfortable seating for all when we have these popular nights. The raffle raised an excellent £122 for Cancer Research UK. The next Folk Club on 1st August will be hosted by Doug and Janny who have chosen the theme 'Favourites and Favours'.

It's a gas, man

Hydrogen probably doesn't occupy your thoughts greatly. But this is to be the basis for the coming, fast maturing new technology revolution. You can make hydrogen with electricity and water. When the hydrogen is recombined with oxygen it creates energy and ...water.

It is remarkable how rapidly the technology is developing. Philip Mayer, Ted Dowdeswell and I attended an event on hydrogen and fuel cells recently and were impressed with how much has changed in a few years. What was a concept a few years ago is now a real set of products with a definite future. Hydrogen is already an important element in the gas mix that fuels our boilers and cookers. Soon it and other common gases such as ammonia will become an important part of powering the nation. It is not unlikely that within 10 years there will be families in Harbury driving hydrogen fuel cell powered cars. 'Petrol' stations will have to be redefined perhaps as 'energy' stations.

Hydrogen can be extracted using renewable energy but at present we have to use gas to create any new energy needed to make hydrogen. The more local and national renewable energy generation we install, therefore, the better. Some of the very few hydrogen refuelling stations that presently exist have solar panels on the canopy roof so that electrolysis can happen on site: other options will use conventional generators or large gas canisters transported on lorries. There are already mobile refuelling vehicles that can park up to refuel the new cars.

Capping the hub

HEI put forward the idea of creating a low carbon hub or network for Warwickshire in March. Already we are two events further on in the process of stimulating new local low carbon and environmental activity with three more communities queuing up to be part of this. The next one will be in Henley-in-Arden, probably in October, with another planned in Kineton in spring next year and a third offer from Church Lawford. The last one at Napton happened just after the copy deadline so I wasn't able to tell you that it was a great success. The organising group managed to sustain the energy in the room despite the fierce heat (global warming manifesting). We now have some clear themes, some momentum and excitement and a new low carbon group in Napton. It isn't at all too late to be part of this initiative if you would like to be part of it. After the next one we will probably create a steering group and some structure to the network. All of this has been greatly helped by the support of Abigail Campbell of the RSA, who, as a result of this initiative, has started her own low carbon group in Braunston.

Now wouldn't you call that a positive result?

Being LED

Waiting is an unavoidable part of fund raising. Many weeks ago I submitted a bid to Naturesave Trust, a green insurance company trust fund, on behalf of Harbury Pre-School. The bid is for the installation of LED lighting. This is just one part of the efficiency improvements they hope to make to the old part of their damp and crumbling quarters. We are still waiting to hear but it shouldn't be long now. It's a small contribution to their needs but should help to cut running costs a bit.

Meanwhile the LED lighting planned for the church has become subsumed into one of Philip Mayer's eco mega-projects. We hope to work with Philip on the plans, which should, if successful, bring the church right up the rankings on Eco-Church, well beyond our current Bronze Award. It won't be done by next month. You may have to wait for further news.

Facebook users (not quite everyone in Harbury uses Facebook, it seems) will have seen that Harbury e-Wheels is going through a bit of a tricky time at the moment. For almost four years now we have the benefit of cars from E-Car Club, provided at a rate we could manage to fund with your help. This is going to change. Our combined private and e-Wheels use apparently is not meeting their full costs. In addition they are being merged with another company called Ubeeqo UK. That may have caused them to review all their longer term contracts. Maybe they hadn't noticed up to now.

We have yet to hear from E-Car what they propose for the future but in the meantime we are investigating other options. We may be able to run it ourselves with some fairly major changes or we may go with another provider. We are, however, determined to continue our service. It has become too important to our passengers to fail. We are committed to doing everything we can to keep supporting the local community.

Whatever the outcome of the changes, we are likely to need to raise more money. Our core funding comes from personal regular monthly donations. Without those we would struggle to finance this project, now well recognised across the county and admired elsewhere. If you are one of our donors I would humbly ask you to consider whether you can increase the monthly amount - I have.

We have also had some great fund raising ideas. Margaret Commons, as you will see, has generously offered to organise a garden walkabout next summer. We are very keen to support that. In addition, as Facebook readers will have seen, James Taylor has put forward the popular idea of a food festival with the possibility of supporting us. We have plenty of other ideas.

Our next planned event is the Barn Dance on 12th October - please note it in your diaries.

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Look out for our other fundraising events. Don't worry, we will make sure that you know they are coming up.


Reg Update


We fed them sugar water and fruit and by


Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

There is a little confusion about the difference between a garden centre and a nursery. A couple of generations ago it was nearly all nurseries where plants were grown and sold on site (not bought in from wholesalers, often from abroad). A garden centre usually buys everything in from elsewhere and some of their merchandise has little to do with plants and gardening. Scented candle anyone? This does cause us some problems for two main reasons. The word nursery is now most often associated with a place for young children to go. (No, we don't have a place for Chantelle or Jack!) And we are open to the general public not just to people in the trade. Now we're all clear on that, here are some reminders for the month.

If you are going away please make sure you have someone who can water all potted plants and to pick any veg which might be ready......keep picking sweet peas otherwise they will form seeds and stop flowering......feed

tomatoes.....dwarf French beans and peas should be picked before they get too big......keep dead-heading roses and perennials to encourage more flowers......If the garden is looking a bit dreary try adding in some last summer flowering plants such as asters and salvias......support gardens which are open for charity (you can get lots of ideas and often tea and cake too).


Warwickshire's most wooded area is in the centre of the county. Here, underlying sands and gravels from ancient river beds give rise to an acidic soil ill-suited to arable farming in a modern sense. Much sand and gravel extraction has occurred and still takes place but sympathetic management now restores the land and provides plentiful wildlife habitats. The Princethorpe complex includes the woods of Ryton, Wappenbury and Old Nun. Here it is possible to get immersed in a woodland world with mature trees, bracken, and a rich understorey of plants and shrubs. I spent many hours wandering along the sunlit rides when I visited on Saturday 20th July. My chief reason to explore the area was to find the White Admiral butterfly. Once upon a time it could be found nearer home in Ufton Woods but I have not found it there for several years, probably due to woodland clearance especially of the extensive brambles which grew by the central crossroads of rides. Slightly smaller than the Red Admiral, the wings of the White Admiral are crossed by white bands instead of red. It's the glint of white on a dark background that attracts attention to the insect as it flits through sunlit glades in search of a mate or, in the case of the female, to lay an egg on the upper side of a honeysuckle leaf.

As I walked I saw plenty of butterflies - Meadow Brown, Ringlet, Peacock, Large Skipper, Gatekeeper, Comma, and Speckled Wood. I was to see fifteen species in all including the spectacular Silver-Washed Fritillary and, at first, just a tantalising glimpse of a White Admiral. Later, in the company of a fellow enthusiast I had met whilst having a picnic lunch, I had greater success. Ivor and I got a good view of a White Admiral and with the aid of my friend's camera with its telephoto lens we studied a White-Letter Hairstreak basking on an Elm tree leaf high in the canopy. Yes, an Elm tree, as there are a group of Wytch Elms at Ryton which appear to be immune to Dutch Elm disease and are spreading, as Elm does, by suckering. Other places to see a mature Elm are on the side of the B4439 near Rowington and beside the A429 near Charlecote. The days when mature Elms lined Warwickshire's lanes have gone in my lifetime but they do seem to be making a comeback so perhaps it will be different for our grandchildren.

One of the special plants to be found in Ryton Wood is the broad-leaved Helleborine. It's an orchid in the genus Epipactis and the most widespread of the Helleborines, a plant of deciduous woodland, most commonly found along paths and rides. It is normally around 25-80 centimetres in height with as many as sixty flowers on a stem. Colours vary from pale pink to purple. I found a small group on the edge of the broad ride leading from the car park. It reminded me of why our British wild orchids are so full of meaning for me. As a schoolboy, I roamed the chalky hills of Kent and Surrey searching for these special flowers. A Biology teacher had taken us to Box Hill, a mecca for botanists. He showed us how to find various species, including the Man orchid. In the precipitous Beech hangers where little grows after Spring because of the dense shade, we found the saprophytic Bird's Nest orchid and the White Helleborine. The latter has green leaves but also relies for some of its nutrition on an association with fungi in keeping with many orchid species. Everyone remembers a good teacher!

The U3A Natural History Group visited a hidden gem on 15th July, namely Otmoor in Oxfordshire. This is wetland where the small River Ray, a tributary of the Cherwell which it joins near Islip, spreads into a series of braided channels and pools. The RSPB Reserve is approached from the surrounding rim of low hills by a minor road from the village of Beckley, north of Oxford. Otmoor is some six kilometres across and divided neatly in half by a Roman road from Ilchester (Bicester) to Dorchester-on-Thames. Here it is a bridleway. The eastern half is a MOD firing range and this may explain why nature has been allowed to thrive. Despite water levels being low, we saw plenty of bird life including Heron, Lapwing, Red Kite, Cormorant and a glimpse of a Snipe perfectly camouflaged in the marshy vegetation. This was courtesy of an ornithologist with a powerful scope. Flowers identified included Sneezewort, Perforate St John's Wort, Ribbed Melilot, Perennial Sow Thistle, and Purple Loosestrife. It would pay to visit regularly to get a true feel for the place.

Now it's on to the blackberry season.

HS2 and Archaeology in Warwickshire

HS2 Key sites

There are a number of archaeological sites that we will be exploring across the county. These include:

- · a prehistoric and Romano-British settlement in Offchurch
- \cdot the medieval and Tudor Coleshill Hall
- \cdot the remains of a medieval village in Milburn
- · the Roman Fosse Way

Near Offchurch, archaeologists are hoping to discover more about a late prehistoric and Romano-British settlement that has been identified during initial surveys. A geophysical survey of the site has revealed what appears to be evidence of a sizeable settlement with houses and roads visible. This site will allow archaeologists to learn more about the character and nature of a rural settlement in the late prehistoric and Romano-British periods and provides a window on rural life in Warwickshire over 1500 years ago.



Progress so far

At the far south of the West Midlands area, near Southam and Long Itchington, we have discovered evidence of an early agricultural settlement dating to the Iron Age (approx. 600BC to 44AD). Such small settlements consisted of circular dwellings (Round Houses) with a series of enclosure ditches to pen in the animals and also to provide some protection to the settlement. Several of these small prehistoric farmsteads have been discovered in Warwickshire by HS2's archaeologists.

Further north towards the River Leam, near the village of Offchurch, the evaluation has uncovered evidence of a large Romano-British settlement (approx. 44AD to 410AD) overlooking the meandering river to the south and west, and surrounded by a large single circular ditch. Just to the north of this large Roman settlement there appears to be the remains of a wider Iron Age agricultural hinterland consisting of field boundaries, enclosures and track ways. This exciting discovery is located fairly close to the line of the Roman road, the Fosse Way, which traverses west to east, from Cirencester to Leicester, both major Roman towns.

Close to the medieval town of Kenilworth our archaeological evaluations have uncovered evidence of Anglo-Saxon occupation, the features revealed within the trenches have given a glimpse of early medieval settlement activity within this part of the West Midlands. Evidence of such obvious Anglo-Saxon activity is rare, and therefore HS2 will continue to investigate this site in greater detail over the coming months. Further north surrounding the gravel terraces of the River Blythe traces of prehistoric activity can be ascertained through the pits, ditches and enclosures of early human endeavour in shaping the wider landscape, creating field systems and boundaries - thus working the land for food and shelter.


