


As the man approached, he could see that there were hundreds of starfish stranded on the sand as the result of the natural action of the tide.

Our year was rounded off nicely at the December meeting with an excellent great talk and pictures from local wildlife photographer, George Blake. George studied marine biology and since his early experiences on field trips has been a great believer in working with a simple to use compact or bridge camera for wildlife photos. Most of us had to agree when we saw his stunning shots of spinning dolphins and whales close up and heard that the photographers with bigger and more complicated cameras were still sorting out their focus and light settings when their subject was gone. Patience, knowing your area and its wildlife well, and getting up before everyone else seemed to be prerequisites too and again we were hearing from an expert - George showed us shots of a peregrine falcon taken literally on the South West Coastal Path very early in the morning, an elusive beaver from a small group introduced to a marsh in South East England and a wide variety of species on a private estate where he now works, land which is becoming more and more wildlife rich as nearby areas are built upon and the animals relocate. George goes to many local craft fairs, if you do too you'll get a chance to see and buy some of his photos and greeting cards.

Ladbroke Photography Club meets on the first Tuesday of the month, new members and visitors are welcome. Our next meeting on 5th February starts with the AGM, followed by a workshop on "Painting by Light" so bring your camera and tripod if you have one. Ladbroke Village Hall & Millennium Green AGMs

Both AGMs were held on 26th November, consistent with them being separate charities but working extremely closely together. They have common trustees and a single group, Ladbroke Matters, responsible for maintenance, fund raising etc. Beverley Bradley and Debs Brown were welcomed to the Ladbroke Matters team which consists of the trustees (see end of article) and Carol Lane, David Wright, Helen Morten, Margie Bosworth, Martin Neal, Nicky Lewis and Simon West.

Over the last year things had been relatively quiet on the Millennium Green: regular maintenance has been done by a contractor, the small gate repaired by Tim Norgate, items identified in the inspection fixed, the wildflower area cut in the summer and other tidy-ups carried out by volunteers. The Village Hall had been used regularly for table tennis and by the Photography Club, WI, Parish Council and a number of fund raising events including film nights (with great food), a quiz night, the play *Family Spirit* and a *Last Night of the Proms* organised by Ladbroke Matters. There have been a few private parties but less than in previous years and more are welcome. The entrance lobby has been repanelled and the WI were thanked for keeping the flower tubs looking attractive and for the tapestry of local views.

The accounts for both charities were healthy - the Village Hall has rental income and also the profit from The Millennium Draw. The Green has no regular sources of income except a small amount from Easy Fundraising, more people signing up for these automatic donations from on-line purchases would be good. Money raised from Ladbroke Matters events goes to each charity as the need arises and they are thankful for donations - last year (ie to end Sept 2018) the Village Hall received grants from the Alibone Trust towards the new stage lights and from the organisers of the bonfire for general funds.

Looking to the future the Village Hall has been awarded a grant from the HS2 community fund towards a disabled entrance and toilet, the planning application for this has been submitted and quotes requested. Timing of the work will depend on the builder's availability but disruption will be minimised by constructing it "off-line" and then breaking through to the existing building.

The meeting closed with the election of the trustees for both charities: re-election of Kip Warr, Graham Lewis, Debra Neal and Caryl Thompson and the election of Alan Lord.

As there was no meeting in December to report on, we are taking the opportunity to re-publish a report on the Council meeting held in October 1976. 42 years on some things never change!!

Parish Council Meeting held on 28th October 1976

Present: Cllrs. Wright, Drinkwater, Gurden, Atkins, Ellis, Davies, Wilkins and Mrs. Watts. **Apologies:** Cllrs. Hancock and Catterall and PC Percival. **Onlookers:** District Cllrs. Buckle and Buckle, Mick Brant and Linda Ridgley.

The atmosphere is Dickensian, the Chairman with his regalia, the room icy, a slowly creeping fog ascending from cigars, as the Council convenes to discuss Parish business and the Queen's Silver Jubilee Celebrations.

Public Meeting about Jubilee Celebrations - Mrs Ridgley was thanked for taking the minutes. Mr Wright then summarised what was discussed at the meeting. After lengthy discussion it was resolved that various sub-committees investigate the points raised, and also that (a) attempts be made to acquire

tree bunting, (b) the Carnival Committee would organise events for the week prior to the Jubilee, and (c) Harbury Society would co-ordinate fund-raising for tree planting, a specifically approved way of commemoration of the Jubilee.

Unclassified items - Mrs Sperling is to be invited to the next meeting to explain the planned financial cuts to the Meals on Wheels Service. Mrs Buckle had no news of the Southam Shopping Bus, but asked what support there would be for one to Stratford, and would the PC be prepared to subsidise OAP bus fares? This will be discussed at the next meeting.

Correspondence - It was agreed that the PC seek legal help for the benefit of the Village Hall Trustees.

The County Council, in replying to the PC's letter on overcrowding in the Village School, said that only the top class had more than 35 pupils (it has 40). However, the Chairman pointed out that the accommodation for the top class was severely inadequate. A letter from the Headmaster welcomed the PC's interest but regretted that he had not been approached first. He invited Councillors to visit the school and it was agreed to arrange this.

Highways - One-Way System. It was pointed out that, if the system were completed (Crown St and Church St One-Way) the cost, which might fall on the PC, would be high. The District Surveyor is to be asked to repair and tidy up battered road signs in the village and to drain the lake in Penelope Close. Cllr Davies reported that parking at the western end of Church Street was causing a traffic hazard. Binswood End Green has again been damaged by a vehicle parked on it.

Lighting - The Clerk reported that the lamppost (but not the light) had been replaced in Margaret Close and repositioned to the rear of the footpath.

Planning - Westbury House. The County Engineer reported there will be a pay-by in front of this development but that it will not link with the existing one because of difficulties over the purchase of the land.

Playing Fields - It was agreed that an occasional fair was an amenity for the young people, but there was concern lest damage be done to the field. The letting of the field for fairs will be discussed with the Playing Fields Advisory Committee.

Finance - Consternation when it was discovered that the precept should have been submitted in December. 20% will be allowed for inflation.

Items for the next Agenda - The Chairman wanted to discuss the formation of a Junior Parish Council to advise on the provision of facilities for the young.

On 7th December members dedicated the bench which has been placed on the Old New Inn Green in Farm Street to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Harbury WI.





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Harbury Heritage Group is pleased to introduce a new feature through the Harbury and Ladbroke News, 'Then and Now'. We will be showing you a photograph from around the village, part of the Heritage Collection, together with an up to date photograph of the scene as it appears today. We will add some information about the scene too.

Below is a photograph of Chapel Street from about 1910.



Chapel Street in the centre of the village, has many old stone built properties some of which date back to the 1600s e.g. 'Saddlers'. Next door, 'Bridles' was sold to a blacksmith in 1890 for £5 and has since been a wool shop and a butchers. In the 1970's these two houses formed part of Hunts Stores, selling a wide range of foods from ham to yeast and specialist delicatessen goods. Does anyone have a photograph of Hunts Stores to add to our collection? There were several shops in Chapel Street at one time. Also the 'Gamecock' public house originally called 'The New Inn'. The Fox Inn was demolished in the early 1970's and where Fox Close is now was a yard used to manufacture barges. It was a delicate exercise to transport them from there once they were made. Thornicroft's Bakery was another of Chapel Street's popular stores. Cyril (Bonzo) Bloxham ran a greengrocer's with a betting shop above and Stan Smith had a small workshop repairing shoes.

More recently the hairdressers (Mrs Ellis), became a domestic dwelling and the new hairdressers, at one time Lindop's Store, opened at the opposite end of the street. There was of course 'Muglestons Country Fayre' run by Paul and Mary. We await the fate of their shop. Next door, once the Wesleyan Chapel, is now a fine residence. On the corner, at the Park Lane end of the street was the Forge, now Forge Cottage. At the High Street / Mill Street end a row of old cottages, demolished in the 1960's, as part of Southam Rural District Council's policy to demolish buildings unfit for human habitation were demolished and the Village store (Foodmart) was built.

Chapel Street, in terms of the actual buildings, has not changed greatly over the past 100 years.

A building or feature which has special architectural and historic interest.

The older a building is, the more likely it is to be listed. All buildings built before 1700 which survive in anything like their original condition are listed, as are most of those built between 1700 and 1840. Usually a building has to be over 30 years old to be eligible for listing.

Powerful prayer

CHA Our church of All Saints is an ancient building that has been a sanctuary and place of worship and inspiration to thousands over centuries. It has initiated and runs many

activities but you might not think of it as having much of an environmental context. You would be very wrong. For some years now a Christian charity called A Rocha has run a scheme called Eco Church. The Diocese of Coventry has signed up to this and so have All Saints and its committee. Churches that are signed up aspire to attain levels of Bronze, Silver and Gold based on over 90 survey questions within five categories: Buildings, Land, Worship and Teaching, Community and Global, and Lifestyle. The levels are not easy to attain but, working with HEI, All Saints, Harbury is now an accredited Bronze level church and proud of it. That won't be the end of of our aspirations! We have silver in our sights.

Young(-er) Drivers and the Car Club

Just recently one or two families have joined their student children to the car club. This is one of the outcomes that we had originally thought might happen. It has taken a few years. It turns out that membership and hourly use is cheaper than insuring the young on your policy (or any other policy). Anyone 19 years or older with a year's minimum driving experience can join. Powering Up the School

Chris Gibb and I, with the approval of the school governors, are steadily working towards our goal of getting solar panels on to the school. Working with iNECO Energy, a specialist company with a history of helping schools to install modern low carbon energy solutions, we are (fairly) confident of delivering this project early in 2019, ideally before 31st March when all subsidies and generation fees for solar are brought to an end by government. The project will still be viable after that, however, especially with energy costs rising rapidly, making the savings greater by the year. If you haven't yourself noticed the cost of energy racing up it is because price rises are only just kicking in.

Harbury Primary School

Dear Parents, Families and the wider Harbury community,

I hope you have had a good Christmas, and I wish you a happy, healthy and successful 2019. I have recently taken over as chair of the school governors and write to introduce myself and the governing body for the year ahead. I would like to thank my predecessor, Alan Bennett, for his many years of hard work as a governor and chair. Why am I chair of governors? I have a lifetime of experience in railway industry operations and leadership, with board and executive roles for the last twenty years. I am now a Non-Executive Director on the board of Network Rail and chair their Safety & Environment Committee and Property Board. I have been a Harbury School parent for nine years, and governor for three years. My two children are now in further education, having flourished at the school. I want to help the next generation of Harbury families to make the most of the village's most precious asset - our community school - and I know the governors and staff of the school share this passion.

Firstly, a quick recap on what school governors do, without boring you with all the laws, rules, policies and obligations, which you can read elsewhere if you have a mind to. The governing body's primary responsibility is the safety of the children and staff at the school, which includes safeguarding, health and safety, anti-bullying measures (including online) and welfare, and we adopt and manage school policies on all these subjects. The head teacher, who is a member of the governing body, is accountable to us for carrying out these policies supported by the staff. After safety, our next priority is overseeing the education and special needs of the children, and the head teacher presents a plan for this at every meeting, supported by data to show progress, and we discuss this in detail. The governing body oversees the school's finances, recruitment of staff, management of buildings and facilities and relationships with stakeholders such as our Parent & Teacher Association, County Council, Church of England and the community. The data presented to the governors is anonymous - only the necessary professional teaching staff know the educational progress, needs and circumstances of individual children by name. Confidentiality and privacy are important principles of all governing bodies.

The governing body currently consists of nine governors, with some elected by parents and staff, and some appointed by the governing body. Rev Craig Groocock and Deputy Chair, Mary Thompson are appointed by the Church of England, as we are a "Voluntary Controlled" Church of England School. Others are completely independent of the school and community, and all bring particular interests, skills and experience (such as past and present teaching) to the governing body. The governing body elects the chair, and the chair leads the meetings and work of the governing body. Like the board of a company, we do not run the school on a day to day basis; that is the responsibility of the head teacher and her senior management team of teachers - the executive. Working closely with the head teacher we set the strategy and policies, building on objectives set by central government, and make sure they are carried out. We act as an appeal body in the event that parents and staff feel their issues are not being addressed by the executive. Governors are not paid and commit time during the day and in the evenings to carry out their roles, attend training courses and events, such as parents' evenings. We have "diagnostic days" in school, when we spend time in school reviewing the work of the school and engaging with children and staff. All governors are fully DBS checked before they can take up their roles. We are supported in our work by education and governance professionals from Warwickshire County Council. I am grateful for the time and effort given by all the governors on behalf of our community.


Looking forward to 2019 the governing body has a number of challenges to address:

- Following our "good" OFSTED inspection last year, we will encourage the teaching staff to sustain and improve learning outcomes for all children.
- We will support the head teacher in the recruitment, development and welfare of teaching and support staff. Managing workload is a constant challenge for primary school teachers across the country, and Harbury is no exception to this.
- We will watch closely developments from central government on school funding and academy trusts; and understand what this means for Harbury.
- We have money to spend on building projects (called section 106 money, and paid by the developers of the new housing in the village), and we want to see that spent wisely and quickly, so that the school is better equipped to handle full classes in future.
- We will work with the Harbury Energy Initiative to fit solar panels to the school, to support the environment and school finances.
- We will support our PTA in their fundraising for other projects, such as the "outdoor classroom" and new infants' playground equipment.
- We will work closely with parents and the wider community to give each and every child the safe and comprehensive education they need to confidently prosper as they prepare for, arrive at and move through our school and on to secondary education. Parental support in this is key. In 2018 95% of parents attended parents' evenings, and in 2019 we hope to develop other ways for parents to support their individual children's educational needs.

2019 will be a busy year.

Looking back on 2018, the Library has undergone a major transformation since its refurbishment in February, and the increase in visitor numbers has shown that the change has been appreciated. In fact, despite being closed for a fortnight when the work took place, we have recorded our highest annual number of visitors since opening as a community library in 2012. What's new for the New Year at Bridge Nursery?

Lots of new planting in the garden. I've even removed a large area of couch grass which had grown in amongst other plants and am feeling very pleased to have done it.

New plants: It looks like there's a trend for growing salvias so I ordered five new varieties. I've already taken cuttings of some of them so should have lots for sale by April. There are some wonderful colours, a very rich velvety purple and a deep blue as well and a pretty pink.

New compost bins: We have six, yes, six! But they were rotting and falling to bits so himself has demolished three and replaced them and will soon be doing the others. They do look very smart.

A new part time helper: There is a scheme which places trainee gardeners with experienced people and I'm hoping to take part this year. I will report back on this exciting change.

Nature Notes



Just before the storm which arrived on Saturday 15th December, I paid a visit to Harbury Spoilbank. Many will know this small but intriguing Warwickshire Wildlife Trust Nature Reserve. Situated on both sides of the old Great Western Railway line just west of the light engineering works known as International Fasteners Ltd which was built on the site of the Harbury and Southam Road Station. The cutting through Harbury was dug by hand in the 1840s over several years. It was a stupendous feat of engineering. Now, the spoil has consolidated and the resulting limestone grassland, with its many ant-hills, is a haven for wild flowers many of which have been lost in large areas of the county. Autumn Gentian has just finished flowering. Visit in spring to see Violets, Cowslips, and Wild Strawberry, while in summer Common Spotted Orchid, Twayblade, Carline, Dwarf and woolly Thistles take centre stage. Butterflies such as Grizzled and Dingy Skipper, Green Hairstreak, Holly Blue, Brimstone and Orange Tip can be seen in spring while in summer the impressive Marbled White and Silver-washed Fritillary may be sighted. Maintaining the area in its species rich state requires a good deal of scrub bashing.

On my visit, the dead heads of Carline thistle were prominent. Its larger 'cousin' the Chardon Soleil, of Southern Europe, is often nailed to a door for good luck in the way we use a horseshoe.

The day after the storm the streets were washed clean and dawn was cold, clear and still. Further north, freezing rain gave rise to treacherous conditions but we were spared. Blackbirds were numerous and vocal. Walking up Mill Street, I spied a male with partially white plumage. A true albino would have pink eyes. This halfway house, so to speak, is known as leucism.

Holly, (Ilex aquifolium) is our commonest native evergreen and can occur in dense clumps particularly where leaf litter allows some down curving, whippy branches to take root. Typically leaves close to the ground are very prickly while those nearer the top are almost spineless. They have evolved in this way to protect them from browsing animals. The leaves are very nutritious so much so that farmers, in years past, lopped off higher branches as winter fodder. Another use for Holly is for trees to act as a marker at a gateway or stile, valuable in bad weather. Similarly ploughing can be aided by a holly acting as a marker for the ploughman.

In the Heritage Room in Southam a new exhibition drew my attention. The archive photographs used in the 2019 calendar are on show and each has a commentary. Bernard Cadogan showed me round. There is a picture of the Holy Well in winter. Apparently the first document referring to the Well is in 'Warwickshire Feet of Fines' dated 1206. I was intrigued by this and subsequently discovered that in the late 12th century a procedure evolved for ending legal action by agreement between the parties. The agreement was known as a final concord (or fine). Originally this was a means of resolving

genuine disputes but by the middle of the 13th century the fine had become a popular way of conveyancing freehold property. The right and left hand copies were given to the parties and the third copy at the foot was retained by the court. Hence 'feet of fines'. The walk from Southam across fields alongside the River Sowe leads to the restored Well. A little further on is the junction with the Itchen close to Stoneythorpe Hall and the remains of a water mill. The latter was still standing in the late 60s when Sharon and I came to Harbury but it collapsed during a storm soon after. I have occasionally seen a kingfisher thereabouts and herons are numerous.

It was good to hear that cranes are getting more numerous. A flock of around 40 was seen recently in East Anglia. I have seen several whilst visiting the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust Reserve at Slimbridge Gloucestershire originally set up by Peter Scott. Cranes are tall, long-necked waders which have begun breeding in this country again after a gap of 350 years. The biggest threat to cranes is hunting and habitat destruction. They are now protected by international agreement.

Finally, I would like to wish you all a happy and healthy 2019.

It's February 1918. There is war across the whole continent, and in my country, men parade along the streets in an aggressive manner because they are fighting and protesting for their rights. Several policewomen grab some of the more violent men and drag them away but I don't know where because I am limited to what is visible from my bedroom window.

Women rule the country, you see, and there's never been a problem with that until now; men are angry that they are thought of as less capable, intelligent and worthy. I think it's wrong though because it means that my younger brother and my father cannot go to work. They hope that they will be able to in the future. Just maybe.

I'm watching the protests from my window because I don't have school today and I also don't have anything better to do. Mother always says that I should be proud of being a female but I should also think of men as equal, which I do. However I'm only twelve so it's not like I can do anything anyway.

"Elizabeth!" my mother calls from downstairs. Instantly I hurry down the stairs and I greet her with a smile.

"Hello Mother"

"Good afternoon Elizabeth"

"Have you seen the newspaper?"

I pick it up and scan through it. Numbers. Big ones. This is how many women soldiers have died in the war so far. I can't even begin to imagine what it's like out there. Constant fighting and careless killing. The newspaper tells me that the army needs more women to fight for the country, but I know that it means signing up to stand in a field in the cold and rain, wearing a green uniform and then dying of disease, gunshot or hypothermia.

It's pretty much a miracle that my mother is cooking today's lunch as my father usually cooks all of our meals. He is a very good cook but I assume he likes to have a break every now and then. I appreciate everything that my father does in our house; cooking, washing, cleaning and tidying. Despite all of this, I know that he'd rather be out working like my mother.

When mother walks into the kitchen complaining about the riots and protests being right on our doorstep, I hadn't even realised that she'd left the room.

"It's worse than ever out there today" she exclaims. I don't say anything as I know that she was addressing my father.

"I know Maria, but if they carry on like this then the government might capitulate and we will be able to vote and go to work like you lot!" he remarks. Despite his contrary reply he knows that my mother is right.

That evening we eat dinner almost in silence. I don't know why and frankly I don't think anyone else does either. When we've all finished, my younger brother Edward stacks the plates and my mother and father wash up whilst I slip away to avoid helping. I get ready for bed as quickly as I can, pick up my book and then start reading.

I'm not a big fan of reading but my mother and my school teacher tell me to, so I do it anyway. Edward reads too but he enjoys reading and education because he says that he wants to be the prime minister when he's older. I can't imagine this ever happening but he thinks that things will turn around in a few years' time and that he will be the first male prime minister. Just maybe.

I also hope that the war stops because I don't know how long we're going to survive in the capital city before being bombed or something like that. After only reading about a paragraph of my book, I decide to get to sleep for school tomorrow.

In the morning when I get downstairs, I find mother and Edward at the breakfast table, but not father.

"Get some breakfast, Elizabeth"

"Okay" I reply.

As I sit down, my brother blurts out "Daddy's been arrested Liz, but he's supposed to be coming home tomorrow."

I'm speechless. What am I supposed to say to that?

"He hasn't done anything wrong though Elizabeth. He will be home tomorrow, so don't worry"

"Okay..." I say.

When I return from school later that day, I find my mother crying and Edward doing his best to calm her down and comfort her. "Mother!" I cry. "What's happened?"

"Daddy won't be home for a while and we don't know when he will be coming home Liz" Edward says, trying to sound calm, but I can detect the slight panic in his voice. The rest of the evening flies by quickly and we barely exchange a word to each other. I go to bed early to get as much time to myself as I can.

The next morning I appear downstairs to a much more jolly mood than yesterday. "Look at the news Liz" Edward instructs. I glance down at the newspaper and two words jump at me, 'VOTE AGREEMENT!' it reads. This is what the whole country had been waiting for but we didn't think that the government would give in so easily.

That evening we get a call from the police. It's bad. I can tell. As soon as mother puts the telephone down, salty tears stream down her rosy cheeks. "He won't ever be coming home Elizabeth"

"Why?"

"He..."her words trail off but I can't hear any more of this so I disappear up to my room collecting the post, left from this morning, on the way.

As I lie on my bed, I open the envelope that I picked up. 'It's me. I'm ok and things are going to be just fine but I need you to stay strong for me. ok?' I knew that my life was going to change. I could feel it and I think I'll be ok. Just maybe.

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
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
