From the Rector

Before Harbury and Ladbroke entered into vacancy, when Craig Groocock left for new pastures, I had presided at one main service in each church. They were not desperate for clergy cover back then! Unfortunately, on the one occasion I was leading at Harbury, the heating broke down and I kept the service short because of the cold. Strangely, now that I am leading about half the Sunday morning services, the heating has broken down in a more permanent fashion. I can't see how it can be my fault, but you never know.

When the ministerial team met to organise our part in the vacancy we set ourselves to keep the churches "moving" in the same direction and pace as under Craig's leadership. One particular area of possible "moving" was the spectrum of formal to informality. Under Craig's leadership I think most people would have seen a gentle move towards being less formal while maintaining that things were done in good order. (As I do a lot of work with children and teenagers, I have a tendency towards informality with an appearance of chaos.)

With the heating on perma-frost mode our best intentions of a normal pace of change at Harbury are well scuppered. We are meeting in the Tom Hauley room for some weeks to come and inevitably this makes for a more intimate and informal atmosphere. Additional change was brought on as our regular organist left at the end of December. The organist booked for cover in January only plays the organ, not piano, so the hymns' accompaniment is different too. Thank you to those pianists who are willing to cover.

As usual, you can't please all the people all the time. I imagine that some like the more relaxed services in the smaller room and some are looking forward to a return to normal. In all of this we are trying very hard to maintain business as usual. Baptisms, weddings and funerals will carry on as normal. Sundays are enjoyable and the sense of awe in God's presence should be due to his Word and Spirit rather than the imposing building and organ.

Our first events of the New Year were our Family Service on the first Sunday followed by "Pause and Pray" the following evening. Both were well attended and we were particularly pleased that some of our friends from Harbury were able to join us on the Monday evening as we shared our "2020 vision" and prayed for our two major projects of the moment.

These are the recruitment process for our new vicar, which is now progressing again after a delay which coincided with Christmas, and our All Saints For All Generations building repairs and heritage activities project. By the time this article is published, we expect to have had a meeting with the assessors from the Heritage Lottery Fund who are considering our grant application.

In both cases we are working through complicated processes which take a lot of time behind the scenes, but with little firm news to give until we get to the end! As we are able to give more news, we will do so – so watch this space!

Christmas seems only just over but spring and Easter will soon be here. The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which is on 26th February this year. As usual, we shall be having a special service that evening, at 7.30pm.



Ladbroke Parish Council

Ladbroke has a small Parish Council, just five councillors, and the meeting on January 8th was only just quorate with three of them present; it proved to be a short meeting too.

SDC: The council, but not our councillor, voted **for** charges to empty green bins - see Cllr Rock's report for more details.

WCC: Cllr Williams reported "wait and see" messages regarding changes in tiers of local government and forthcoming HS2 decision. House prices in the county are rising as it is seen as a pleasant place to live.

Police precept: The Parish Council had been consulted on whether they thought this should rise by zero, 4.99% or more. Given that it rose by 6% last year to little perceived benefit and there is a central grant from the Home Office, our council's response is "a rise up to the inflation rate", though this wasn't actually given as an option.

Ladbroke Parish Precept: To remain unchanged.

Planning: The council made no representation regarding tree works in Ladbroke Churchyard, at Hallsfield, The Old School or land off Bridge Lane.

Highways and Footpaths: It transpires that Highways had requested the drains in Church Road be sorted and they were surprised this was not yet done. (*Note a few days after the meeting the worst section was unblocked so finally, after three months of the road and pavement being under water, this has drained away. However several gullies between this corner and the stream are still blocked).*

In the recent very heavy rain, the Banbury Road had flooded near Ladbroke Farm. However this was only temporary unlike the persistent flooding before the new drainage works undertaken a couple of years ago.

Village Hall and Millennium Green: The new entrance and accessible toilet at the village hall are practically complete thanks to funding from the HS2 Community Fund. The next works will be new gravelling and a hard space for disabled parking (*in progress*) followed by some kitchen improvements. Ladbroke players will be performing the comedy, "Anything you Ask" in the village hall in early February, and Ladbroke Matters have plans for various fund raising events during the year. They are also looking into the new Severn Trent Community Fund as a source of funding.

HS2: As everyone knows, we are awaiting the government's decision on HS2. Documents showing the general look of bridges etc. have been received and will be put on the village website.

Speed monitoring: Five people have said they will support speed measurement but more are needed to make this viable and worth obtaining the equipment.

Water pump: It was agreed to service the petrol driven pump which is available to move large volumes of water in case of flooding.

Next meeting: Wednesday 11th March, 7.45pm.

From Your District Councillor

Green Waste. You may remember that I reported that the last Council meeting of 2019 voted through a £40 annual charge for the continued collection of green waste starting this this summer, a move which I opposed.

Since the meeting, three of my colleagues have made formal complaints about the process leading to this decision and asked for it to be set aside. Firstly, because the information given in the public consultation and to Councillors was inaccurate and misleading, particularly around the finances and recent funding of the District Council, and secondly because the County Council appears not to have had the chance to properly consider the effect of more traffic, as people take their green waste to recycling centres such as the Stockton one, which serves the area around Southam. That site is already at capacity at weekends and is located on a dangerous stretch of road.

At the time of writing the complaint has been rejected and colleagues are considering what sensible steps can be made to have both the timing and concept of this proposal revised. 14

Budget: The council will be looking at the budget during the coming session.

The announcement by the government on 20^{th} December of its Provisional Local Government Settlement for councils for the coming year has delivered a bonus to Stratford District Council. This 'settlement' provides £9.33million from central government to Stratford - £2.47million more than the £6.86million more than was forecast in last year's medium term financial plan.

This is a very welcome bonus for the District Council but one wonders why the Council should now continue with £40 charge for green waste which was put forward as a fund raising exercise, especially since the Council's reserves are predicted to remain at over £9 million for the next two years, against the minimum requirement of £3 million.

Climate Emergency: The new planning guidance document to respond to climate change is now open for consultation. Comments must be received by 5pm on Friday 21st February 2020.

The document can be viewed at www.stratford.gov.uk/climatechangespd (or at public libraries). The Council is also hosting a public drop-in session when officers will be available to answer questions and provide more information. January 2020 Meeting Report

Surprisingly little to report; matters needed little discussion and it all ended early for once!

A vacancy on the Council will be published as Cllr Pat Summers has resigned, but intends to continue, with her volunteers, to beautify the Burial Grounds. Fees for burial will be increased slightly but fees for child burials will be scrapped. The chapel roof has still not been repaired due to an extreme pluvial season. Parts of the playing fields have also been underwater for months and damage from Bonfire Night is extensive.

A resident wrote to suggest that, in future, fireworks should be silent; there should be no bonfire, and trees could be planted on old site. Instead Councillors agreed to negotiate with GASS on what happens if the weather is too extreme. They then made no representations on Stratford District's Climate Change and Mitigation Policy.

There will be a Public Consultation on 3^{rd} February for residents to express their views on which of three potential sites on the playing fields, would be the most suitable site for the youth shelter. The sites will be pegged out so that people can evaluate them.

Late in the proceedings a resident arrived to petition for a bus shelter at Binswood End for the many elderly people who had to wait there in the cold. Cllr Gibb, the Chairman said, is aware of the problem and is "in the queue for funding" for such a project. The mystery of how the lamppost in Binswood End was damaged remains. It will cost £1,500 to £2,000 to replace.

The Clerk and Cllr Gibb met WCC Highways to discuss the damage to the carriageway and verges along Bush Heath Lane. The County will replace the missing Harbury sign, put boundary markers along the verge and fill in some of the damaged grass to the east. But the western side has to wait until Henry's developers have installed the promised footpath and removed the wrongly installed gates about which our Parish Council has complained.

Cllr Rutherford reported Village Hall improvements were stalled over HS2 uncertainty. It was not prudent to go-ahead when the proposed funding from the scheme was on hold. However plans for a £5,400 (plus VAT) joint CCTV project for the car park and Hall was to progress.

Probably the most amusing item revolved round a complaint, from Stratford District, that the red dog waste bin on the playing fields was too heavy for the bin men to carry. It is close to the gate from Ridgley Way to the fields. The obvious solution would be for them to access it from that estate as the bin is only feet away from the roadway. It appears SDC is under the

misapprehension that the road is private. The PC strenuously asserts that this is not the case.

There was some discussion about the budget (£113,378) and the very slight rise in the rates (1.2% increase for Band D payers) and a tedious process to approve the Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Financial Risk Management and Asset Register, which has to be done "by the book".

Parish Council Meeting Notices

As a small contribution towards saving the planet, the parish council has decided to discontinue the practice of advertising each monthly meeting separately by way of laminated posters. In future, a single notice will be displayed on each of the village noticeboards, listing the meeting dates for the coming year. We currently produce a minimum of 55 laminated posters every year, which all go to landfill after a few days. We estimate that even taking into account that the notices will have to be replaced 2 or 3 times during the year, we will be able to reduce the number of laminated posters to around 20 each year. At the first meeting of the new year our speaker was Charlie Demetriou who addressed the very topical issue of 'Zero Waste and Realism'. Tackling plastic waste is frequently in the forefront of peoples' minds which was shown by the number of members who braved torrential rain to attend the meeting.

Charlie recently opened Zero in Russell Street in Learnington. Zero was founded in February 2019 and started life as pop up stalls, including Harbury, and mini stalls in local shops, including Harbury supermarket. Charlie has now given up her job as a primary school teacher to concentrate on running her business in Learnington, using local suppliers wherever possible.

Charlie told us that there are 150,000,000 metric tonnes of plastic in the oceans worldwide and this is increasing every day. A lot of developing countries don't recycle. She acknowledged that the recycling of plastic was still confusing and some don't break down as we assume they will. She encouraged us to use refill stations for our cleaning products. Charlie also made a strong case for using loose tea rather than tea bags which don't decompose as we think they might.

She reminded us that past generations were a "make do and mend" generation but at present we tend to use something and then get rid of it; Charlie was encouraging us to borrow, swap and share things to avoid so much waste. Cooking from scratch and sewing are a great way to avoid waste. She also told us what a problem disposable nappies are – washable nappies are much easier than they used to be.

Charlie acknowledged that recycling depends on where you live and encouraged members to look at the Warwickshire recycling website – we can't be perfect but we can all make an effort to protect future generations.

Our New Year Party was held in the Village Hall on January 17th where members and guests had a lovely supper provided by members. We were then entertained by Cathy Morris who combines her work as a community nurse in Coventry with life as a professional singer. She has a fantastic voice and soon had everyone singing along with songs from the 50s, 60s and 70s. She entertains lots of WIs and remarked on our super Village Hall and said it was the best WI supper she had ever had!

Our next meeting on February 13th will be a "Members' Evening" when we shall be entertained by quizzes and activities created by some of our members – always a pleasant social occasion. Visitors and new members are always welcome.

The next cinema in the Village Hall will be featuring "Downton Abbey on Saturday 29th February. Tickets will be on sale in Harbury Pharmacy until Wednesday 26th February, but don't leave it until the last minute as this will probably be a very popular film and we can only sell so many tickets. A reminder that neither the pharmacy nor WI committee members keep a waiting list for the cinema.

Memories of growing up and living in Harbury

This month we are featuring Neville Sheasby, a Harbury man born and bred.

Neville was born in the Warneford Hospital, Leamington Spa in October 1952, eldest of four.

Many of you will know his brother Colin and sister Geraldine; his other brother John lives in Stratford and is a heating engineer. Neville's father Gerald was a master butcher and worked at Sid Cowley's in the High Street, now 'Phoenix House' and Percy Cowley's in Crown Street, the building opposite the Crown Inn, today known as' The Homestead'. Neville remembers at the early age of four going with his father to work and being in the slaughter house behind the shop, sat up on

the counter feeding the cut up meat through the mincer for the sausages.

Neville's mother, May passed away last year; he remembers walking with her to Chesterton on many occasions to visit his grandparents, Sam and Sally Sweatman, May's parents, who lived at 10, The Green. Neville lives in Harbury around the corner from 'The Crown' public house where he enjoys a pint or two!

Neville attended the Wagstaffe School infant as an under Headteacher Mrs Watts and his class teacher Miss Endall. He transferred to the Wight School. headteacher Mr Reg Farrow, and onto Southam High School in 1964. On leaving secondary school in 1970 with a good mixture of O Levels and CSEs. he dained a place at Mid-Warwickshire College to study further. Neville began his working life at Warwickshire County Council. He had a couple of different roles at the Central Area Education Office before settling at North Learnington School as the first point of communication in the main school reception office. Thirty-one years later he retired!



Back in Harbury Neville used all of

the local shops, Taylor's, of course, known locally as 'Top Shop', run by Mr and Mrs Taylor and later their son, Brian. Neville bought 'Lucky Bags' there for 6d. Mrs Messers' shop in High Street; George Marshall's hardware shop run by Mr Verity, a good place to buy caps for his cap gun. Colwell's Grocers run by Mrs Colwell. Her son Tony operated a mobile shop which he drove around the village and down to Chesterton. Lines' Store in Chapel Street, where 'Saddlers' is today. The newsagents on the corner of Mill Lane run by Mr and Mrs Lowe, Phil Lindop's in Chapel Street, now the hairdressers where 'you could buy anything!' Harbury Co-op as it was called at one time; the manager was Mr Honiwell who lived in the detached house between the chemist and the Wight School.

Neville commented on how the village has changed during his lifetime, noticeably in the 60's and 70's with all the new housing and cars parked everywhere. Before then he added 'the streets were relatively quiet and there were a lot more fields and green areas'.

Neville's hobbies include playing darts, crib and reading and for many years he was an active member of the Carnival Committee. Now he has retired he has more time to take part in other village activities. He is a volunteer in the Library and at the Heritage Room.

If you know Neville you will appreciate why he has asked me to add this statement:

Without the help and support of my parents, May and Gerry, I would not be as independent as I am today, thanks Mum and Dad'.

Helping to celebrate 100 years of the Village Club

The Heritage Committee was asked to help by running a games afternoon at the Village Club on Saturday 4th January. We brought along a range of games and children were invited to come along and play. Our research showed that at the end of 1919, not long after the end of World War 1, popular games were hopscotch, snakes and ladders, blow football, Ludo, bagatelle, draughts and for the adults really, shove ha'penny. All of these were available and the photos show children and parents getting involved. Congratulations to the Village Club on its Centenary.

Those of you who have visited the Heritage Room, currently in the main building of the Primary School, will have seen the large collection of documents,




photographs, maps and artefacts that have been collected over the past ten years or more.

Warming the church

You may have heard, or will definitely know if you attend regularly, that the church's elderly, inefficient and unreliable heating has failed dramatically and is beyond repair. It is not a place to dwell at this time of year. Concentrating on a long sermon must have been quite a struggle in the hundreds of winters before heating was installed in the mid 19^{th} century. Mind you, the carbon footprint was pretty low. The boiler has been changed since then - but not the pipes that snake round the building. The church is likely to need in the region of £150,000 to £200,000 to cover the cost of this, which is unwelcome but it does allow an opportunity to update all the heating to include the Tom Hauley Room and, at the same time, the lighting. HEI member and church Fabric Committee member, Philip Mayer, is overseeing plans for this and has already consulted a number of experts capable of delivering a modern,

energy efficient solution. HEI plans to support this exercise until it is resolved. It will take us well forward in our bid to become a Silver level Eco Church, even approaching Gold standard. Not bad for a 700 year old church. Meeting the costs will be a challenge but we are not afraid of those, as you know!

Energising the school

The school PV installation has now been operating for nearly a year. I am happy to tell you that the savings on electricity and income from generation are meeting expectations. It looks as though the school is on target to pay off its first instalment of the SALIX loan this year with a little to spare. What we need is a bit more sunshine. Solar rays on a cold day are the best...but don't last long.

Inspiring the county

I have been reporting on our progress with a scheme that takes HEI outside Harbury into the big, wide world of rural Warwickshire. The Low Carbon Warwickshire network now has a steering group and a bit of a plan and is succeeding in its aims. This initiative may not be strictly about activity in the village but it comes from Harbury so belongs to you. HEI has formed a consortium with Community Energy Warwickshire, Act on Energy and the RSA and in December submitted a pre-application concept proposal around this network idea to the National Lottery Climate Action Fund. This could provide a massive boost to the development of the network and to the stimulation of new carbon reduction and environmental activity in the county. There is a lot to do and communities need to get active. We wait to hear if our concept is worthy of a full bid.

Advising you


Staying with the same energy supplier for year after year could cost you dearly. It pays to check at the time your contract is due for renewal whether switching is going to benefit you. It is quite likely that it will. Switching is very simple nowadays and doesn't take long. Many energy companies now offer 'green' tariffs, which supports the development of more renewable generation. The country has fairly rapidly moved to almost 50% renewables generation now, so why not help us to reach 75% ...or even 100%! A couple of innovative energy suppliers have recently emerged. You might like to investigate them. Have a look at People's Energy (peoplesenergy.co.uk) and Ripple Energy (ripplenergy.com), both of which operate on an ownership/ profit sharing model. In the case of Ripple you buy a share in a wind farm as part of your energy package. People's Energy return 75% of their profits to members.

Looking ahead

HEI members Rich Fowler and Paul Quinney both have projects in development at the moment. More news as it happens. Or more likely just afterwards.

Keeping up to date

Websites are great resources but only if you keep them up to date. The HEI site has become a little out of date. I have contacted our web designer and am working out what we need. One benefit of an update is that I will no longer receive quite so much spam email offering me sexual encounters with women in Australia, America and Canada. There will be a cost to this (the web upgrade, I am not planning trips to Australia etc) and I am looking for funds that help charities with their IT development. Anyone know of any?

2020 is the Year of the Rat and we have been using props to re-enact 'The Great Race' to find out how the different years came to represent different

animals. The children very much enjoyed looking at the story and helping the animals across the 'river'.

Chinese New Year would not be complete without a dragon and children (and staff!) are always excited when the Pre-School's homemade Chinese Dragon makes his annual appearance and this year has been no different. The children have produced some fantastic representations of our dragon using paint, carefully looking at his many features. The staff team love to listen to them describe their finished results, for example, 'He's called Harry. He likes to eat people and fly to the forest'.





Outdoor Play at Pre-School

Outdoor Play: It has been a very cold start to the year, but the children have been keeping themselves warm with physical activity outside as they work towards their Physical Challenge Certificates.

Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

It's a bit late but here are my predictions for 2020.

There will be some extremes of weather, it will be the hottest, driest, wettest, or windiest and records will be broken.

At least one of your favourite plants will be destroyed by either rabbits, mice, deer, aphids or the family dog.

You will lose (mis-place) your secateurs/trowel/gloves at some time.

There will be a new pest or disease (from abroad) which will threaten a well-known, well-loved group of plants.

Taxonomists will reclassify another group of plants amid much raising of eyebrows from the general public.

We will all be a little bit older and some of the garden jobs will be harder to do.

I often wonder why so many of us are so keen on gardening when there are so many potential set-backs.

Most of us use far too much plastic; many of us are wanting to cut down our use of it. Our aim this year is to try to reduce the amount of plastic we buy in. If our customers return the pots which had our plants in (washed and not broken) we will pay 10p per pot. We can then re-use them. Please don't bring us pink/purple/blue pots or those with sticky stickers on which can't be removed, just the ones bought from us.

The bleak damp days of this winter can be somewhat dispiriting but then a special sunrise boosts morale. It happened on 14th January when the clouds were red and put something resembling zip into my progress up Mill Street. The 'Shepherd's warning' became reality by afternoon when the next low pressure area slammed in from the west and yet more rain fell on the already waterlogged ground. Pity the farmers trying to find a window for cultivation. There is something to be said for hibernation.

Coming through the Thwaites Estate from Gaydon, I usually look out for the stand of Dogwood growing on a south facing slope near Kingston Farm. For most of the year the bark, a shade of red, is hidden by the foliage but in

winter the splash of colour is most welcome. Dogwood is a name probably derived from Old English 'dagwood' as the slender stems of its hard wood were used for making daggers, skewers and the like. Then, every tree was pressed into service - Oak for shipbuilding, Beech for fine furniture, Hazel for fencing hurdles and thatching spars, and Chestnut for fence palings.

I've enjoyed Peter Maren's book entitled 'Rainbow Dust' which I obtained from Harbury Library. It's the story of British butterflies from their heyday in the 18th century to the inexorable squeeze on their environment as the fens were drained, forests cut down, fertilisers spread around and insecticide use became the norm. Now, with greater appreciation of the interconnectedness of our flora and fauna, we are slowly rescuing butterflies such as the Pearlbordered Fritillary from the brink of extinction. It was just too late for the Large Copper, a fenland specialist known locally as the 'Fire' butterfly due to its dazzling displays when its wings caught the light. The Large Blue died out in 1980 but reintroductions from Sweden have been successful. The best chance of seeing a Large Blue is the National Trust's Collard Hill near Street in Somerset. I am determined to pay a visit in late June to see this interesting insect and will report back to you via the Harbury & Ladbroke News. The Large Blue has a fascinating life cycle which has been gradually unearthed, almost literally, by painstaking observation. The caterpillars' food plant is Wild Thyme which grows in sunny open areas of downland. This terrain is also home to a particular type of red ant, Myrmica. The caterpillar is found by the ants which feed on the honey-like secretion it exudes. The caterpillar mimics an ant grub and is carried into the nest. Here it acts rather like a cuckoo attacking and eating the grubs. Eventually the caterpillar pupates and a month later the adult butterfly emerges by crawling up a tunnel in the nest, all the while accompanied by a retinue of ants.

Now (Wednesday 22nd January) atmospheric pressure is persisting at record levels. We have had several frosty mornings with blue skies and long views - real winter weather. Today, misty conditions persisted into the afternoon. On a south facing hillside in Napton primroses were fully open. Winter aconites and snowdrops are in flower around the Stobo Memorial by the south door of Harbury Church and lengthening days lead on to spring.

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
