Doesn't it seem at the moment that we are staggering from one crisis to another? Just as we begin to recover from the devastation of Covid, we are now faced with potential shortages caused by a lack of HGV drivers, the current panic buying of fuel, huge increases in energy bills, and the headlines once again telling us that 'Christmas could be cancelled'. Of course, in reality, Christmas can never be cancelled, because it's not about the availability of turkey or carbonated drinks, it's about God stepping into our world, altering the course of human history, and profoundly changing the lives of every human being who puts their trust in him. And perhaps the shocking scenes we have seen of drivers attacking each other on petrol stations remind us of how much we need that transformation. From the Churchwardens

We will continue throughout October and for the first half of November with the current pattern of holding a service each Sunday morning in the Harbury Church. At this time of year, although the building is without any heating, it should be sufficiently warm to be pretty comfortable with a coat on.

We would like to draw your attention to three special services. On Sunday 10th October, commencing at 10.30am in Church, we will be holding our special Harvest Festival Service and on the same day at 3.00pm in the Tom Hauley Room, there will be a special Harvest Festival Messy Church, where the plan is to make a messy meal from vegetable and fruit! This year we are asking folk to please bring to the morning Church service gifts of non-perishable food items that are suitable for onward donation to the local Foodbank.

The third special Service will be held in Church on Remembrance Sunday 14th November, and whilst the exact arrangements are still being worked out, it is likely to be slightly shorter in church than in prior years, and will conclude outside with the traditional service gathered around the war memorial including the roll call and observing the two-minute silence.

Finally, we are hopeful that our plans for heating the church will be approved by the end of October. We have considered the feedback from the Diocese and have adjusted the details of our proposal for installing Radiant Heating into the church and Tom Hauley Room, and we believe that our proposal now meets all the requirements. The revised Faculty will be submitted in early October for consideration during the month by the Diocesan Advisory Committee and the Diocesan Chancellor, who has the legal responsibility (rather than the local council planning department) for approving building plans in listed Church buildings.

A Visit to Oxfordshire

St Mary's, the Church of England Parish church of Chalgrove with Berrick Salome, is in the Aston and Cuddesdon Deanery of the Diocese of Oxford. (Chalgrovechurch.org). It is a Grade I listed church and contains precious and delicate medieval wall

paintings. Yet this ancient church has cutting edge, twenty-first century heating from radiant panels. This is the heating system planned for our own All Saints Harbury. On September 20th, representatives of the Heat, Light, Stone project visited the Oxfordshire church to see how fitting these heating panels had affected the aesthetics of this beautiful building.

The visit confirmed all that the Chalgrove congregation had assured us. The panels are discreet, effective, and not out of keeping with a place of worship. We are much encouraged and more confident that the Coventry Diocese will accept our plans. All that should be progressed at the meeting of Diocesan Buildings Committee this month. We have our fingers crossed!

The panels will be around Harbury village church and can be switched on independently, so that meetings or worship in the Lady Chapel - the pews to your immediate right as you enter the main door of the church - can be heated without heating the entire church.

We are still on target for completing the Heat, Light, Stone Project for Christmas 2022. But, inevitably, money is still needed. We would welcome offers to hold events as restrictions become more relaxed. Coffee mornings, quizzes, sales and other traditional events all help to swell the funds. Do think about it; every little helps, as we are often reminded!

I was unable to attend the parish council meeting on 8th September so this is what I understood was discussed, from the **draft** minutes.

There were just three parish councillors and the clerk present plus our new county councillor, Cllr Kettle, who introduced himself and explained his responsibilities on WCC. Nigel Rock was not there but had sent a report

covering two current consultations: District Council Ward Boundaries and the potential merger of Stratford and Warwick District Councils. The public can see the proposals for the latter at www.southwarwickshire.org.uk and comment until 24th October.

Planning: the parish council had made no representation for the proposed extensions and remodelling of Cornerstones, including re-sited access, an agricultural building and some other changes to proposals at Deppers Bridge Farm on the edge of the parish, a new front door and sun tunnels to bring in daylight at 20 Ladbroke Hall or for treeworks at The Old Well House. The last two have now been approved by SDC together with treeworks at Ladbroke Farm and the proposals at Rose Cottage.

HS2: Cllr Batty had had a number of successful meetings with Simon David (community engagement) who will be invited to the November meeting to give a briefing on works to be carried out.

Village Hall: the Parish Council agreed to give a grant of £812 to the Village Hall trust towards new lights.

Next Meeting: Wednesday 10th November.



Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Carol Lane

Ladbroke and Deppers Bridge WI member, Maggie Watts was our speaker for the first indoor meeting since lock-down, on Thursday 2nd September.

Maggie and her husband Tony had lived in Europe and South East Asia where his job in the electronics industry took them so, when he retired, they had to decide how to spend their retirement years.

At that time they were living near Aix en Provence and they had started to sail on Lake Maggiore when they lived in Italy between 1978-1982.

Having enjoyed this hobby, they determined on buying a yacht. Not content with any of the boats they looked at, they decided to have one built to their specification. Gradually Ganymede took shape and was ready in February 2002.

This was not the only brave decision they made as they also home-schooled their 12 year old son, Charlie, while they were cruising round the Mediterranean. He now has a degree so Maggie and Tony must be proud of their teaching. (I think there could be another talk just about that!!)



quote Maggie's wise words 'If you make plans, guard yourself against disappointment'. Just before they embarked on their first big crossing, Tony's bag containing their passports was stolen. Luckily all their papers were on the boat but they had to travel to Madrid to get a quick replacement of the passports. By this time various Spanish yachting magazines had become interested in their venture so a reporter, a photographer and a representative from the boat builder joined their initial sailing from Barcelona to Ibiza. On the day of departure there was a hold up as Ganymede's mast was too high and they had to wait until the bridge was opened. As they left the harbour a horrendous storm blew up and by the time they reached Ibiza, Tony was the only person who was not seasick. An extra consequence which Maggie used to experience was intensely cold and numb feet!



For the first 18 months they cruised round Italy, down the coast of Spain and the Balearic Islands where they often spent time with friends. Winter was spent in a marina. Over their eight years on the Mediterranean, they also visited Turkey. the Greek Islands and Croatia. Some of these crossings included night sailing and Tony would do the majority with Maggie taking over at sunrise. Maggie commented on the potential roughness of these waters and was amazed at the

determination of migrants making such a crossing in an inflatable boat.

One memorable trip was on a passage from Croatia to Malta to join friends who were already there. Maggie dropped the fridge lid and amputated the tip of her finger. An ambulance took her to Bari on the Balearic coast and, after Tony had fetched the amputated tip, it was very successfully sewn back on again!

After selling Ganymede in 2011 they had to choose where to settle and, as their other sons were living in the Midlands, this has become their home.

In answer to some of the many questions this interesting talk had prompted, Maggie said that the places she misses most are the Greek and Adriatic Islands.

Ganymede is now in the Gulf of Mexico.

At the business meeting which followed, a minute's silence was held in memory of Hazel and a donation will be sent to the Warwickshire Federation Memorial fund in her memory.

This year's resolution is Ovarian Awareness.

Our secretary, Janet, has had to step down due to other commitments and Dianne thanked her for all her help re-establishing the WI after the lock-downs. Now that Joan has had a break, she is prepared to take on the role again which is very much appreciated.

Coffee mornings have started again in the Tom Hauley Room in Harbury and we have been allocated 13th November as our fundraiser. Dianne asked for the usual donations of cakes, (preferably covered and with any allergens listed), good bric a brac: e.g. scarves, bags, jewellery, photo frames, ornaments etc, books, DVDs, CDs and raffle prizes. Help will be needed on the day so please put it in your diaries.

The next meeting will be held at the new time of Tuesday, 12th October starting at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. It promises to be a fascinating presentation. As you know, the church has recently undergone major conservation work. Jackie West has been heavily involved in managing this work and in particular has studied and researched the stained glass windows. She will explain how to identify some of the people portrayed and other coded messages in the designs using stunning close up photography. We will also see some of the skills and techniques the conservators used earlier this year to repair some of the windows.

There will be a Special Meeting to confirm the Committee's recommendation that the financial year end should change to March with the Annual General Meeting in May.

Coffee and biscuits will be prepared in the kitchen as before Covid.

September's meeting was the first indoors for some 18 months and suddenly everything seemed normal again, albeit seated apart and with the windows open. We were reminded of the dark days of lockdown with photographs of empty streets and of current precautions with images of masks, gel and tests. On the lighter side there were pictures of "We're back" signs signifying the happier days coming out of Covid. We also had a display of members' photographs from a walkabout in Warwick. It is always intriguing to see how a group can all go to the same place and come away with such different images: familiar landmarks seen from new angles and small details that normally escape attention.

The main event was a presentation by Richard Bedwell on a theme of "On the Wing". He has been specialising in photographing birds and aircraft for the past twelve years and his collection is extensive. His pictures were taken in many parts of the world and included many bird species I had never heard of. His detailed shots of birds of prey were very impressive, whilst other birds were shown in minute detail. His photos of aircraft included everything from Tiger Moths to modern jets (mainly military), again in great detail. They

included iconic machines like Spitfires, Hurricanes and Lancasters and displays by stunt aircraft and the Red Arrows as shown here.

Ladbroke Heritage

Repairs were on the back burner in September while the building was heavily used - not just regular services and choir practices but a wedding, two baptisms, Jane Rutherford's memorial service and many visitors. On 4th September a quarter peal, the first major ring since Covid hit, rang out from ADBRΦΚΕ the repaired tower to announce the wedding of Keith and Sally HERITAGE thanks to a team mainly from Stratford. Our own village ringers rang after the ceremony while photos were taken and confetti thrown.

Heritage Open Days

As well as local visitors the HOD publicity encouraged a number of day trippers and overnight tourists to come along. I'd like to thank the lady in Harbury who told one couple from Wales they must come and visit our church. They had been disappointed not to get into St Mary's Warwick (because of the scaffolding work in progress there) and "loved the informative personal tour of a beautiful building" they had at Ladbroke instead. Times without any visitors gave an opportunity to sit in the sunshine in the churchyard; it receives a surprisingly high number of visitors. I discovered some of these are geocaching, a modern take on orienteering with a mobile phone. The clue to one micro-cache is in plain sight in our churchyard but I'm sworn to secrecy where it is!

Fascinating variety of gravestones in Ladbroke Church

Our activities programme continued in September with two fascinating talks by Nina Morgan, a science writer, and Philip Powell, a former curator of the Museum of Natural History at Oxford University. Their subject was the type and origin of the stones in Ladbroke Church graveyard.

Using magnifying lenses, we saw the fossils in some of the sedimentary rocks such as the local iron-rich limestone known as Banbury Ironstone or Hornton Stone, as well as stones from further away, including limestone from Dorset and granites from as far afield as Cornwall and north east Scotland.



We also saw numerous stones from outside the UK, including marble from Italy, granite from Scandinavia and limestone from Slovenia, each of which looked very different from their UK equivalent because of the distinctive chemical composition and colouring.

So how and why are there so many different types of rocks used for gravestones in our church? The practice of marking graves with headstones only started in the 17th century, when wealthier members of the community used local stone to mark graves and carve inscriptions for their loved ones. These are the ones which are weathered, covered in lichens and difficult to decipher. By the 19th century the fashion for limestone and the whiter colours began, and, by Victorian times, carved marble from Italy showed off wealth and status, with inscriptions often inlaid in lead.

Modern gravestones are often granite, sourced from Europe and Scandinavia and transported by canals, ships and road. Their durable finish gives stonemasons greater scope to carve beautiful lettering.

So next time you find yourself in a graveyard, stop and have a look at the gravestones. See if you can trace the progression of older graves in local stone, to the limestone and marble of the Victorians, to modern day granite; it tells the story of status, fashions, power, wealth, and a global trade in rocks as well as enduring love.

September also saw our long planned visit by a group of 16 Blue Badge Guides from the Heart of England Region. These are professional guides trained to the

highest level, so we had to sharpen our brains and remember our history!! No problem. Four of our Ladbroke tour guides were on good form and using our new village trail maps, took small groups round the village and church showing them architecture, stained glass, geology, thatching and told the story of our village and its characters from the Domesday Book to HS2!



We finished in the village hall where the Blue Badge Guides were treated to tea and cakes, and a special presentation by Jackie on the story of Alice and Robert Dudley. They were particularly interested in this story and can add it to their specialist knowledge of our area. Alice and The Adventurer - Part 2

With so many people in Alice's story, I thought that outline family trees might help to show how the main characters are related; you'll find it after this month's episode.

Last time you heard about my childhood, my sister's marriage to Robert Catesby and his untimely end.

By this time I had been married for a few years. Like Kathryn, our father had decided who I was to marry and Robert Dudley was the man he selected. Of course, we all knew about the Dudleys as the father of my chosen husband had been a great favourite with Queen Elizabeth who wouldn't agree to marry

him but didn't want him to marry anyone else. I knew the story that he had married Amy Robsart when they were quite young but she had broken her neck falling downstairs and I heard the speculation about that. Then my future father-in-law got together with Lady Douglas Sheffield, a widow, and my Robert was their child. Robert insisted that his mother and father had been married and, even though they didn't live together, Robert senior acknowledged him as his son.

My fiancé was tall, handsome, an excellent horseman and very clever, being enrolled at Christ Church, Oxford at the age of 14. Because his parents were not living together, his childhood was spent with various families connected with his father although he could see his mother whenever he wanted to. However, she married again and moved to Paris when he was only about six so he never knew a proper home life. He led an expedition to the West Indies when he was 20 and was knighted after he helped to raid Cadiz about two years later. After the death of his father and his Uncle Ambrose, Earl of Warwick, he had inherited Kenilworth Castle and other lands. He was supposed to marry a girl called Frances with Queen Elizabeth's consent but they had to wait as they were deemed to be too young and Frances secretly married someone else and was banned from court. So, at the age of 17, he married Margaret Cavendish but she died without them having a child.


This, then, was my Robert and I was determined to give him the happy life which I felt he had been deprived of until then.


Robert and I were married in the small church at Ashow quite near my home and my mother's sister, Aunt Alice, came to be a witness as well as my parents. What girl could have been happier then? I was married to a brave, handsome, successful courtier, lived in Kenilworth Castle a very short distance from my parents and I was expecting my first baby very soon after we were married. All men hoped for sons but when my little Alice was born, we didn't mind as it was obviously going to be easy for me to produce more and the son would surely be next. I kept hoping pregnancy after pregnancy to have the boy we both wanted so badly but after Alice there was a girl Douglas, then Frances, Anne and Katherine who were all born within five years. I loved my little girls but I was very tired having so many babies in such a short time with the inevitable disappointment at the end of each term.

However, they were all healthy babies and we still had hope but other things started to go wrong. My Robert's father, fed up with Queen Elizabeth's unwillingness to make a permanent commitment to him, had married Lettice Knollys who was a widow and already had several children. This threw the whole question of my husband's legitimacy into question and he fought a long battle in law but there were too many facts against the marriage. For example, how could his mother have married again if she already thought she was married? This then called doubt upon his right to inherit Kenilworth and Warwick. Also, by now Queen Elizabeth had died and King James - a Stuart King - was on the throne and he started looking at our properties.

If we had had sons maybe my Robert would have stayed with me but in 1605 he decided England was no place for him any more so he decided to go abroad - for two years, he told me.

Report from your District Councillor for Ladbroke

There are two consultations this autumn and both affect how we are to be represented.

Firstly, a review of the present District Council Ward Boundaries was started some time ago - well before talk of a merger with

Warwick District. Secondly, the consideration of that merger is the subject of a comprehensive public consultation.

District Council Ward Boundaries. Presently there are 36 councillors, down from the 53 there were 10 or so years ago. Broadly, each councillor represents about 2600 electors now, whereas it was 1800 before. There were a number of concerns that the earlier reduction in councillors was too great, resulting in poorer representation, and wards that are too big, with excessive workload that varied widely between wards. The proposed reorganisation was to produce an increase to about 41 councillors. The Boundary Commission has published proposals for public comment between now and **8**th **November 2021**. I would encourage everyone to read what is intended and comment upon it:

There are many aspects to the report, but for us, I have great concern for our area's representation. Ladbroke is presently part of the largest ward in the District. As it happens, the one comment I had already made directly to the Boundary Commission is one that has been taken on board. In the first round of comments I suggested Ladbroke fitted better with Harbury/Bishops, than say Napton/Shuckburgh as now. That said, in overall terms this proposal makes matters much worse, with a new giant ward that stretches almost to Banbury in the south, and the M40 Junction at Gaydon in the west. The giant ward would have two councillors instead of one, but Ladbroke (with Harbury) only one.

Given the objective of the review - to make better democratic connections, ease and even out work load etc, one wonders what has gone wrong.

Warwick and Stratford will be taken by the two Councils in December. this decision. information been inform has published www.southwarwickshire.org.uk and a public consultation will run until 24th October 2021. I would also encourage everyone to have a look at this and respond please. (One linkage with the previous part of my report above is that these proposals will increase the size of wards that District councillors are to represent.) However, there are many other significant matters to consider. My personal preference would be to work towards achieving a single Unitary Council for South Warwickshire, taking over the functions of both county and district and strengthening work at a parish level. This is unlikely at the present time because it would require central government approval - so I hope the combined South Warwickshire District would be a stepping stone towards this. However, I want to know what people think, so I would appreciate hearing people's comments directly as well.

HS2. On 23rd September our local area was visited by Andrew Stephenson the Minister responsible for HS2, in the company of Jeremy Wright MP. Whilst it was positive that he came, very little time was allocated and Mr Stephenson could only listen to the significant range of complaints thrown at him, by a combination of local elected representatives. I thought the comments from local councillors were useful, clear and objective - but robust. Unsurprisingly, no answers were forthcoming, despite him saying the Prime Minister had charged him with making sure that local communities were not disadvantaged by HS2 more than necessary, and that he was committed to this. Whilst I supported other councillors' messages on the history of complaints, I made clear I wanted to see a change in future. Cllr Louis Adam (Long Itchington) and I repeated our request for an independent enforcement body to investigate and control the more questionable activities of HS2 such as unilateral changes that affected the environment and local communities. Road diversion and hedge removal were cited as examples.

September 2021 Meeting Report

Back to its usual place in the Village Hall, the Parish Councillors faced a small number of parishioners for their September meeting.

Public Participation

A couple of parishioners from Deppers Bridge, were present to explain to the Councillors their development plans. Their application was to change "an eyesore at the bottom of the garden" to a holiday let. The applicants explained that it would be built on the existing footprint of the old building; have no impact on trees or wildlife and it had the neighbours' support. Chairman Tim Lockley explained that the Councillors did not make decisions they could only comment on planning applications.

Other Organisations

Community Libraries such as ours had been praised for their efforts in the pandemic and now their extended hours of opening.

The Village Hall had more refurbishments to be undertaken. Bookings were increasing. There had been some adverse comments on brightness of the safety lighting.

Conference on Climate Change - Julie Balch would attend. The Harbury Energy Initiative was to provide more information on the Global Energy Initiative and what residents could do to help reduce our carbon footprint. She asked the Cllrs what they would like to hear from the Energy Initiative on this matter.

Reports from County and District Councils

Harbury Lane and the Fosseway Junction - Cllr Gibb was concerned that the work there to make the junction safer was still to be done. The delays were not acceptable, as these improvements were promised to happen three years ago. Cllr Gibb complained that the County had missed the opportunity to do the work this summer.

Planning

The Cllrs discussed the Deppers Bridge application. Cllr Gibb pointed out that there had been no objections from the neighbours. The Chairman was concerned as to whether a "Holiday Let" could be changed into a full time dwelling in future and sold off separately. Cllr Allen and Cllr Rutherford suggested the application was contrary to the Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr Balch pointed out that the applicants needed to do something with the building. After considerable discussion the Council took Cllr Allen's advice and objected to the proposed development.

Plans for a two storey extension at 17 Manor Road and extensions at 6 Percival Drive were quickly agreed on - both had "No Representations" from the Council.

There was longer discussion on plans for another solar array on Eastfields Farm at Deppers Bridge. Local residents who had commented were in favour of the project. Cllr Gibb said the Parish Council should make sure that the construction vehicles adhered to the proposed traffic management plan.

Amalgamation plans for Warwick and Stratford districts

Chairman Tim Lockley was "broadly in favour" if it would really save money and did not cut, but enhance services. Cllr Chris Kettle explained that the districts had to have a five year plan and save £8 million either by increasing Council Tax; by removing "discretionary" services; or demanding more tax from residents. He said the amalgamation would protect rural areas.

Chairman Tim Lockley would draft a response to the plans for his colleagues to consider.

Environment

Residents of Butt Lane and Bush Heath Road wanted the Councillors to consider undertaking a feasibility survey on traffic speeds. The Chairman was

in favour but thought that Deppers Bridge should also be re-surveyed at the same time.

Cllrs did not think that suggestions from a resident that there should be parking restrictions on High Street of one hour, would be viable or enforceable. They agreed that more "No Idling" signs should be obtained - to be placed where appropriate.

It was agreed that the Scouts and potentially, other volunteers, could be responsible for planting the trees which Colin Sheasby, their tree surgeon, had advised were most suitable for a Feldon village.

District Cllr Jacqui Harris complained about the poor (or lack) of communication from HS2. She thought that our MP and his party were concerned about the "horrible stories" which continued to emerge about HS2 and its impacts on the environment.

She pledged to continue to complain about the anti-social behaviour of one household on Oakfields Estate, which was "not pleasant for other residents", who had suffered for 12-15 months. There was no response or representation from the Police so she was lobbying the Police and Crime Commissioner for Warwickshire - Phillip Seccombe. Cllr Balch thanked her for her efforts on the behaviour problem. More pressure is needed to get the Police and/or Orbit Housing to do something about the antisocial behaviour.

Properties

The Energy Project. Plans to reposition the site for the turbine on the playing field, away from the trees, were not opposed but it was noted that this would increase its visibility. There were issues about costs and VAT relating to the agreement of Fields in Trust to be considered.

Cemetery - There was, at present, no written policy on people reserving burial plots, and almost all of the plots had now been taken or reserved. Indeed they were down to their last row, the Clerk informed Cllrs and she had sold six reserved spaces since January. So there were just a few spaces left alongside the Park Lane back gardens.

The Clerk would write a policy on plot allocations which would prohibit plots being bought on speculation and also control the purchase of double plots. The Clerk had previously highlighted the results of testing existing memorials for safety and wanted a decision on whether the Council should employ someone to lay down those thought to be dangerous. It was not completely clear whether they had the authority to do this. As yet they had not had information about the cost of the proposed tree planting in the Cemetery which was scheduled for July.

The Winter Lights would be switched on at 4pm on 27th November. There would be market stalls, with food and drink, a light trail, lanterns for Children and possibly a Lantern Workshop. New lights would cost £2,832 and there could be other expenses for fixing them.

Finance and General Purposes

Budget Report, Bank Reconciliation, note on Audit, Age Limitation on personal accident cover for Cllrs (Janet Thornley found herself left out - being over the age limit!). This also could affect volunteers working in the Cemetery.

Reports and Questions

Cllr Thornley had contacted the Surgery about their long waiting times and she wanted the Councillors to note that the surgery does not necessarily do face to face meetings with patients.

Cllr Ekins had issues about the previous Bonfire where the tractor was only available until 3pm, after which cars were used - damaging the grass. He wanted the volunteers to use only suitable vehicles.

Members of Harbury WI have been so pleased to resume more normal activities in September.

On 8th September eight members and two husbands enjoyed a walking quiz in Warwick organised by Ann. The sun shone and we discovered things in Warwick that none of us knew about. We enjoyed afternoon tea in the Brethren's kitchen at the Lord Leycester Hospital where the scones can be highly recommended.

Our meeting on 12th September started on a note of sadness when Ann rang a bell in memory of two longstanding members who had passed away since we last met - Kath Mancell and Dorothy Groves.

Jane Barnes came to talk to us, on her third attempt, about the farm she helps run in Somerby, Melton Mowbray. Jane came from a dairy farming family and met her husband, Mark, through Young Farmers. Jane was a very amusing speaker and remarked that on her first visit to the farm she met the cows before Mark's parents! She clearly loves her life and expressed concern that there were 76,000 dairy farms in the 1950s and now there are 8,000. She was so pleased to see the Milk Shed as she drove through Harbury.

Jane and Mark's son, Henry, is now leading the development of the farm. He attended a farming boarding school and then agricultural college where he experienced working on two very different farms. The original farm is in the village but they have now developed a new farm on the edge of the village where they have a new shed with a 1.3 acre roof. The farm has Ayrshires and Friesians and Jane described the process of the birth and weaning of calves. As well as helping with the calves, Jane deals with the finance and office work. She also gives talks and arranges guided talks on the farm. Jane is now looking forward to having a new farmhouse on the developing farm.

The milk is used by Long Cawston Dairy where they make award winning Stilton cheese - members were able to purchase some cheese. Jane was an excellent speaker and we enjoyed her visit.

We were so pleased to welcome a good audience to the cinema on 18th September, in spite of the late change of film. The next cinema in the Village Hall is on Saturday 16th October when the film is Nomadland. Tickets can be purchased at the chemist - numbers are again limited so don't leave it too late to buy them.

We held our Harvest Supper on 24th September when members and partners ate a delicious meal provided by members; well done to Lin who organised the catering. The speaker was Duncan Nealon who described his experience on the Marathon Des Sables which he completed in 2018. This is a race across the Sahara described as the "toughest footrace on earth". Duncan described the training which took over his life and was very dependent on the

patience of his wife Lucy and children Millie and Ted. He had to carry all his equipment and food (2,000 calories per day). He kept his pack weight to 8.5kg plus 1.5kg of water. Local residents may have seen Duncan running round Deppers Bridge and Harbury; he also spent hours on a tread mill at home surrounded by heaters. When they were on the Sahara they ran five marathons on Days 1, 2, 3 and 6 also



86.2km on Day 4 when it was 50C. Duncan showed us incredible photographs and videos of an event he was determined to finish. Duncan came 424th out of 977 starters. Duncan left us with the thought "run the mile you are in" - something we've all had to do over the last 18 months.

Duncan is running the London Marathon on 3rd October raising money for meningitis research; we were pleased to donate money towards this cause.

At our next meeting on 14th October we look forward to welcoming Harbury resident Joe Greenwell talking about his year as High Sheriff of Warwickshire. Visitors and new members are most welcome.

I mentioned in a previous article that Pirie Close was named after Julia Pirie who was born in Harbury and went on to have a career working for MI5. However, whilst her father Allan Grant Pirie lived in Harbury when Julia was born; it is her Uncle James Pirie who had the greater links with Harbury and whom Pirie Close is named after. My thanks to Celia Barrett and John Holden who did their research in greater detail than me!

In April 1993 Celia Barrett published the article below on Dr James Pirie in the Harbury & Ladbroke News.

Why Pirie Close?

Dr Pirie lived at Ashton House, Harbury, and started practice here towards the end of the 19th Century. He had a surgery twice daily, but mornings only on Saturday and Sunday. He made home visits every day come hail, rain or shine. mostly driven by his chauffeur George Savage. His greatest pleasure was the St. John's Ambulance Brigade, to which he devoted a great deal of his time, and in which he held the title County Surgeon. He had an ambulance dedicated to him, but this has long gone.

For a number of years, he ran a colony near Deppers Bridge for the treatment of Tuberculosis, where the patients could be kept in isolation. It consisted of a number of shelters, some revolving, a hospital building, recreation room, kitchen, bathroom, surgery linen room, nurses' room, doctors' room, secretaries' room, stores etc. He was well known in his profession for the success he achieved in this field, having had several papers published in the Medical Journal, and received letters from all over the world regarding the success of his research and treatment of Tuberculosis.

When holidaying in Scotland, the land of his birth, he was able to render some assistance to King George V at Fochabers Castle in Morayshire. Then again later on during the King's last illness. He was decorated by the Duke of Gloucester at Holyrood Palace, Edinburgh, with the 'Order of St. John', for his work. After serving throughout the 1914-1918 war he dedicated his life to his patients. In his surgery hung this amusing little rhyme:

"The stork is a bird with a great big bill,

He brings his presents where he will.

Then comes the doctor and when he's through,

You may find he's got a big bill too."

Few people found the last line true in his case. Dr Pirie died at Harbury on 4th August 1947, and is buried in Ufton churchyard.

It is not clear when Dr Pirie came to Harbury but he is recorded as living in Ashton House in the 1901 Census. His brother Allan Grant Pirie moved to Ashton House in 1918 and his daughter Julia was born there the same year. Allan Pirie died from wounds suffered in WW1 on the 30th April 1923 and is also buried in Ufton Churchyard. On the 24th November 1923 his widow Elizabeth and the five year old Julia set sail for India and settled there.

Further details of Allan Grant Pirie are available on the Parish Council Website - WW1 Memorial Trail pages.

Julia Pirie lived in India until the outbreak of WW2 when she returned to England

and joined the Auxiliary Territorial Service. She served in France and Germany after D-Day and on leaving the forces went to be personal assistant to the Duchess of Atholl. She was at some point approached by MI5 and asked to infiltrate the UK Communist party working as a typist, eventually becoming personal assistant to the party General Secretary. She retired from active operations in the 1990s but carried on giving lectures to MI5 trainees. Up to her death in 2008 Julia continued to receive a pension from the Communist Party. As far as we are aware she did not return to Harbury.

Caught in waiting rooms

I think that I have mentioned before that developing a project of any complexity requires quite a lot of being in mental waiting rooms, waiting for legal permissions and consents, waiting for sign off, waiting for decisions. Tai Chi helps (or it might be Yoga for you). Fundraising is just one part of that but with the Harbury Future Energy EV charging station project we haven't even reached that stage yet. However, we have just ended one important and nervous wait with a long and relieved exhalation of breath. Thanks to the hard work of our Parish Clerk in completing the relevant detailed application form we now at long last have the consent of Fields in Trust to make the changes, subject, of course, to the next required permission - for Planning Consent. That will be another wait. These are important barriers to indiscriminate development, so we must respect them.

And another wait might soon be over as we wait for the Coventry Diocese decision on our plans for the church. As you will have read in reports by me and others in this magazine, it has required a high degree of faith to believe that we would ever get permission to bring modern low energy heating to our church. The Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) meet this month and there are signs that we might have a won over key critics of our plan. HEI has played its part in these discussions although the vital technical information has come from industry experts working with the church Fabric Committee.

With DAC consent we can move on to the next phase, which is fund raising. More waiting!

Catching some rays

Most of you will have seen the consultation document for the planned solar farm at Deppers Bridge. This has now gone forward to a planning application. Some time ago a couple of us had an opportunity to discuss the plans with the installation team. We were impressed by the degree of concern from the company to take an opportunity to improve habitats within the scheme area, allow footpaths, new hedging, wildflowers and bee hives. There are very few places from which the solar farm will be visible making this almost ideal. It is reasonable to be concerned about loss of agricultural land but this is not high grade land. In addition, unlike a housing development, solar installations can be removed. If we are to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels at the rate necessary to avoid serious consequences, we need this technology. I am hoping that Harbury and Deppers Bridge residents will be able to develop a longstanding and beneficial relationship with the owners of this installation.

There is another scheme, of which you may be aware, in development between the Southam/Leamington Road, the Fosse and Middle Road. This has not yet been submitted for planning. Again, two of us had an opportunity to speak online to the two companies developing this large installation. The scheme will not be without impact but we believe that it is a good (and vitally needed) project, once again focusing on environmental improvements and, as a requirement from the farmer owning the land, will allow livestock farming by raising the panels high enough for sheep to graze.

Catching attention

The experience HEI has gained since 2010 in developing successful projects has not gone unnoticed. Very recently I was invited to speak in Birmingham at the David Middleton Sustainability Conference about the work of HEI and the various separate initiatives that have since emerged from it. Also on the programme was Jonathan Porritt, rather better known than me and more likely to be part of the reason for 200 delegates attending. This month I am running some workshops on community and sustainable transport as part of a two day conference for the Warwickshire Association of Local Councillors. Parallel workshops will be run by others, including by Jacky Lawrence, a fellow Steering Group member of the Low Carbon Warwickshire Network, which was founded by HEI and which quickly led to the formation of Napton Environmental Action Team, of which Jacky is also a founding member.

If you want to be part of this active HEI team, just ask. We aren't an exclusive group and everyone is welcome. It's our collective future; we would love you to help shape it with us. In Jonathan Porritt's view, based on conclusive science, we have about ten years to make radical changes to almost every aspect of our lives in order to avoid catastrophic and irreversible changes to the global climate. We can at least work on this locally together as a community.

Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Swathes of our countryside are being concreted over for HS2 and more and more housing estates and other building projects. Think of some of the vast warehouses which are being built everywhere. Plastic 'turf' is being used increasingly frequently. Those of us who can create habitats for wildlife in our gardens and allotments have a very important role to play to help to offset the damage done by developers. Where possible try to be slightly less neat and tidy when gardening. Leave some wilder spaces for insects and small mammals to hide. Maybe have a small pond or bog garden to encourage frogs and toads which, in turn, will help control slugs. If you can replace fencing with hedging then you will be providing nesting places for birds. I think

there are fewer moths than there used to be. Insect 'splat' on windscreens seems to be a thing of the past.



In the meantime......rather than 'put the garden to bed for the winter' (cutting everything down, vigorously tidying up), try leaving some stems and autumn leaves for wildlife to have a place to shelter or hibernate for the winter.

Consider having a wildflower border next year, it can attract a wide range of creatures and you will have pretty flowers too. Win, win.

Nature Notes

Llangollen, Corwen, Betwys-y-Coed. Those familiar small towns along the A5, on the line of Thomas Telford's road to Holyhead and the boat to Ireland. Leaving England's motorway network and crossing Offa's Dyke slows everyone down. The road goes through Capel Curig past the cloud shrouded flanks of Tryfan before few miles beside Llyn Ogwen and the descent through slate country around Bethesda. Then come glimpses of the sea and the

Britannia bridge across the Menai Strait shared by road and rail. Sharon and I were travelling to Anglesey (Ynys Mon in Welsh), to spend a few days with friends near Pentraeth on Red Wharf Bay and soak up some autumn sunshine. Many times, in younger days, we had come to the mountains of Snowdonia often as hitch hikers when that pursuit seemed a natural way to get about. Now, those 'blue remembered hills' were a backdrop rather than a goal.

We explored the National Nature Reserve of Newborough Warren planted in 1947 with drought resistant Corsican Pines to stabilise the



sand dunes. A search revealed Wild Pansies which flower from April to November in grassy and bare places and in particular amongst sand dunes. Red squirrels make their home here pushed to the edges by the Greys. We saw several ravens including a youngster. The pines provide a perfect roosting site for these gregarious birds. Some of you may have seen the area on the BBC programme 'Winterwatch' which featured hundreds of ravens performing their aerial acrobatics.

During the winter, non-breeding immature birds form temporary night-time roosts. Having arrived from all parts of the compass (Ireland being only an hour's flight away for instance) the roost becomes an information centre on the location of food sources such as carcasses.

We were struck by the amount of Large-flowered Evening Primrose (Oenothera glazoviana), a tall biennial with poppy-like yellow flowers. Introduced from North America in the 17th century, it is now a naturalised plant on waste ground and particularly on sandy soil. It is a member of the Willowherb family. Their seeds are the source of evening primrose oil which is widely used in complimentary medicine as a source of gamma linoleic acid. Flowers open in the evening and close during the day thus attracting night-flying moths.



Our aim had been to reach Llandwyn Island which is really a rocky peninsula subject to the tides. We had not done our homework so getting to the ruined church and the lighthouse required waist high wading. Consequently, we watched younger folk make the crossing and looked at the buildings from afar.

Large areas of our coastline, particularly in the south-west were saved from development when the National Trust launched Enterprise Neptune and raised funds to buy extensive areas for the nation in the 1960s. the freedom to roam along large tracts of our coast, enjoy unimpeded views and take in lungfuls of clean air had to be fought for and still requires vigilance.

I can thoroughly recommend Ladbroke's Village Trail leaflet. It includes a map, superb photographs and information on the history of the village. It is available from Harbury Library.

Recently, we have had some much-needed rain. Crops have been gathered in and the land has been ploughed. Leaves are falling apace as Autumn advances.


This year is the Legion's 100th Anniversary year. On Sunday 15th May 1921, a small group of ex-Servicemen and representatives from four organisations, The National Association of Discharged Sailors and Soldiers, The British

National Federation of Discharged and Demobilized Sailors and Soldiers, The Comrades of The Great War and The Officers' Association walked to the Cenotaph, in London's Whitehall. As Big Ben struck nine, the four men representing the organisations laid a wreath with the badges of the four organisations that would officially unite to form the British Legion.

The following day the constitution was presented to and agreed by 700 delegates at the Unity Conference in London. The then Prince of Wales was also invited to become the British Legion's first Patron, whist Earl Haig was appointed as the British Legion's first President and Sir Frederick Lister the National Chairman.

The British Legion was founded by and for Armed Forces personnel and as a demonstration of its attitude towards its members the constitution was proposed by a soldier and seconded by a General - there would be no distinction between rank, religion or political affiliation.

Today, RBL is the country's largest Armed Forces charity with 235,000 members, 110,000 volunteers and a network of partners giving support to former military personal and their families. RBL either directly or indirectly, through its partner charities, runs programmes of rehabilitation and adaptation to civilian life, provides dementia care homes and gives advice on housing and legal issues. It provides support for carers, help for



independent living for ex-serving personal and much more.

The RBL still needs your help in 2021 as it recovers from the challenges of fundraising during the pandemic.

We are confident that Harbury, Ufton and Chesterton will be able to support the Legion as generously as in the past and we will be working hard to make this year's appeal a success.

From your District Councillor

Good day everyone!

I hope that I find you in good spirits and life is settling back into some normality.

Despite all the restrictions on meetings etc imposed by Covid I want to share with you that I am still involved in many pieces of work around Harbury - matters include Orbit, Highways, Road closures and HS2 to name a few. The most enjoyable bit for me is supporting residents with difficulties and most recently an elderly gentleman with issues around heating and hot water.

I am one of the Councillors in the group known as the Gang of Six. We work together with MP Jeremy Wright dealing with HS2. I know it has been a difficult time for many with the disruption caused, and continuing to be caused, by the HS2 work, but can I say collectively and individually we have made significant improvements by challenging HS2. It may not feel like much from your experience I know, but I can assure you it could have been worse! Traffic levels on roads around the village are now getting back to normal with the reopening of the Southam to Leamington Road and hopefully now things will settle down.

2015! No, it's not a typing error. I am now very hopeful of fulfilling one of my campaign promises from 2015, that traffic lights will be put in at Harbury Lane/Fosse junction to make it safer for all. In recent months there appears to have been a significant increase in traffic travelling down the Fosse despite the working from home at JLR. I have been able to do this as I obtained the money through the S106 house build currently underway in Upper Lighthorne Parish, previously known as Lighthorne Heath. The legal process and triggers from house building numbers, make it slow progress, but we are getting there and then I will be chasing Warwickshire County Council to commence work. So, watch this space for a date!

Speaking of roads can I remind everyone that the gated road at Chesterton will be closed soon, again slow progress due to the S106 process, but it is progressing. I know walkers and cyclists have an interest in this, you will still be able to use the road it will only be closed to mechanical vehicles.

Butt Lane/Bush Heath Road - Road Safety Campaign Update Do you live in or close to Butt Lane or Bush Heath Road, Harbury?

Do you use this route to walk your children to school or access the village, or perhaps you are a local walker, equestrian, motorist or cyclist?

We would be so grateful for your support NOW.

A group of residents is leading a campaign to:

- Reduce the speed limit along this route (and the section of the B4452 within the village boundary) to 30 mph; and
- Install traffic calming measures to reduce risk, noise and ultimately increase safety for all road users.

On 21st June 2021, a number of residents met on the Green at Queens Close to discuss the road safety and traffic issue which has become increasingly concerning over the last couple of years. The current speed limit in Butt Lane and the sections of Bush Heath Road and the B4452 that are within the village boundary is set at 40 mph, and this is rarely now respected by the increasing volume of traffic.

There have been a number of 'near misses' for road users and many of them now feel very fearful about using the route because safety is being compromised by speeding traffic and the volume of HGV traffic. Equestrians based at the livery yards in the area now avoid using the route and there have been many more (than usual) animal fatalities (i.e. pet cats).

This issue has been exacerbated by many local diversions caused by the increasing number of road works in surrounding villages and HS2 road closures etc. The route has become a throughfare for commuter traffic to JLR/AML and what used to be a sleepy country lane used mainly by villagers to gain access to Harbury village centre, and the surrounding countryside is now effectively a fast ring road. The current road signage is simply not persuading drivers to slow down from the 60mph national speed limit allowed on the section of Bush Heath Road outside the village boundary to the current 40mph limit.

In addition, a planning consent (approved by Warwickshire County Council and Stratford District Council and, unfortunately, not opposed or commented upon by Harbury Parish Council) for a development at Bishops Bowl Lakes, which remains in place until 2023, has greatly increased the number of HGVs using the route. Before planning consent was granted, there was no consultation in relation to the planning application with the residents or users of this route and now there is a daily stream of HGVs delivering inert material to Bishops Bowl to infill certain of the lakes to improve or facilitate their use as a fishery. These HGVs, running at rates which can exceed 100 vehicle movements per day, often start using the route from 7am each day and continue throughout the day, sadly causing pollution and noise and represent a danger to pedestrians and other road users.

Residents have expressed concern that, with the increasing number of developments going on across the County and the ongoing Bishops Bowl Lakes project, this volume of traffic will only increase as HS2 and other developments gather pace.

There has also been feedback from equestrians, walkers and cyclists who have all experienced 'near misses' where the speed of traffic or indeed the type of dense traffic use is making the route very hazardous for them. With existing T-junctions onto the route and no walkway for cyclists/walkers or

horse riders, the risk of safety-related incidents occurring has greatly increased. It is just a matter of time before accidents happen.

This issue has been on the radar for some time but sadly no action to help address it has yet been taken. Until now, we hope. A number of residents attended the June Harbury Parish Council Meeting to express their concern and ask for support. In addition, residents' meetings were held with the Road Safety Liaison Officer from Warwickshire County Council and the local Police have been contacted.

In August an online meeting was held, attended by some of the residents and it was agreed that we needed to galvanise support for this important issue for Harbury as a whole as well as for the residents who reside close to the route. As a group we are passionate about reducing the risk for all users of the route and we do not believe it should take a serious accident to happen before any action is taken. From research we know that other villages such as Bishops Itchington, Deppers Bridge and Gaydon have all been successful in achieving traffic calming measures to help reduce the risk of accidents for users. We believe it is only fair that Harbury is also given the same priority and support.

- a. Lobbying the Parish Council to ask for funding of a feasibility study of the route to be undertaken by Warwickshire County Council in order to obtain a clear understanding of the various traffic calming solutions available for the route:
- b. Determining how the options might be funded;
- c. Making connections with and obtaining the support of Warwickshire Police (via Southam Safer Neighbourhood Team); and
- d. Investigating the feasibility of setting up a Volunteer Community Speed Watch Group along the route.

Southam Has a New Market!

A new indoor market with the theme 'Shop Local' will take place in Southam on the third Saturday of the month. The first market will be on 20th November and the venue is the Grange Hall on Coventry Road. It is being organised by volunteers from Southam First, with Southam WI providing the refreshments.

Although Southam is an ancient market town, and was awarded its market charter nearly 800 years ago, its weekly Tuesday market ceased in early 2020 and there are currently no plans to revive it. However, inspired by the popularity of indoor markets in nearby villages, Southam First's volunteers are arranging for a new monthly indoor market to take place on Saturdays from 10am to 12.30pm.

The organisers hope to attract visitors from both Southam and the surrounding villages, and aim to provide a wide range of goods for sale, including food and drink, home and garden wares, gifts, crafts and clothes, emphasising local producers and retailers. Alongside the stalls, the market will also be a showcase for Southam's shops and services, with space for them to display their publicity material.

There has been a very enthusiastic response to the idea of a Saturday market. The volunteers believe that the experience of lockdown helped people to rediscover the importance of community and supporting local producers. They are confident that the market will be very popular. Holding the market on a Saturday morning will ensure that those who are not available on weekdays will also be able to go.

The dates for the first four markets are: 20th November, 18th December, 19th February and 19th March. (There will be no market in January 2022 because the Hall has a prior booking.) If the market proves to be popular with both stallholders and customers, then it will continue indefinitely on the third Saturday of every month.



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
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
