

A Big Step Forward

The Fabric Committee of All Saints Church Harbury are delighted to report substantial progress with the Coventry Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC). On 7th July the Consistory Court of The Diocese of

Coventry issued a Faculty (the equivalent of planning permission) to upgrade the heating, lighting, rewiring, and audio visual equipment in the church and Tom Hauley Room. Repairs to the external stonework have not yet been approved, but this is a real breakthrough, and thanks are due especially to Philip Mayer and John Guilford for their determination.

The Fabric Committee's options appraisal is well documented in the faculty application. It led them to conclude that ceiling mounted radiant panels are the best way of warming the congregation. It is a mature technology that has been around for more than a hundred years and a proven way of making large buildings more comfortable and more energy efficient.

The Church Building Council had recommended the Fabric Committee visit St Mary's, Chalgrove in the Oxford Diocese with advisers from Coventry Diocese. The installation of ceiling radiant panels there was approved by Geraldine O'Farrell, Senior Building Services Engineer at Historic England and National Advisor on Building Services to the heritage sector. The heating installation in St Mary's church is recommended as a case study by the Cathedral and Church Building Division of the Church Building Council.

All Saints' current energy tariff under the Parish Buying Energy Basket is electricity at 15.4p per kWhr and gas at 2.1p per kWhr (electricity being more expensive by a factor of 7.33). It is likely that by 2030 at least 20% of the national gas supply will be "green" hydrogen and/or "green" gas and we have selected boilers that will be ready for this change.

Our proposals align with the recent announcement by The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, that the Church of England has pledged to become Carbon Neutral by 2030 and will dedicate £190M of its funding over the next nine years to achieve its environmental targets.

Now the Faculty has been issued the project moves into fundraising mode and numerous grant applications will be submitted. The current budget is around $\pounds400,000$, and thanks to the generosity of donors in the village and beyond, we have around a £130,000 on account towards this increasing project cost. Another appeal and more fundraising will be needed.

But we hope to be warm again this winter!





On a sunny afternoon, 14 of us enjoyed a lovely trip to Newbold Pacey. We were greeted and informed by an enthusiastic and well informed guide. Her family had lived locally for several generations so she had lots of info about the church and the area. Newbold is a not uncommon name in the area but the Pacey denotes the name of the Lords of the Manor for many years. It was a thriving estate village but population drift has reduced its size considerably. It was believed that plague could not cross water so there was a migration across a stream to nearby Ashorne which is now much bigger! The Church suffered a disastrous fire in the late 1800s but was rebuilt in quite an elaborate style, including a beautifully carved reredos by the Bromsgrove Guild.

We then carried on to the Pavilion Café at Lighthorne where we were restored by drinks and extremely yummy cakes.

We do not meet in August but are invited to join Southam branch to mark our founder, on Mary Sumner's Day on 9th August. This will be at the new Hub at Galanos House - more cake! - between 2 and 4pm. Cost £7.50. Let Chris know if you want to go and we will sort out lifts.

We wish you a happy summer, enjoy the sunshine but keep cool.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL

Official minutes can be viewed on the noticeboard by The Bell Inn or on the parish council website.

May Meeting

The May meeting of our parish council was rescheduled from its original date to be quorate. I wasn't there on the night, but reading the hard copy of the documents on the noticeboard by the pub I have a fair idea of what happened.

They were still low on numbers, with just three of our five parish councillors present. With Cllr Batty in the chair, they first discussed the other items on the AGM agenda, proposing to continue having Parish Council meetings on the second Wednesday of alternate months: July, Sept and Nov 2022, Jan, March, May and July 2023 and working through various annual formalities. Then it was on to the agenda for the regular meeting.

Official Minutes - The clerk agreed to make the draft minutes available by the 1st of the following month, following criticism from residents that the draft minutes were not

available on the noticeboard and they had to rely on the Harbury and Ladbroke News report. The official minutes are brief, predominantly recording decisions whereas the report in the magazine gives a resident's perception of the meeting which is not checked by the clerk or councillors. Residents are encouraged to contact councillors or the clerk if they have a query and/or to attend the meetings.

Foul sewer from Ladbroke Hall - no further issues had been reported. If there are in future they should be reported to Severn Trent with the 'what 3 words' reference to locate the exact position.

SDC - The merger of Stratford and Warwick District Councils had not gone ahead as SDC would have brought debts of £1.5M and WDC £8M, so SDC residents would have had to contribute to paying off WDC debts. Some joint working will continue - legal services and refuse/recycling.

WCC - It was too expensive to roll out "20's plenty" across the county. Each councillor has their own highways budget but this is limited and decisions for "20's plenty" signage are based on evidence of persistant speeding and accident rates. Cllr Kettle also advised that WCC would not be installing, supporting or repairing vehicle activated speed signs, as the cost was too high.

Planning - the proposal at Brock Farm stud had been withdrawn but see July report for a new application. Cllrs had made no representation on tree works at the Paddocks, felling of a field maple at the Croft nor on listed building consent for installation of the fibre optic cable at Ladbroke Hall for superfast broadband and all three applications had been approved subsequently.

HS2 - There had been notification of June road closures for surveys. Concerns about signage relating to diversions would be passed on to HS2.

July Meeting

Admin aspects - Proposers and seconders are no longer required for resolutions. Actions will be documented in future minutes. WALC had advised that there is no legal requirement to record reasons for absence. Cllr Batty will remain chairman until the next election. Cllr Morten will be standing down at the next election.

Motorbike noise - It's true that the A423 is like part of the TT circuit! (So, no surprise to me that some motorcyclists like to get the full effect by speeding and/or, having passed its MOT, down-tuning the silencer on their bike). A villager is communicating with Jeremy Wright about this ongoing issue. Cllr Kettle (WCC) said noise cameras are being trialled elsewhere and we could express interest in being a test site.

Parking at School Lane/Banbury Road Junction - although this does reduce speed and some house owners have no off-street alternative, parking here makes the junction very difficult for large vehicles and hinders visibility. There is no WCC money for yellow lines; it would cost £2,600 for legal aspects plus the actual cost for painting the lines if the community wanted to finance it. Since it is illegal to park within 10m of a junction, it's a traffic offence, i.e. a police matter.

SDC & WCC - New Waste Collection Rota - Villagers should have received a letter with the corrected rota, Ladbroke is still Friday but check carefully for which bins

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each week. If anyone has not yet had their food waste caddy contact streetscene at SDC (tel 01789 260123 or email streetscene@stratford-dc.gov.uk).

Boundary Changes - in May 2023 Ladbroke will move to Harbury ward. Most if not all other villages represented by Cllr Rock will become part of an enlarged ward which will include Bishop's Itchington and retain Chapel Ascote, Hodnell and Wills Pastures.

HS2 - There had been some traffic problems as roads were closed e.g. many vehicles coming through Ladbroke at night and HGVs in the middle of Southam. Cllr Rock has requested a global review of signage, even if well intended does anyone check it's done correctly? In some places people are apparently changing signs to cause disruption and get HS2 blamed for the consequences.

Potential "self-build" development in Windmill Lane - SDC's self-build policy does not change Ladbroke's categorisation that there is insufficient infrastructure for significant developments so the Parish Council will not support any survey of villagers or other approach from Langstrom. If any individual owner wished to put in a planning application that would follow the normal process.

Speeding - Ladbroke has an insufficient accident record to get funds in the current round of HS2 money for traffic measures. There will be later rounds but decisions are based on accidents not perceived danger. Cllr Kettle has his own delegated highways budget (for works in 12 villages this council year). The Parish Council told him they would like chevrons, repainted slow signs on the road and white gates on the verge.

Planning - The council would make no representation for works at Rectory Farm Cottage and supported the new submission for an equestrian worker's cottage at Brock Farm Stud. They would make no response to the Site Allocation Plan.

New Parish Council Website - the clerk said this was now live (though I personally haven't been able to find it yet). As there is no longer an active village website, it was recommended that the various separate ones: Ladbroke Parish Council, Ladbroke Church, Ladbroke Heritage etc, give links to the others.

Other matters - a grant of £460 to Ladbroke Matters for Jubilee entertainment expenses was approved. All three sections of the noticeboard by the pub will be locked and for Parish Council use only as there are so many pages of information to display, the board by the Millenium Green will continue to be for general use. 150 copies of the updated Village History booklet will be printed.

Village Meeting - Even though it's not a legal requirement, pre-Covid the Parish Council co-ordinated an annual meeting when all village organisations shared what's been going on and other topics were discussed. The clerk will not be involved but Cllr Neal will invite representatives from each organisation and the Parish Council will raise the need for new councillors to come forward; apparently if we are not quorate, SDC will send in voting representatives.

Next meetings: Parish Council: Wed 14th September, 7.45pm, **Village Meeting:** Wed 26th October, 7.30pm (note earlier start).





The speaker for our July meeting on the 12th was Anne Langley who is the secretary of Stretton on Dunsmore History Society and an author of various historical books.

Anne's Great Grandfather had been an engineer, pioneering the building of railways in India and Japan. The letters he wrote home to his mother formed the basis of Anne's talk.

Born in 1843, William Potter trained as an engineer and, after working on the railways in England, he went out to Madras in 1869. There were interesting details of his voyage there, including playing croquet on deck, seeing hand woven silks at a market in Alexandria and taking a steam ship down the Suez Canal. He also played and tuned the piano on board so he was a man of many talents.

From 1869 - 1873, as well as building railways in Madras and Bombay, he also went snipe shooting and on a crocodile hunt. However, after infected mosquito bites and heat stroke he decided the climate was not suited to his constitution and returned to England and thence to Japan. In 1868 there were no railways as the regime thought they were a sign of Western decadence but new а government started to modernise Japan and, as there was no local expertise, most of the staff were British. William had the iob of surveying the land which was mountainous and prone to earthquakes.



However, many lines were opened by 1877 and he returned to England with many artefacts from his time there including netsukes and Hiroshige wood block prints some of which were still in the family and formed part of this well illustrated talk.

The August outing is to the National Arboretum and the September meeting will be held on Tuesday 13th where we will hear a talk about Hill Close Gardens. New members always welcome.







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

LADBROKE VILLAGE HALL MILLENNIUM DRAW FOR JUNE 2022

Repairs

The lychgate was almost the last of the repairs we can do with 66% of the funding coming from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the very last one involves the cracks





New Waste Collection Arrangements

As previously reported, there have been some concerns that an incorrect collection calendar may have been sent out for the new system starting in August. In many places a new or duplicate calendar has been posted out to make sure. There is a full page spread in the council's 'View' magazine (which everyone should have had now) explaining the system. The main feature of the revised arrangements is the added weekly food/kitchen waste collection in the new caddy and the switch to three weekly collection for the general waste. Recycling collections are still two weekly.

I made sure that the special case of stoma and colostomy patients was discussed at the full council meeting this month and hope that the administration will be looking at this tricky problem, together with that of disposable nappies.

HS2 Roadworks & Traffic

Diversions and roadworks are likely to be a feature over the whole area for many years. I regret to say that the systems for dealing with this are, in my view, in need of improvement. Also we still are having problems with HS2 traffic using unapproved routes through villages. I continue to pursue HS2 and their contractors to improve how these matters are dealt with.

Large Solar Arrays

I have asked if the Council can investigate innovative ways of encouraging the use of appropriate buildings with large roofs for energy generation. The Council has a Climate Change Panel and it would seem a useful area of work if buildings such as large barns and warehouses across the district might be promoted for this purpose. Correctly done, the cumulative effect of many such installation (and we already have some locally) could be very valuable. I would be pleased to receive comments on this idea.

Could you be a Councillor?

The boundary review is expected to be confirmed shortly. The effect of this is to add a few extra district council seats to revised representative areas. I would be pleased to talk to anyone thinking of contributing to the work for communities by becoming a candidate next May, or enquiring about how the system works across the wider area.

June 2022 Meeting Report

Organisations: - **Schools:** Ex-Councillor Gibb had been successful in securing Section 106 money from the County Council for upgrading work for the Primary School. An old "block" at Southam School had been demolished as part of their extensive rebuilding work.

Village Hall: David Gimson, a relatively new member, is now the Hall's Secretary. A \pounds 1000 has been spent on the drains at the Hall and it was hoped that this would be a solution to recent problems. When there were two to three thousand people on Bonfire Night, there were not enough toilets for such a large number.

Energy Initiative: Councillor Julie Balch had been pleased with the attendance at the Energy Initiative stall at the Eco Fair on Carnival Day.

Roads: Chairman Tim Lockley reported that the work at the Bendigo Mitchel crossroads was "out for tender" but said it was unclear how long it would be before work started there. It had been reported to him that HS2's road diversion signs were being left in place after work had been completed, and this was causing hold-ups for motorists.

Planning: The Council had no problem with the proposed rear extension at 10 Pineham Avenue. However, there was serious concern about a proposal for "Green Field Development" along Bull Ring Farm Road, where it was proposed to have eight self-build "cottages" erected there.

Bull Ring Farm Road is part of the County's Centenary Way Walk. Councillors said that access to the proposed site would be difficult because the road was very narrow, with only room for single vehicles. County Council Highways was reported to have made an objection to this proposed development. Our Councillors had concerns

about the potential of up to 16 vehicles trying to use the road which they believed could not be widened sufficiently to be made safe. They remarked that at present the bin lorry always backed down the road as there was no way to turn around.

They also pointed out that much would need to be done to improve the sewerage system. In the last 25 years there had been no major sewage improvement works and effluent has had to be pumped down to Deppers Bridge.

The Proposers said they were working with a "Transport Consultant" and would be able to deal with the problem of access for refuse vehicles going into and out of the proposed estate. Construction vehicles would have to keep to a specific plan to comply with the Highways Acts. Difficulties would be short-term.

Councillors explained that the proposed development did not match Harbury's Local Plan. It did not enhance the Conservation Area or the Listed Buildings close to the site. They thought that the self-build idea would complicate the scene. The Proposers had not demonstrated a local need for these dwellings. There seemed not to have been any analysis of local housing needs.

Chairman Tim Lockley said the Council wished to protect the Conservation Area. He said there were major grounds for objection: - the proposal could lead to more building at a later date; there was no evidence of local need; there would be Highways problems; it would impact on the Conservation Area and nearby Listed Buildings, and the entire site was outside the "Built Up Area Boundary". The Parish Council would object to the development.

Village Tree Planting: The budget for tree planting is to be re-evaluated. There had been no adverse comments at the Carnival on the project and Facebook comments were also positive. The Council would talk to residents about seven sites within the village where trees could be planted. More trees would be planted on the verges up to the Mound on Bush Heath Lane. The Pre-School would seek advice from Colin Sheasby on where to plant their trees.

Bush Heath Road: There was no update on plans to reduce the speed limit on this road.

Properties: Steve Ekins would organise repairs to the car park bollard. Memorial bulbs will be planted on the Old New Inn Green.

Climate Change: Cllr Balch thanked everyone for their efforts at the Carnival and reported on where the children planted sunflowers. Forty-five people answered a questionnaire focusing on what they wanted and how homes could be made more sustainable. There was interest on the use of air-source heating.

Reports: Cllr Julie Balch asked for more people to help take down the bunting.

Cllrs said that to obtain a crime number, residents should report the youths who have been driving round the car park on 101.

As the Harbury Society visit to the Buffalo Farm at Napton has been postponed due to the unprecedented heatwave, hopefully you'll find the article replacing that report of interest.

The publication 'Hungry' Harbury was produced by the Harbury Society in 1980 and it gives a comprehensive history of Harbury through the ages. What follows is a very brief outline of some of the subjects covered in the book.

Why is there a village here?

When the glaciers melted after the last ice age they left a thin coating of clay and gravels spread on the older resistant limestone rocks of the Lower Lias series. The unusual combination of a hill-top location and a good water supply made the area attractive to incoming settlers.

The Bronze Age

Bronze Age cooking pits, discovered at Sharmer Farm, have been carbon-dated at 1400 BC, providing the earliest evidence of human presence in Harbury.

The Iron Age

The Iron Age people sought good defensive sites and it is rumoured that Hereburgh, an Iron Age noblewoman, settled here with her tribe sometime between 600 and 300 BC. The name Harbury is a relatively recent contraction of Herberbury – the camp or fortified settlement of the people of Hereburgh.

The Romans

The Romans have left little impression on the village of Harbury. The Fosse Way was a military road, built around 72 AD, that ran between Exeter and Lincoln. It forms the western boundary of today's parish.

The Anglo-Saxons

The Saxons came from the north and east, probably following the Fosse Way, and settled here. They cleared the forest and carved out communal fields. Farming was on the three-field system, one field for wheat, one for barley, and one field fallow. The crops were rotated each year to allow the land to recover its fertility. Animals were pastured on the fallow field, on the commons and on the other open fields after harvest.

The three large open fields were ploughed by the village as a whole. The system of ploughing produced an undulating surface known as ridge and furrow. Saxon farmers owned strips scattered about the three fields; this gave them both good and bad land and they also had grazing rights to the common and the heathland to the south.

The Normans

The Norman Conquest brought social and political changes and especially changes in the system of land tenure in Britain as William I rewarded his followers with grants

of land. As a result, the parish lands of Harbury were divided up and given to his supporters.

The Middle Ages

Once it was established, Harbury continued to exist as a settlement despite adversity. It was fortunate in neither being decimated by the Black Death nor depopulated in favour of sheep farming and it formed a pool of labour for the surrounding countryside. Although blessed with a good water supply and a numerically stable population, the land was poor, and Harbury was never a prosperous village. Nevertheless, it continued to grow slowly, moving westwards as more and more land was taken into cultivation, until the Parish boundaries were reached, after which time the common land was gradually encroached upon.

The earliest stone building in the village is the Church, parts of which date from the late 13th century. One of the oldest surviving buildings in Harbury is the timber framed cottage in High Street.

The 17th Century

Harbury was a poor village, the soil was not productive and its inhabitants suffered hardships and, as a result, the village was known as 'Hungry Harbury' but there were still feasts and festivals, fairs and other recreations. Fairs were held on the Pound Green, while sales and other market activities took place at the Bull Ring. One of the earliest stone houses was the Wagstaffe School, founded in 1611 by Thomas Wagstaffe on a site to the north of the church.

The 18th Century

By the 18th century the pressure on the land was greater, the forests had been cleared and all available land brought into cultivation. It was not until 1779 that the open fields of Harbury were enclosed by the Parliamentary Commissioners, who redistributed the village lands. Enclosure had come late to Harbury which was of economic benefit to small landowners who were able to hire themselves out to the wealthier, larger landowners of the surrounding enclosed parishes.

The 19th Century

Work on the Oxford to Birmingham branch of the Great Western Railway began in 1847, the eminent civil engineer, Isambard Kingdom Brunel, was the chief engineer, and the line was opened in 1852. Harbury Cutting, half a mile long and 110 feet deep, was the deepest cutting in the world at that time. The work was hard and dangerous, one of the most hazardous elements being the removal of the spoil from the bottom of the cutting.

The Co-operative Movement

Around 1863 the brothers George and Enoch Bustin, who worked in the quarry and Jabez Bustin, who was employed on the railway, opened the Co-operative, Industrial and Provident Society shop in Mill Street, in a stone cottage next to Chesterton Farm. Initially the shop was only open after they finished work and it was one of the earliest Co-ops in Warwickshire. The Co-op flourished and amassed enough capital to purchase its own premises.

The 20th and 21st Centuries



Many organisations and societies flourished in Harbury prior to the First World War and there were several social events in the year. Fairs were held on both the Pound and the Old New Inn greens. The Shakespeare Fete, celebrating the playwright not the inn, was held off Middle Road. The Transport and General Workers Union Fete was held at Harbury House with races being held in the field at Butt Lane.

Services and Development

During the interwar period there was little private building, although council houses were erected in the 1920s and 1930s. The possibility of installing a piped water supply was first discussed in 1919, but schemes were rejected as too expensive and 'unnecessary', so that it wasn't until 1939 that houses in Harbury had their first piped water system. A sewage system was installed in the late 1950s which led to an increase in housing development and population. A new school and village hall were opened to serve this new community.

Our local canals formed a route from Warwick to London in the early 1800s. It was much cheaper to transport heavy goods such as coal and grain by canal than over very rough roads. The canals fell into disrepair with the coming of railways in the 1830s, although boats continued to trade into the 20th century. The decline was arrested by Tom Rolt who led a successful campaign for their restoration. Trevor is an excellent speaker with very good photographs.

As I write this, we are looking forward to running a stall at Harbury School on 16th July, having a WI group garden party on 23rd July, outdoor games at the village hall on 21st July and our own Garden Party in August. The programme for events in 2023 is in hand, and we welcome any women who'd like to be part of our WI life.

Pesky Plastic

I don't know how many of you took part in the Big Plastic Count week. We did and were not a little surprised at how many miscellaneous small bits of plastic passed through the house despite our fairly determined efforts to reduce plastic use. Some of these may have been peel off thin film plastic pot covers or plastic screw caps from Tetrapaks or similar barely noticeable and ephemeral items. They add up.

The results of the week of the survey come from 250,000 participants. From these the organisers are able to extrapolate that UK households throw away at least 96.6

billion pieces of plastic a year. Add in industrial use and you have a figure even more unpalatable.

Harbury residents are good recyclers, strongly supported by Jessica Dominick's Harbury Environmental Group. The uncomfortable fact, however, is that only a small fraction of the plastic entering our houses is actually recycled. The rest is dumped abroad, burnt or goes to landfill. The only way to stop this dreadful abuse of the environment is massively to reduce plastic entering the waste stream. The best way to reduce waste is not to create it in the first place. As individuals we can only do so much. It has to be down to businesses and government to make the big moves. HEI does not lobby - but you can.

Let there be light - and heat

HEI has been supporting the church in its determination to bring modern low carbon solutions to the heating and lighting replacements desperately needed before this winter. We are delighted to hear, therefore, that not only has the church finally been granted permission to complete the work but also that the new Chair of the Diocesan Advisory Committee that make the decisions feels that our solutions should be applied across the Diocese.

That's not the end of the story, however, as there is just a small matter of raising the rest of the substantial sum to pay for the work. Several people are working on it to add to the generous donations from the village so far.

Powerful Funds

Talking of fundraising, I have bunged in a couple more small funding bids for village energy related projects. Through Harbury e-Wheels affinity relationship with Younity, a collaboration between Octopus Energy and Midcounties Cooperative that sets out to support community energy, we are able to apply to the Powering Communities Fund. The grants offered are up to £3,000 and it is a competitive process judged by an external panel. We have submitted two bids.

The first is for an energy monitoring display for the school similar to the one in the library foyer. The solar panels on the school roof are well above the sight line of the children - and probably out of mind too. A monitor would help to make it 'real', showing them energy as it is being generated from the sun and how it accumulates over time.

The second is for the Scout hut. There are major retrofit plans for this poorly insulated, cold building with some funding already in place. This bid, composed by 1st Harbury Scouts, is requesting a small contribution to all their plans.

We will hear the results this month. Competition will be strong so I am making no predictions on the outcome.

Also, this month we should hear the result of our bid through Warwickshire County Council to the government's Low Emission Vehicle Infrastructure (LEVI) Fund for the Harbury Future Energy EV charging station project. A great deal hinges on this so the HFE team may look a little stressed this month.

Ted's Tech Trawl

Last month we looked at Riversimple's hydrogen powered car. This month another very unique car comes to mind, an electric one that can partly charge itself whilst parked in the sunshine on your drive. This car comes from an idea started by three

young friends in a garage in Munich, Germany in 2016. It has solar panels embedded in its plastic body, which on average over a year have generated enough energy for around 75 miles a week, on a good sunny day enough for up to 20 miles - all for free!

On a full battery charged from the mains it has a range of 160 miles. When plugged into a home charge point it can provide power to the home, it can put power into another electric car and can be used for power on a camping holiday. It even has a trailer drawbar, unusual on electric cars. In addition, DIY is back for those who like home mechanics; many standard parts you can change yourself.

It is shortly going into production at the Saab factory in Finland, priced at around $\pm 29,000$.

The company is called Sono Motors, the car is named Sion and, as with Henry Ford's first car, it is only available in black.

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


WEDNESDAY WALKERS



SOUTHAM HERITAGE COLLECTION -

Southam Heritage Collection presents its latest free exhibition in Tithe Place, Southam, the "Southam Timeline". Open on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday mornings between 10am and 12 noon, it is a timeline through nearly 2,000 years of Southam's history.

The wall posters start in the Roman era, touch on how and why the town developed in the way it did, to come a full circle into the 21st century when Tithe Place was built over the remnants of a Roman boundary ditch. Follow the important dates in Southam's history such as when the land belonged to Lady Godiva's husband to be given to the Coventry Monks, through becoming a town when it was given its market charter in 1227, how the 17th century Civil War affected the people, when a major fire in 1742 burnt most of the town centre down resulting in major rebuilds in the Georgian style, how the cement industry started, to WW1, WW2, and on to the present day.

Look at our display cabinets and see if the children can recognise any of the items, or even if you do! There are various publications on different periods of life in the town, as late as Southam Zoo, with two different window displays on Roman Archaeology found on the Flying Fields new housing estate and the 1914 Southam Flower Show which was held at the start of the Great War.

Upgrading Landlines to Digital Technology - What You Need to Know

The technology that we use to make landline phone calls is due to be upgraded over the next few years but what does this mean for you as a landline customer?

Traditionally, landline phone calls have been delivered over the old 'copper' telephone network known as the Public Switched Telephone Network (PSTN). However, the equipment used in the PSTN was developed and installed in the 1980s and is becoming harder and increasingly more expensive to maintain. BT has therefore taken the decision to retire the PSTN by the end of December 2025.

Telecoms providers have been investing heavily in new systems and infrastructure networks such as full fibre, which means that in the future, landline calls can be delivered via digital technology called Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), which uses a broadband connection.

Your landline provider will contact you well in advance of when the process to start migrating your old landline to your new telephone service will apply to you and your property.

Once a home service is moved from PSTN to VoIP, the phone will generally work in the same way as it always has, but it will need to be plugged into a broadband router instead of into the phone socket on your wall. If you need any new equipment - e.g. a new router, your provider should sort this out for you.



This change from PSTN to VoIP will affect other devices that rely on a

phone line - such as some fire and burglar alarm systems and telecare devices. It is therefore important that you mention those devices to your provider and check if they

need to be replaced or reconfigured in order to continue working when they notify you that your service is to be migrated.

Once the PSTN is switched off, if you wish to continue having a landline phone, but don't already have broadband or don't use a broadband service, you will generally still need to have a suitable connection. Ofcom expects that providers will have a range of options for people in this situation.

However, as VoIP services will operate successfully on broadband connections of less than 1Mbps, customers should not be forced to take out a high-speed broadband package if they do not want to.

One issue with VoIP that has raised concerns with residents is what happens during a power cut at your property? A phone connected to a broadband router wouldn't work as it gets its power from the property's mains electricity supply. So what if you needed to call the emergency services?

If you rely on your landline - for example, you don't have a mobile phone, are unable to use a mobile phone or you don't have a mobile signal inside your home - your ISP must make sure that you are able to contact the emergency services in the event of a power cut. This could be in the form of battery back-up so that your landline will continue to work for the minimum of at least one hour.

However, since the end of 2018, Ofcom's published guidance states an expectation to 'recommend only providing battery back-up or other protection facilities to vulnerable consumers.' If you would still quite like the option of a back-up solution but aren't in a vulnerable group, ISP Review's Solutions for Battery Back-up of Fibre Broadband and VoIP article provides you with some options.

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



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
