I write this as the terrible war in Eastern Europe continues to cause unimaginable destruction and suffering in Ukraine. Clearly Russia, and more particularly, Putin, has made a huge mistake by sending their forces in to a country that has so courageously resisted the invaders, and destroyed, at this point, one third of his army. The war has also revitalised NATO and driven Finland and Sweden to immediately apply to become members. All of us are praying that a way may be found to bring peace to that devastated country, and that the evil that caused it may be defeated. There are such strong resonances with the account of end times in the book of Revelation where the four horsemen are unleashed upon the world, an evil conqueror accompanied by war, death, and famine. Christians have always struggled to define if and how taking human life in wars can ever be justified, and while not all agree, the concept of a 'just war' was defined as the necessity to resist evil and protect the innocent. There is no doubt that this invasion was completely unjustified and that Ukraine needs all the support we can offer to frustrate the plans of evil men and to prevent continuing atrocities. We don't know how or when this war will end, but we do know, as the Bible tells us, that ultimately evil will be defeated, and we continue to pray each week for the victims of this aggression, for all who live in fear and at risk, and that somehow God will bring about an end to the killing and kindle a renewed desire for peace.

IHEAT HEAT, LIGHT & STONE

Good News!

We are now at a time-critical stage of the project, if we are to have any chance of having heating in church this winter, so a decision was taken to split the faculty into two applications: Heat, Light and Audio-Visual, and a separate Stone and Brickwork application. This will allow time to provide the additional detail required for the stone and brickwork, whilst progressing the other aspects of the project.

In taking this approach, we are pleased to tell you that the Diocese Advisory Committee (DAC) no longer have any objections to our detailed heating, lighting and audio-visual proposals and have provided Notification of Advice (NOA) that we can now move to the Public Consultation stage of the application. This involves putting a notice inside and outside church advising of the work that is proposed. This has been done and the consultation period (28 days) started on the 11th May.

Also, now the NOA has been issued, all our supporting documents outlining the detailed heating, lighting and audio-visual proposals have been sent to the Registrar of Coventry Consistory Court, which is overseen by the Chancellor. Once the Public Consultation period has past, the Chancellor will then pass his judgement as to whether to grant faculty approval. So, progress, but until we are given faculty approval no funding opportunities can be sought or any work progressed.

Meanwhile, the Archbishop of Canterbury has announced his intention that the Church of England will be entirely carbon-neutral by 2030. All Saints, Harbury will be ahead of the game.

We all hope and pray for positive news to share with you next month!



It was a treat in May to meet Karen Morris, the new Diocesan president. She is so lively and inspiring as she spoke of the plans for "re-imagining". As you read this, we will have heard about the work of Carriers of Hope as they help newly arrived refugees to a new future. Having started in response to the crisis in Syria, they are now helping those fleeing the conflict in Ukraine. Many of our members were glad of the opportunity to send items for them.

Most members will be helping with the Festival of Hope, here in All Saints from 25th June - 3rd July; we hope lots of visitors will come to see the beautiful handwork in the Quilt of Hope, the needlework panels, and the displays of various aspects of church Life. There will also be live music and tea and cakes - all free.

Our July meeting, on 6th, will be a visit to Chesterton Church, followed by tea at the Pavilion Café at Lighthorne. Chris will be in touch to sort numbers and lifts.

Finally, I'm sure we will be sending our Queen our prayers of thanksgiving as we celebrate her 70 years on the throne. We are so honoured to have her as our Patron. Enjoy this unique occasion.

Repairs

Lychgate repairs are progressing. It may have seemed quiet on site most days to start with as ASBC took parts away to make matching replacements in their carpentry workshop in Derbyshire. This photo was taken on 19th May when the front cross beam and parts above returned. We look forward to the lychgate work finishing in June; then it's on to repairs to the aisle roofs.



Church Geology

On Sunday 15th May we welcomed back Philip Powell and Nina Morgan who followed up their fascinating Graveyard Geology session with a more detailed look at Church Geology, the close inspection of the stone used to build the church.



It was fascinating. Our rocks are all incredibly old. Look closely at our church and you will see **dark red** patches (Kenilworth sandstone, 330 million years old) in the east window to the right of the porch, **grey** stripes (Bromsgrove sandstone, 220 million years old), **white** stripes (White Lias, 206 million years old) and **orange** stripes (Banbury ironstone, 190 million years old).

With the help of hand loupes provided, we were able to see close







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up, the unique mineral structures such as quartz (silica) which sparkles in sunshine, evidence of animal activity such as burrows, fossils including ammonites and bivalves, and parts of animals called crinoids which leave a tiny 5 pointed star imprint. Bedding in the grey Bromsgrove sandstone shows evidence of large ripples in the river channels of the period – they were flowing north!





Inside the church, the piers of the arcades and windows are grey Bromsgrove sandstone and the orange in some of the windows is Banbury ironstone.

Then it gets a bit more expensive – the memorials to the Palmer family are made from prestigious Carrara marble in Italy. The black marble on the steps near the altar is Devon marble, used for decoration, added in the Gilbert Scott restoration in the 19th century. Who knew rocks could be so interesting?

Merger between Warwick and Stratford District Councils

Over Easter, a surprise announcement was made by the Conservative leadership of the two Councils that they have decided that the merger cannot go ahead. Both full Councils had decided before Christmas on the merger in principle. Since then, work has been going on to assess the viability, both at central government (who would have to decide whether to permit it) and between Warwick and Stratford Councils. We knew detailed investigation work was expected, and was showing that the financial factors to align the two councils with one another may have been challenging, but this was still a surprise.

The issues are financial and revolve around the borrowing arrangements of Warwick District Council, the valuation of assets and the role of a wholly owned company called Milverton Homes. The due diligence process to discover the full financial picture apparently could not be completed in an agreed time scale to suit the leadership of the two Councils.

I am concerned to learn that the merger has been called off at this late stage and after a considerable amount of time and money has been spent on it. Financial savings were being forecast from the merger and the question now must be what happens if those savings don't arrive. My feeling is that the full detail of why things went wrong will take time to emerge and the full picture may never be known.

I will be working to ensure that as much as possible can be retrieved from working together without a full merger. There are number of aspects that are expected to survive. Those with direct effect on residents include the joint local plan setting planning policy in the future and the new waste collection contract starting in August (see below). Other back office functions such as shared legal services should continue.

123+ Waste Collections

This revised scheme is due to start in August. In preparation for this, leaflets explaining the system should be posted soon to every house together with the new timetable. Also, new food waste bins are being distributed in advance, but note these will not come into use until 1st August. Food waste will be collected every week, recycling (blue and green) every two weeks, but the residual waste (grey bin) will be collected every three weeks. This is more or less the same system that has been

operating in Daventry for some time. You can read more on the web at: https://www.stratford.gov.uk/waste-recycling/123-waste-collections.cfm This includes a link to frequently asked questions, but I have raised a number of potential issues to be addressed, one of the trickier ones being nappy disposal.

HS2 Roadworks

I have been notified that there are to be a number of overnight road closures in the area at various times over the coming months. These are for a variety of reasons including surveying and moving large items. The roads affected are the A423, A361 and A425. There will also be an increase in temporary traffic signals in the area. You can check the roadworks map at https://one.network/uk. I have asked for the signage for any diversions that come into place to be improved, because some of the signs have been unhelpful for the diversions around the Fosseway.

April 2022 Meeting Report

This was a relatively short meeting. There were questions asked about the future of the old petrol station as there had been suggestions the land might be used for more housing, but this was not confirmed.

The Chairman said that 809 Ukrainians had been "matched" with Warwickshire residents and that 380 people had been housed.

The Library wanted to install better heating and provide more space for the kitchen. The Head Teacher of Harbury Primary was moving to a new job and the governors were in the process of appointing a replacement. A report from the Twinning Group was circulated.

For the Village Hall, Andy Rutherford reported that bookings had increased but they could do with more. For several years they had had a low income and might have to increase their charges, although they did have a contingency fund of £25K.

There was little to report on Covid - fewer people were being tested: there were still deaths being reported but the Government was not giving out details.

Our Stratford District Councillor said she was "frustrated" that the promised traffic lights at the Fosse Junction were still to be installed, but she seemed pleased that the merger with Warwick District Council had been "pulled".

Our Warwickshire County Councillor reported that work on the Fosse crossroad was due to start in June and would last for six months. Cllr Balch said accidents were still happening there and asked now many people had been killed or seriously injured. The Chairman would write to the County Council about the continued accidents at the crossroads and the debris left on the site of the latest crash.

Planning

The Parish Council had objected to the plans for Lindon Barn Cottage which Stratford DC had approved. Both our District Councillor and the Parish Council were very annoyed and would complain that SDC had failed to discuss this application with them.

Nothing had been done about the footpath that should have been provided leading up to the Henry's development in Bush Heath Lane. The PC wanted a "Developer Protocol" to allow them to have pre-planning meetings with developers.

Jubilee Trees

There was long discussion about the whips which had been planted round the playing fields and the need to clear the drainage ditches. Unfortunately, some whips had already been "removed". The Cllrs would in future take advice from their tree surgeon on where to plant more mature trees and giving them "more support". This would be for the Autumn.

Playing Fields

The swings had been repaired and the surface improved. The Junior Football Club can now use the senior pitch. The skate park "thumb Box" repairs would cost £1,800. The car park bollards were jammed and could not be lowered, and there were concerns about whether the Carnival lorries would be able to get onto the field.

Other Assets

The Cemetery would be inspected again next month. There was an application for the erection of a "big shed" on the allotments; a memorial bench on the Old New Inn Green and two new benches for Deppers Bridge.

The Jubilee and Climate Change

Cllr Balch had plans for a marquee at the Eco Fair at the playing fields on Carnival day. She had bunting which would be distributed all around from 21^{st} - 22^{nd} May, which could be left up to four weeks after the Carnival. They would need the use of a cherry picker both for putting it up and taking it down.

Other Reports

Some of the street lights were obscured. A survey of the lights was needed and residents would be asked to remove anything on their property which was obscuring the lights.

Tour of Ladbroke

On Friday 20th May, a group of 19 Harbury Society members enjoyed a very pleasant afternoon having a guided tour of Ladbroke. Before setting out from the Village Hall, we were informed that various projects in Ladbroke were being funded by a Lottery grant of £339,000 and this has been match-funded by the village. The first major undertaking is the restoration of the church, a 3 year project which started 21/2 years ago. To begin the tour, the members were then split into four groups, each led by a very knowledgeable guide. The group I was with made its way along the road to the church which is over 700 years old. Its unusual striped tower is made from local White Lias and Hornton stone. There has been extensive restoration of the

crumbling external stonework which, at the present time, looks rather obtrusive against the original but which will weather over time to match the existing. The interior was restored in 1876 by the famous architect, Sir Gilbert Scott, and has beautiful stained glass windows dating from this time. Along the way to the church, we passed Farmyard Field which is the site of the original Manor House, sadly no longer in existence, but, after heavy rain, the medieval fish ponds in the field still fill up. The Catesby family owned the manor of Ladbroke for 200 years until Robert Catesby, the leader of the Gunpowder Plot, sold it in 1596 to Alice and Robert Dudley. The manor was subsequently sold in 1633 to the Palmer family who held it for nearly 300 years.

We then crossed a field to walk beside the Millennium Green which has been created as a wildlife and recreation space for the village. On rejoining the road, we passed various old properties, some of which are thatched, where we learnt of their history from our tour guide, Bill. The most notable is Ladbroke Hall which is an 18th century Manor House now split into apartments. Ladbrokes, the betting shop company, was formed by Mr Schwind, who trained horses from the Hall, and Mr Pennington in 1886. However, it wasn't called Ladbrokes until 1902 when the third partner, Arthur Bendir a bookmaker, joined the partnership and suggested the name during his first visit when he saw Ladbroke Hall on a signpost.

When we came back to the Village Hall, we learnt that prisoners of war had been held there during WW1 and WW2. We ended the tour at the hall with a very welcome cup of tea and some delicious cakes.

If you haven't already either heard a talk about Ladbroke or been on a tour, it's well worth doing so.

Geoff and Gill returned to Warwickshire in 1976 - running surgeries in Wellesbourne and Southam and living by the surgery in Southam, where Gill acted as receptionist for a while - not easy with young children.

Geoff amused us with tales of his dealings with animals from Southam Zoo, looking after the Teletubby rabbits and finding visitors on canal boats who had animals requiring attention. He treated Judy Dench's hamster when she was working in Stratford.

Geoff told us how the work of a vet has changed with little out of hours' work; farmers have to deal with vets in Banbury and Solihull.

Although Geoff has now been retired for 20 years, his tales were so interesting and in many cases amusing.

We look forward to running our usual cake stall at the Carnival - where we shall also be selling recycled jam jars containing a variety of objects.

HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

Bill Timson

This month's article is very appropriate and provides a history of the Playing Fields Committee and Harbury Carnival. I am indebted to John Smith who provided the information which takes us back 50 years to the first Harbury Carnival.

The objective of the Playing Fields Committee was to raise funds to extend the facilities on the extensive playing fields vested in the Parish Council and situated at the rear of the Village Hall. In the early 1970's Harbury Rugby Club had their pitch on the section of the fields nearest the Hall and the Soccer Club played on the section beyond a dividing hedge separating the two sections of the field.

The Committee raised funds by running the Christmas Fair in December and by running raffles and dances in the Village Hall during the year. The proceeds from these events were spent on improvements to the facilities, especially the children's playground.

In 1972, Pat and John Smith suggested that the village would benefit from the provision of tennis courts and, with the approval of the Parish Council, the Playing Fields Committee took this idea forward and started to raise funds specifically for this. The members of the Committee at that time and through the 1970's were Mick Brant, Gladys Hutchins, John Smith, John Hunt, Sue Andrews, Linda Ridgley, Midge Keen, and Valentine Dubisson. The principal funding of the several thousand pounds necessary for the construction of the courts commenced with the issuing of £25 bonds to subscribers in the village. This was on the basis that two cash prizes of £25 a year would be awarded to winning bondholders as the result of a draw, the

winners' bonds then being cancelled as considered re-paid. The remaining bonds were to be re-paid at their face value at some future unspecified date. The Committee undertook to raise the funds to cover the prizes and the return of capital from their fund raising efforts.

Fetes were held in Harbury prior to 1972 but our recollections only go back that far and the first public report on Harbury Carnival appears in the Leamington Courier in 1973. The financial demands of the playing fields development meant that a greater fund raising effort was required and the Committee decided to organise a village Carnival in June 1972 specifically to raise funds for the tennis courts and Mick Brant chaired the Carnival Committee. A six-a-side soccer competition between local clubs was organised by Harbury Football Club and this attracted a large following to the playing fields. Tony Ceney was always our compere and announcer and has remained in that capacity for many years. A Carnival Dance held in the evening filled the Village Hall to capacity and villagers danced until midnight to the Likely Lads, who played at this dance and every subsequent one.

The second Carnival featured in the Leamington Courier and even with overcast skies and some drizzle, the event was a success. The procession was led by a Scottish band and Harbury Youth Club won the decorated floats section with their 'Viking Ship' and Thwaite's 'Homepride Flour' won the Trade section. A comic netball match was played by Harbury Badminton Club during the afternoon and a dog show and athletic events were organised. Southam Football Club won the six-a-side competition. The Carnival Queen, 16 year-old Rose Clarke of 1, Vicarage Lane presented the prizes. The event raised over £200 for the tennis court fund. The format was set then and it has continued more or less intact until to-day except that all stall profits went to the Playing Field Committee, whereas now, organisations running stalls keep their profit. There were also no roundabouts or fairground

equipment and food stalls were operated by village organisations or individuals such as a hot dog stall run by Gladys Hutchins and Pat Smith, which was always very popular as was the Wi's cake stall.

Mick Brant left the village in 1975 and John Smith took over as chairman. He continued for three years until 1977, the Queen's Silver Jubilee Year which was celebrated with a fortnight of events throughout the village coordinated by the Committee. The wheelbarrow race round the village pubs was inaugurated and pub games took place throughout the period. A Sports Day for the young people of the village was run on the Saturday before the Carnival coupled with a Gymkhana for local horse riders, run by Jan Stott, whose husband, Jim, ran the Gamecock those days, although his mother was the licensee

The Carnival itself was opened by Norman Painting of BBC 'Archers' fame and the event followed the successful pattern of previous years. A craft exhibition was held in the Village Hall with exhibits from villagers including paintings and drawings, crochet work, embroidery, knitting, lace making and woodwork. The centrepiece was an exhibition of rural craft tools by the Rural Museum from Marton. A highlight of the afternoon was to have been the launching of a hot air balloon from the playing field but the wind was so high that it was impossible, much to the disappointment of the crowd.

A milestone at this event was that there were sufficient funds in the Playing Field Fund to pay back all the Bondholders, but in the event they all, without exception, left the money in the fund. Over this period the Committee had constructed an adventure playground at the top end of the field, provided various items in the playground by the Village Hall and planted trees on the school playing fields, alongside the Village Hall car park and at various spots on the field.


The Playing Fields Committee also ran the village bonfire and firework display and the fireworks were ordered by John Hunt and stored in his garage. This is probably illegal today. He and John Smith with some other volunteers then designed and set up the fireworks display and let them off at the event. Refreshments were served in the Village Hall, a tradition carried on to this day and run by GASS, the village Guides and Scouts.

The Tennis Courts were completed in due course and the Parish Council took over responsibility for them. They were opened to the public without restriction provided they made a booking at the newsagents (corner of Mill Lane). They were never locked and free access was maintained at all times. The principal was that anyone in the village, especially young people, could play on the courts free of charge. It was only later that a Tennis Club was formed, which took over the management.

John Smith handed over the Chairmanship to Sue Andrews after the 1977 event and she continued to run the Carnival into the early1980s.

The Playing Fields Committee finally reached its goals and objectives in the 1980s and was dissolved. Other village organisations then took over the running of the events and most have continued in similar formats to raise funds for the benefit of projects in the village.

HEI and HFE at the Harbury Eco-Fair

This year's Carnival on Saturday 11th June will incorporate another first for the village by including a special Eco-Fair information zone for all your questions on green energy, recycling, the circular economy and environmental sustainability. The Eco-Fair will feature the village organisations focused on these topics. HEI will be there and so will Harbury Future Energy (HFE). You will be able to update yourself on our plans for this electric car charging station project and the latest developments. We hope to see lots of you looking to engage in these hugely important current issues. In order to keep you in suspense I am going to hold back from an update on HFE here. You'll have to come and talk to us at the Eco-Fair.

Advent - coming to an end

Back in September 2021 we teamed up with Reading University, Hangar 19 and CrowdCharge to help with research for our local DNO, Western Power Distribution (WPD), on a project called Advent. The Advent project is concerned with checking the health and resilience of our energy networks at a time when more and more domestic and commercial equipment will be demanding electricity. Small devices installed in homes have been monitoring voltage 24 hours a day since then. It's hard to believe but in the whole of the huge WPD region we alone were selected to be the community capable of delivering on this. Needless to say, this being Harbury, we did deliver. Over 40 people came forward to take part and the organisers were delighted. The project ended on 31st May and on 7th June we participants will hear the results and what that signifies. Given that we hope to draw extra energy from the grid in fairly large chunks (not a technical measurement, I know) for HFE in the future, this is of importance for us.

Wanted - Energy Champions

Free Energy Advice Training during Community Energy Fortnight 2022

Community Energy England, the umbrella organisation for community energy groups such as HEI, is working with some of their member groups to offer free training to provide energy advice to local residents during Community Energy Fortnight, which

will be specifically designed to get organisations up to speed with energy advice and the delivery of fuel poverty alleviation projects. Please get in touch with our Chair, David Bristow, on bristowfamily@hotmail.co.uk if you think you can help with this and become an Energy Champion locally. You don't need to be an existing HEI member.

David has already completed an expression of interest about delivering energy advice. CEE is exploring funding for groups and individuals to get the training needed to deliver this urgently needed service. They are also working on a proposal to BEIS for significant funding for the sector to deliver this.

In the April edition of Harbury and Ladbroke News David Bristow outlined the problems that had been experienced by the school with the solar panel installation that we organised for them a few years ago. The system had been underperforming. The installers, InEco Energy, returned to check over the system and found a fault in the inverter. This has now been rectified with a new inverter and we are delighted to discover that the system is now working at full efficiency, benefitting from all the glorious sunshine of the last weeks.

Ted's Tech Trawl - More on Hydrogen

Last month we visited Australia to learn about a highly efficient electrolyser; this month we return to the UK to find out about a company founded 20 years ago, now based in a brand new factory in Sheffield and able to make the largest electrolyser in the world, ITM Power.

Hydrogen is a clean energy carrier that can be used in many ways. At the moment most is used in refining oil! Many companies are beginning to use it directly as a fuel, often via a fuel cell to reproduce electricity for powering cars and lorries. However, some are redesigning engines to burn it direct, producing no CO2, only water from the exhaust.

One example is the excavator company JCB. Their engineers have taken their diesel engine, basically changed pistons and cylinder head and designed a gas injection system, making the engine run cleaner and quieter on pure hydrogen.

Another new development by Israeli startup company Aquarius Engines is a unique multi-fuel engine with only one moving part! They have managed to make this engine run efficiently on pure hydrogen, at present running as a lightweight 8kW generator.

HARBURY RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

Following on from the emphatic win against Chaddesley Corbett, we were all looking forward to the next league match, away to top of the table Claverdon. Before that, we had a trip over to play Shipston 2s in a friendly. Unfortunately, not only did we lose 36-12 but the injury list grew yet again.

Early the following week it soon became apparent that player availability for Saturday was **not** looking good. The Committee worked hard throughout the week but a number of players were out through injuries picked up against both Chaddesley Corbett and Shipston, testing positive with Covid, shortage of a front row and individual's personal commitments all of which forced us to pull out of the fixture due to insufficient numbers. Did some players not fancy pitching up against top of the table opposition? We didn't hear any evidence of this. Holroyd contacted Claverdon's Chairman on Friday morning to apologise on behalf of the Club.

On the morning of Saturday 2nd April, Coventrians belatedly pulled out of the fixture against Harbury as they were unable to field a side. Not wanting to waste the occasion, it was decided to put Saints v Bristol on the big screen; beer £2 a pint followed by the after-match meal. Not quite the same as a good run out but the end result was much the same!

Unfulfilled fixtures have been happening throughout all the leagues and are of concern to the RFU.

Seventeen players made the team sheet for the journey over to Upton upon Severn on 9th April. Whilst the final score (49-5) certainly doesn't look good, the lads did put in a full shift. It didn't help that Team Manager Ben Linnett was not on hand to offer his insight into the game. The Club took advantage of this away fixture and booked in the Rawlinson Bracket cycling event endorsed by British Cycling. This is the third time that the Club has hosted the event and they raised funds for research into, and awareness of, Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome as well as humanitarian support in Ukraine.

A **full squad** travelled over to Kings Norton for the last league game of the season. This was an evenly matched contest where Harbury finally closed out the game with a try bonus point win 17-24.

GARDEN JOTTINGS

A couple of months ago I was presented with an engraved hand fork by the National Garden Scheme as a thank you for opening the garden here for 20 years. We must have raised a few thousand pounds during that time and are continuing to raise more this year. Please come and help contribute to this excellent charity. Open each weekend, 10am-4.00pm until the end of September. Adults £3.50, children free.

June is such a busy month and is also very rewarding, there will be more flowers after the mid-May gap and the risk of frosts should be a distant memory. There is a lot to be done.

It is safe to plant out all tender plants including dahlias, canna lilies, bedding plants, runner beans, sweetcorn, courgettes, cucumbers and

tomatoes. Trim back aubretia. Prune any spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia and Spirea arguta by removing some of the older stems close to the ground, this will encourage new growth. Stake any perennials which tend to flop before they get too tall. Plant out brassicas and leeks. If you haven't already done so remove forget-me-not plants. Divide primroses and cowslips so you have lots more next year. And, finally, weed, and then weed some more.

Hello everyone!

I hope this finds you well and enjoying the warmer weather!

My news is pretty much stable in that I continue to attend various Parish Council meetings and forums. I have two topics I would like to share with you, which are important for the ward. 1. in Harbury and 2. Upper Lighthorne.

1. I have over this past month taken Warwickshire County Council to task over the situation we have at Harbury Cross roads in not fitting the long-awaited traffic lights. I have to be honest, it does not bode well when they keep moving the date of the work commencing; it looks unprofessional and makes a mockery of us all. It appears they cannot seem to manage their own projects well, or time line responses from firms who are submitting tenders.

I have expressed in strong terms how disappointed we are at their performance and failure to deliver. I have been approached by residents in Harbury asking what they can do to support the effort in getting the project delivered. I suggest that residents write to the Leader of Warwickshire County Council, complaining and asking for an update as to when this project will be delivered.

Upper Lighthorne Parish, there is a concern around the build of the 3000 houses and the infrastructure in the new town being built in that part of this ward.


One may wonder how an issue over in Lighthorne Heath can affect you in Harbury. It is significant in that it is about Health Provision, GP's and Dental Provision. What I will say is that if health provision is not delivered, especially how residents wish, or to the standard required, the knock-on effect is that it will impact on surrounding Parishes and Surgeries, including Harbury. This is not acceptable. I have discovered to date the CCGs (Clinical Commissioning Groups) to be found wanting, an uncontrollable quango that can be a little obtuse. To ensure that good quality health provision will be delivered, I am working with Senior Managers and Officers at Stratford District Council. The Health Portfolio Holders at Stratford District Council and Warwickshire County Council are on notice about this situation and I will ensure it remains at the forefront of their minds.

been distributed with the food caddies, it appears that Harbury will be split between a Wednesday and Thursday collection.



1 Food waste collected weekly

- Residents will receive a 7-litre indoor food caddy and a 23-litre outdoor food bin.
- The indoor food caddy can be lined with compostable caddy liners or newspaper. Residents should put any peelings, raw or cooked leftover food into their caddy.
- When full, the indoor food caddy should be emptied into the outdoor food bin and the food bin presented for collection on the property boundary each week.
- The food waste is taken to an anaerobic digestion facility where it is used to create renewable energy and a soil improver.

2 Recycling collected every two weeks

- Residents should place the items below in their blue-lidded bin or recycling box for collection every two weeks:
 - All clean and dry cardboard
 - All empty, rinsed tins
 - All empty, rinsed cans
 - > All empty, rinsed glass jars, with or without lids
 - All empty glass bottles, with or without metal lids (no corks)
 - All clean and dry paper
 - All empty, rinsed plastic milk bottles with or without lids
 - All empty, rinsed plastic drink bottles with or without lids

- > All empty, rinsed plastic pots, tubs and trays
- All clean foil and foil trays
- > Empty aerosol cans (no spray paint, etc.)
- Empty, rinsed (where possible) Tetra Pak and cartons
- > Empty, rinsed (where possible) household cleaner bottles
- > Empty, rinsed (where possible) toiletry bottles
- Recyclables must be put in the bin loose DO NOT bag.
- Household batteries and small electrical items can be bagged, tied and put alongside the blue-lidded bin or recycling box for collection.

3 Refuse collected every three weeks

- Only items that cannot be recycled should be placed in the grey bin.
- 4 Garden waste collected every two weeks If the resident signs up for the Garden Waste Service.
 - The green bin should be used for garden waste only. No food waste.



LOCAL TRANSPORT SCHEMES -

Whilst collecting a magazine subscription recently from one of our more elderly residents who lives on the outskirts of Harbury, I was asked if we could publish details of local transport schemes that are available for those without their own transport. Below are the schemes which I am aware of, however the information has mainly been taken from the organisations' websites so may not be completely up to date.



Harbury e-Wheels is a registered charity offering a free volunteer transport service using two electric cars based in Harbury. We will collect and return passengers from anywhere within a 15 mile radius of the centre of the village and cover journeys up to 60 miles round trip and further in particular circumstances. There is no charge to either the passenger or the referring agency.

Passengers need to be referred or registered with e-Wheels. This can be done by a surgery, social agency, food bank, church or similar organisation. The referred passenger does not need to complete any forms; the process is done for them. Whilst e-Wheels does not make any charge for the service donations are always welcome.

Harbury e-Wheels will deliver to medical and dental appointments, social events, children's centres, visiting friends and shopping trips (especially for the elderly and isolated), assessments, court appearances, job centres.

Avon district, who cannot access public transport The UBUS service is for residents of Stratford on because of mobility issues or live in an area with

limited or no public transport. It operates Monday to Friday 9.30am until 7.00pm, except between 2.30pm and 4.30pm on school days.

Booking is through the booking centre on ubus@stratford-dc.gov.uk or call 01789 264491 between 8.30am and 6.00pm Monday to Friday to register and book your journey.

There is no registration fee and when you register you will be sent further details of the service and your membership number. You can book your journey up to a maximum of a week ahead and a minimum of a day before travel. The UBUS booking centre will confirm your journey details on the day of booking. Harbury, Ladbroke and Ufton are in their green zone which limits journeys to Learnington, Southam and our local villages.

Fares on the service are £4 single and £6 return. Warwickshire County Council Concessionary bus passes are now valid for travel on the service.



The WRCC Back & 4th service provides community transport for residents of Stratford on Avon District. Their 15 and 16 seater

minibuses are fully wheelchair accessible and can be hired by community and voluntary organisations. Volunteer drivers take groups on outings including shopping trips, lunches and cultural visits.

The service also includes the **Shoppa-Hoppa** service. If you live in Learnington, Warwick or the surrounding villages, you can book a place on their weekly Monday service to take you to a range of supermarkets. Our Shoppa-Hoppa service is driven by a volunteer driver, who will collect you from your door. If required, they can arrange for a volunteer assistant to help you around the supermarket to collect your shopping. Shoppa-Hoppa currently costs £6.00 for a return journey.

VASA's Volunteer Transport Service takes people who are VOSO without their own transport to medical appointments at hospitals, doctors' surgeries, dentists' surgeries and day centres across Stratford District and beyond. The service is

available for residents in Stratford District and regularly takes people to the hospitals in Coventry. Birmingham and Oxford, and occasionally as far as London and Liverpool. The door-to-door service is essential for vulnerable people who otherwise would struggle to keep health care appointments or worse not get to them at all.

The service is available to anyone who has a genuine need for transport. They usually require three days' notice prior to a journey. They ask for the volunteer driver's costs to be paid at the rate of 45p per mile and there is a £3 administration fee per journey. 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
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
