
In Ladbroke the boules tournament is commencing in July. Also, if you would like to receive details about the forthcoming supper and film night, join their mailing list.



The June Photoclub meeting was a little different as we all were encouraged to wear some rather fetching glasses. However, these turned out to be the key to enjoying a very interesting talk and presentation from Dr Bob Pryce on stereo (3D) photography.

He started with local history 19th century photographs of Warwick that he had restored (eg. the Lord Leycester Hospital with top-hatted figures standing outside - so real you felt you could see around them), and the modern equivalent shots. He explained how the 3D imagery was created and how he made a lot of his own equipment. Then he showed us natural history macro time lapse photography of the life cycles of butterflies and moths, and 3D photography of some of our cathedrals and churches - particularly stunning were close up shots of roof bosses - wonderful 3D medieval sculptures which are rarely noticed when up to 80ft above ground.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PARISH COUNCIL - 18TH MAY 2023

Two consecutive meetings were held, the first being the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council. Here the new Council arrangements were determined. Tim Lockley continues

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as Chairman but as Keith Thompson was standing down as Vice Chairman, Julie Balch was voted in to that duty. As our Council is three Councillors short, there are fewer to sit on the six working parties resulting in additional duties for them. The Chairman was hopeful that the vacant seats could be filled over time.

The ordinary council meeting then followed on. Our new District Councillor had sent her apologies as she was having induction training that evening. The only Public Participation item was Rich Fowler, who firstly reported that the annual review with Warwickshire CC had gone well and our library is considered an exemplar of a volunteer run library within the County! He then handed round a 'sensory toy' which the Library is purchasing from a grant made by the W.I.

Planning - with the meeting being held in the Tom Hauley Room, Councillors were able to view the chimney concerned in an application by the Church to remove the Victorian stone chimney and carry the roof slope over the top. Councillors decided to object as they felt the removal was an unnecessary alteration to what was now part of the fabric of the building. The only other application for consideration was the installation of an underground cable on farmland on the edge of the Parish near to Bishops - No representation.

Properties - after a discussion on how best to do a consultation on a possible extension to the Village Hall car park. Councillors agreed to produce a leaflet which would be distributed in the Harbury and Ladbroke News. They also would meet again with the football club, to see if more could be done to encourage visiting away teams' parents to car share. Also whether car park marshalling could be provided on match days. The Chairman also suggested having an electronic diary which could show; Football, Tennis and Netball fixtures as well as major Village Hall bookings to give visibility on potential car parking peaks.

There was someone who might be interested in becoming the co-ordinator for the Allotments Well-being project. The clerk reported that another of the raised beds had been taken.

A number of potential designs for the Binswood End bus shelter had been researched and the favoured design was for a wooden shelter with a Sedum roof. A window would incorporated on the side looking down Binswood End, so passengers could see the bus approaching. A final decision was still to be taken.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING - 25TH MAY 2023

The Annual Parish Meeting is hosted by the parish council and is a chance for residents to meet their local councillors, parish, district and county and find out about things that have been happening in the village over the past twelve months. The parish council itself was rather depleted on this evening as three long-serving councillors had stood down at the recent elections. Chairman Tim Lockley said this was a common problem in neighbouring villages and also nationally, and encouraged anyone interested in filling these vacancies to find out more, as being a councillor is a rewarding and interesting experience – please contact the parish clerk on clerk@harbury-pc.gov.uk or speak to any parish councillor.

Planning: Cllr Allen reported that the council was still waiting for the new combined

South Warwickshire Local Plan to be finalised; following this the PC can update the Neighbourhood Plan for Harbury again. For some interesting bedtime reading residents can look at the emerging combined plan website at www.southwarwickshire.org.uk Currently, Harbury has exceeded the number of required new homes allocated to it but this will undoubtedly be revised upwards in the new Local Plan.

Environment: Cllr Lockley said that a notable achievement had been the new Swift boxes. This is an initiative funded by the parish council and supported by a number of village volunteers led by Amanda Randall, which has seen nest boxes installed at around forty sites in the village. Looking ahead, the Environment WP would like to concentrate on planting more trees for the village focussing on using more mature specimens.

Properties: The Properties WP had been busy during the year on a number of projects including replacing the cemetery hedge with a new fence (planting to soften the visual effect is planned), maintaining the play area including weekly visual inspections and initiating the wellbeing allotment project which now has three users tending the newly installed raised beds. There has also been work to improve the drainage on the path at the far end of the playing fields resulting in a significant decrease in flooding. The Council had asked Stratford District Council to empty the bins in the village centre more frequently but, unfortunately, this request had been declined. However, a new bin of modern design to replace the existing very old one, is planned for Church Street.

Finance & General Purposes: The council budget has been subject to significant inflationary pressures not least the increase in the cost of electricity; Harbury is slightly unusual amongst parishes in that it owns all of its 120 streetlights and consequently pays for its own electricity. Most of the lights are LED however which have lower running costs. The lights are kept on all night and the council had previously discounted the option of turning them off during the night as the modifications needed to do this were prohibitively expensive. Due to economies made in other areas however the PC precept increased by 7.9% this year which is less than the current rate of inflation. During the last year, the council distributed some £8900 in grants to local organisations including a £3000 grant to Harbury School PTA for new books. School Headteacher, Lucy Bosley, thanked the council for their support.

Climate Working Party: This has been the first full year for the Climate WP which was formed after the parish council formally recognised the climate emergency. The working party, which also includes representatives from outside organisations including the Harbury Energy initiative, Harbury Repair Cafe and Harbury Future Energy, organised an Eco-Fair held at Harbury Carnival. The aim of the fair was to understand what residents needed help with in order to save money and become more environmentally friendly. Data collected at the fair led to a second community event organised and run by HEI on behalf of the parish council. This was attended by over 200 people who were given advice on home improvements, keeping homes warm and identifying any available grants to help with this.

After hearing reports from the working parties, the Chairman invited contributions from the County and District Councillors. **County Clir Chris Kettle** said that the biggest source of recent complaints had been three successive contractors digging up the roads and pavements in the village in order to lay high fibre cables. Whilst broadband provision in rural areas undoubtedly needs to be improved, this is excessive and highly

inconvenient for residents, particularly as the first company to lay cable has not even gone live to date. Unfortunately, any private company can apply to WCC for a license for this work provided they meet certain criteria and standards, however there had been a recent incident of the county council withdrawing the license from one particularly poor contractor. Cllr Kettle also highlighted the ongoing road works at the Fosse Way which, whilst inconvenient in the short-term, will make the junction much safer.

District CIIr Susan Ostrander is new to council life as she was elected in May. She was enthusiastic about getting to grips with the role and working collaboratively with the parish council. She thanked her predecessor, Jacqui Harris for all her hard work.

The parish council produces a report every year which features the work of the council and other village organisations. Copies are available from the parish office.

The meeting closed at 8.35pm.



On Tuesday, 16th May, Harbury Society paid a visit to the ancient hamlet of Wolfhampcote, which lies on the Warwickshire/ Northamptonshire borders. Accessed through gated roads in delightful countryside, Wolfhampcote is the site of an abandoned medieval village, its population, most probably, decimated by the Black Death. Evidence of a once thriving community can clearly be seen by the many humps and bumps in the fields around the church, as shown in the Lidar image, though some of them are the result of canal workings dating from the early part of the 19th century.



The village was listed as Ufelmscote in the Domesday Book but today all that remains is a cottage, a farm, the old vicarage and the Church of St Peter. Wolfhampcote was in the possession of Turchill, the Saxon Earl of Warwick, who owned large areas of land in Warwickshire before the Conquest and was the only Saxon to increase his lands after the invasion

By 1248 the manor is held by Geoffrey de Langeley, who placed a chaplain in the church.

In 1331 the manor passed by marriage to the Peyto family of Chesterton but in 1614 Sir Edward Peyto sold the land to his tenant Robert Clerke and the manor remained with

this family until 1800 when the last male heir died.

In 1826 the estate was bought by Charles Tibbits of Barton Seagrave, Northamptonshire. Later in the century Mary Tibbits married the third Viscount Hood and she still owned the manor at the time of her death in 1904 when it was sold and the manorial rights finally lapsed. Monuments relating to several members of this family can also be seen in the church.

The area of the medieval settlement is listed as a scheduled ancient monument. Archaeological excavations carried out at the site in 1955 established occupation from the Anglo-Saxon period with pottery dating from the 13th to the 15th century, whilst the height of the population is thought to have occurred during the 12th and 13th centuries.

The area around the old village is rich in industrial archaeology. In the 19th century the tranquillity of the area was shattered by the arrival of navvies employed in the construction of two canals and two railway lines. The Oxford Canal passes to the north of the site and this links to the Grand Union Canal at nearby Braunston. The remains of the two dismantled railway lines can be found running through the site. The first is the old Weedon to Leamington Spa (via Daventry) railway, part of the London and North Western Railway (later the LMS), which passes quite close to the south side of the church; this closed in December 1963. The second is the Great Central Main Line which closed to all traffic in September 1966.

In 1221, three murders were recorded in Wolfhampcote: Nicholas de Sawbridge killed his brother, Robert, and fled the scene. As was the medieval custom - a financial penalty was placed on his household and friends. A second case states that Reginald, brother of the chaplain of Sawbridge, killed William del Val, who, striking back, killed Reginald. The third murder case states that a man called Geoffrey killed Robert, son of Richard de Flecknoe, and fled into the church. Acknowledging his crime, he swore an oath to leave the country immediately and not to return, unless by permission of the sovereign.

The Church dates from about 1330, although there were probably earlier churches on the site and possibly even a temple as there were indications of Roman activity in the area. It was changed in 1690 when the top of the tower was altered and it was re-roofed; this was confirmed by finding the date and the initials of the churchwardens at the top of the tower. Some of the pews date from the 14th century. The church then remained virtually unchanged until 1848, when a restoration was carried out



by the Hood family, and the mausoleum was added to the east end of the church.

A Royal Coat of Arms of Queen Anne hangs over the chancel arch. It is dated 1711 when celebrations were held to commemorate her birthday and coronation and its style suggests the painting is by a local sign-writer rather than a professional artist. It's possible she came to Wolfhampcote at some point, as she led many 'processions' around the country during her reign, to meet the people.

The church closed in 1910 but reopened two years later at the request of the local residents, however, it was only used occasionally for services. There are two bells in

the tower; a small one dated 1780 was cast by Pack and Chapman at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry and a larger 15th century one inscribed 'John Sturdy London'. Both bells were repaired in the 1970s by John Taylor and Co of Loughborough.

Unwanted attention was drawn to the church after featuring on a 1950s BBC television programme called 'Stranger than Fiction' when vandals broke in and extensively damaged it. The stained glass windows, the Victorian pews (though, mercifully, not the 14th century ones), the fount and the pulpit were all wilfully smashed. However, the charity, the 'Friends of Friendless Churches', was granted permission to carry out repairs. The pulpit was painstakingly restored and the fount was also re-assembled and repaired. The windows were replaced with plastic, but these are now showing signs of wear and it is planned to re-install new stained glass windows.

John Betjeman, took a great interest in St Peter's church which he visited shortly after WWII, with his friend, the artist, John Piper. He described it as 'a perfect un-restored village church, with traces of painting on the walls, fading monuments, old woodwork'. Writing about their visit, in the Spectator in 1958, he relates how the key they had borrowed wouldn't work, so they had to climb in through a broken window.



Following a talk, the group explored the church and its churchyard and then enjoyed some refreshments kindly provided by the Friends of the church.

Chairman Ed Wilson thanked the Friends for their hospitality and for a thoroughly interesting afternoon.

"Repent Ye Sinners' they shouted. But to no avail. Eleven acts all performed material in praise of the Seven Deadly Sins, the theme for Folk Club number 437 on 1st June.

The evening opened with The Harvesters singing Lazy John (*Sloth*), followed by "Lily Of The West" (*variously featuring Wrath, Lust and Envy*). To follow, Ric gave us "Three Drunken Maidens" (*Gluttony*) and a revised version of a Jake Thackeray song, renamed "The Harbury Ladies' Magic Circle" (*Pride?*). Robin and Sally were next to the stage with The Small Faces' "Lazy Sunday Afternoon" (*more Sloth*), and then John Lennon's "Jealous Guy" (*Envy, obviously*). We were delighted to see Norman Wheatley back at the Folk Club and he commenced his set with "Life Gets Tee-jus, Don't It?" (*Sloth*), and then Jesse Winchester's lovely song "No Pride At All" (*Pride*). Debbie was next reading a couple of her self-penned poems. The first, "Under The Radar" (*Wrath*), and then "Forbidden Fruit" (*Lust and probably Gluttony*). The first half was brought to a fine conclusion by Peter McDonald with Tom Paxton's "I Thought You Were An Arab" about an FBI 'sting' operation (*Greed*), and he performed "The Trunch Temperance Marching Song" which asks: "are you dry?" 
HARBURY TWINNING ASSOCIATION

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HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE Bill Timson

The 'cost-of-living' crisis is very much a talking point at the current time. Energy and food bills have risen sharply over the past year and affect us all. This month I thought the reader might find it interesting to look at food prices over the years and how they compare with today.

Harbury has been blessed with many shops and, at one time, residents would not have had to venture out of the village for all or most of their needs. In the heritage collection we have copies of 'Kelley's' and 'Spennell's Trade Directories from the past. Kelley's Directory was first printed at the start of the Victorian era (1837); due to a lack of demand the last one was printed in 1980. Yellow Pages may well have been its successor. We have a Spennell's Directory dated 1924 in our collection (HM 323). It provides a fascinating insight into village life and

families, supplementing the censuses which were only complied every ten years.

The first name on the list is GT Alcock - Butcher - High Street. The photograph above right shows the shop (now Phoenix House opposite the Co-op), about one hundred years ago.

Right, a little later, a similar view with the butcher's van on the left and a new shop sign.

Recent posts on 'Harbury in Pictures' Facebook page showed the Co-op in 1937 decorated for King George's Coronation. This prompted me to get in touch with the owner, Martin Major, whose mother Isabella Major (nee Fletcher) lived in Pineham Avenue. Martin kindly lent me some family photographs and documents so that we could make copies and add them to our collection.

On returning the items, Martin gave me his mum's grocery order book from 1963 which was

used at 'The Stores' in Church Street; known affectionally as 'Top Shop' and run by the Taylor Family until it closed in 2003. The list would be made in the book and handed into the shop. The groceries would be supplied and the prices added. The bill would be paid and a receipt issued. The prices of course are in £.s.d, pounds, shillings and pence.

If you don't remember 240 old pence (d) to a Pound(£).

So, let's have a look at those prices from sixty years ago and compare them with 1985 when the same shop was selling 'Peacock' branded goods. Today's comparison is shown in the right-hand column.

Tea 3s6d (17½ pence)	Tea 37 pence	Tea £1.50p for 250g (Tesco)

Our summer events at the Hall have been going very well so far! The weather has been co-operating very nicely. There is still the beer festival to look forward to at the beginning of September and, this year, it will also feature a specialist GIN tent. The Village Show is also just around the corner.

We are working on plans to get the roof cleaned, the main Hall floor sanded and resurfaced, and curtains replaced. There will be some disruption but we hope it will be very limited.

There is a misconception that the Village Hall is well off, with plenty of spare cash. We need to be clear that we have funded all of our building work by chasing particular grants, and the terms of the Grants do no not allow their funds to be spent on running costs. In the middle of last year, with running costs rising very rapidly, and income remaining stagnant, we took measures to protect our future by increasing our hire charges. As our new Treasurer has pointed out, we ended the year with a small surplus. The Village Hall is obliged to maintain a significant contingency fund against severe need - to protect the future of the Hall.

We have had some Committee changes during the last year, with Sue Littlewood and Pam Keane resigning the posts of Treasurer and Booking Secretary respectively. These are both very busy roles, and replacements were hard to find. We are more than pleased with our new recruits Clare McGurk and Stephen Friling. Our longest serving Trustee, Janet Thornley, has also resigned, but having considered a move to Cornwall it looks like she will be staying to keep an eye on us.

Looking to the future I would like to see a modern projector installed, better equipped for streaming, and easier to use for presentations. More grants to find!



GARDEN JOTTINGS

Christine Dakin from Bridge Nursery

After complaining about the weather last month I shall continue to grumble because there were just a handful of days when the ground was not too wet to plant new plants. I daren't plant anything now, it's too dry.

I grew up on a small holding where my parents grew salad crops commercially. From a very young age, my brothers and I helped and got our hands dirty. We worked in a couple of acres of glasshouses and the jobs were stringing, side-shooting, de-leafing and then picking and grading tomatoes. Then they were sent off to Covent Garden wholesale market. Filthy work, I still hate the smell of the plants but like the fruit. Interestingly the small fruit were not considered desirable so local Italian families would come and strip the plants at the end of the season to make tomato sauce and passata. My 93 year old dad still grows half a dozen plants each year!

- · Dead-head roses and regularly pick sweet peas.
- · Feed tomato plants use 'Tomorite' or liquid seaweed
- · Pick peas and beans before they get too big.
- · Dig up early potatoes.
- · Sow more carrots (but not too thickly like I did).
- Try growing some mixed salad leaves in a pot so you can cut them regularly.

Later this month the onions, shallots and garlic might be ready; wait til the leaves have died down.

NATURE NOTES

At the end of May, we were fortunate to be invited to stay in a relative's house in Andorra. Andorra is a tiny, landlocked principality situated between France and Spain in the Pyrenees mountains. It's best known for its ski resorts and tax-haven status. There's

stunning scenery and, once the snow melts, outstanding walking to enjoy; the average elevation is almost 2,000 metres (over 6,500 feet).

Officially called the Principality of Andorra, this sovereign microstate is thought to have been created by Charlemagne in the Middle Ages. The principality has been ruled jointly by the leader of France and the Spanish bishop of Urgell (in

Catalonia) for more than 700 years; they are still joint co-princes and heads of state, but the roles are honorary. The official language is Catalan. Though not a member of the EU, Andorra has a special relationship with it and uses the Euro.

Andorra's dry climate is typical for a mountainous country; it has cold winters and mild summers with a large number of sunny days. Nonetheless, our first excursion into the mountains of Sorteny Natural Park began very wet and rather chilly! This did not detract from the spectacular scenery and superb spring flowers in the high alpine meadows, and when we reached the mountain refuge building we were rewarded with a roaring log fire! There is a network of mountain refuges in the Pyrenees where you can stay the night if you are trekking.

Andorra is known as the 'Flower Garden of Europe'. Our mountain hikes took us through alpine meadows full of wild flowers including a variety of orchids, gentians, and narcissus.

The Poet's Narcissus (also known in the UK as Pheasant's Eye) is the national flower of Andorra and as we walked through the Juclar valley, we were treated to meadows full of these delicate, highly fragrant flowers. The Poet's Narcissus has several mythical links. Eighteenth century Swedish botanist Carl Linnaeus gave the flower its name perhaps because he believed it was the one that inspired the tale of the Greek hero Narcissus, a story handed down by poets since ancient

times. In one version of the myth, the exceptionally handsome Narcissus was cruel and uninterested in anyone who sought his affection, rejecting all romantic advances. He eventually fell in love with his own reflection in a pool of water. He was punished for his cruelty by Nemesis the Goddess of vengeance who turned him into a Narcissus flower. Another story relates how Persephone was gathering Narcissus flowers when Hades abducted her into the Underworld.

The Pyrenees have an abundance of orchid species, including Greater Butterfly orchid, Early Purple orchid and Elder-flowered orchid. The latter is the most common in the Pyrenees, preferring the high meadows. Curiously, Elder-flowered orchids either have purple or yellow flowers and the two colours frequently occur together - yet both types are the same species. Their name refers to the flowers' slight scent, which resembles that of elder flowers.

These mountains are also famous for gentians; we spotted two different species: the stemless trumpet gentian and smaller spring gentian. Sometimes, hidden among the short vegetation, spring gentians may go unnoticed, but when you do find them you

will be surprised by their startling deep-blue flowers. Spring gentians are sun worshippers. closing the weather becomes dull. leaving nothing to see but small. dark-blue spikes. However the flowers quickly open again when the sun emerges from behind the clouds. In Britain, spring gentians are very rare,

occurring in only a few places such as Teesdale in the north Pennines. If you watch BBC Countryfile you may have recently seen 96 year old Dr Margaret Bradshaw talking about the very special Teesdale flora, including gentians!

The climb up the trail up to Juclar Lake, the largest lake in Andorra, was moderately challenging as there was still snow lying quite deeply in parts. Near the snow line, we came across the yellow Spanish daffodil which occurs higher up the mountain than Poet's Narcissus.

Another interesting plant find was Butterwort. This insectivorous plant has leaves that produce a sticky liquid that attracts unsuspecting insects. Once trapped, the leaves slowly curl around the prey and digest it. The plant grows

in nutrient-poor environments and evolved this carnivorous mode of life to supplement its diet. It gets its name from the time when people believed that rubbing the juices of its leaves into the udders of cows would protect against evil and bad butter!

While we were in Andorra, we heard cuckoos calling in the valleys, but we were delighted to receive reports at the same time that a cuckoo had been heard in Harbury!

Sarah Smith and Hugh Tottle both heard one towards Temple End and Chris Sherman heard a bird calling on consecutive days down by the railway line! The cuckoo is another of our increasingly rare summer visitors from Africa, with a loss of three quarters of the British breeding population in 25 years. Scientists believe that habitat loss and also drought caused by climate change, are making the cuckoo's epic journeying more hazardous.

Election

The administration formally handed over to the majority Liberal Democrats in an Annual Council meeting on 24th May 2023. Some of you may be interested in how the Council is run. Employed staff operate the day-to-day services of the Council, whereas strategic direction and policy are set by the elected Councillors. In many ways it is like national government where there is a Leader (Prime Minister) and Cabinet. In the case of Stratford District, the Cabinet now has a Leader and six other members drawn from the majority Liberal Democrat group. At the formal handover from the Conservatives, Dr Susan Juned was appointed Leader of the Council. Nigel Rock, previously District Councillor for some of this ward, has been appointed Deputy Leader. Funding for Community Projects

Up until the 14th July Stratford District Council is inviting project submissions to be considered for two alternative funding streams. These are, firstly, the Shared Prosperity Fund (SPF)/Rural Shared Prosperity Fund and, secondly, the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Fund. The themes for the SPF include projects for Community and Places and Support for Local Business. CIL income is generated from a levy on new development such as housing. Applications are expected from statutory infrastructure providers and not-for-profit organisations such as state schools, community group, parish councils and registered charities for projects that demonstrate a wider community benefit. Projects must relate to infrastructure and meet six other mandatory criteria.

HS2 News

We have been notified of a road closure for ecology surveys to be carried out. The B4452 (the road from Bascote crossroad to Harbury) on 3rd and 4th July 9.30-3.30.

In some positive news relating to HS2, it has been reported that HS2 has moved over 10 million tonnes of materials over two years by train, far exceeding its targets to reduce HS2 construction freight from our roads. This represents a very significant cut to carbon emissions which is welcome news.

Chesterton Windmill Update

The sails were removed in November 2021 as they developed a large crack in two of the sails and one stock. This work needed to be done quickly to avoid the risk of one of the sails falling off and hurting someone. As the structure is a Scheduled Ancient Monument, Historic England have been consulted regarding permissions for the replacement of the sails. This process has taken some time as consideration must be given to both the historic perspective, with a number of different sail designs in use, as well as maintenance and safety. Shortly, Heritage & Culture Warwickshire will submit their preferred design to



Heritage England for consideration, which will then take a few months to approve. Once this is agreed they can begin sourcing the wood to undertake the building of the sails. This may take up to 1/2 years as wood was previously sourced from Russia (now not possible!) and there is a shortage of the type of wood required. The wood will also then require seasoning. Unfortunately, the result of this is that it may take up to two years to see the sails back on the Windmill.

I have had some queries regarding the type of wood and sourcing it which I am currently following up. I am disappointed to be reporting this delay.



The Harbury Swift Village project has received some excellent publicity recently, with articles in the Courier, District Advertiser, Observer and even Country Life magazine!

Although the first swifts were spotted on 2nd May, high in the sky above Harbury, the birds have been slow to return in any numbers. Several people have mentioned to me that they have seen up to eight swifts flying over the Bush Heath Lane area, and half a dozen over Mill Street, but these are not large numbers when compared with previous years. This lack of returners is not just limited to Harbury. There are widespread reports of fewer swifts this year from people in the countrywide Swift Local Network group. We don't know how much of this is lower numbers returning from Africa or how much it is that they are out feeding somewhere where they are not seen. Probably both explanations are at play. Throughout the end of May and into the start of June the prolonged, cold northerly wind must also have had an impact on returning swifts.

In contrast, as I type, we are now experiencing a heat wave, and I have definitely been aware of a more swifts in the sky. As it says in the Action for Swifts blog: "Swifts and warm sunny weather go together like strawberries and cream! The better the weather the more swift activity and the better your chances of (nesting) success in any given year!"

It's not often easy to get swifts to nest in new locations straight away because young swifts breeding for the first time find potential nest sites by following swifts that are already breeding. Ideally, if there are no swifts nesting near you, playing calls will help your nest boxes to be used within a reasonable period of time. There are various recordings and small speakers available, which I mentioned in the February Harbury News article, or you can make your own call box system, as at least one Harbury resident has done! There is a link at the end of this article to the Action for Swifts website which gives further details. Alternatively, you could download the Swift Calls MP3 file for £2 from Action for Swifts and play it on a loop from an old mobile phone, near to your nest box. In the vicinity of our house, swift activity close to our box has definitely been due to the swift calls that have been playing from a bedroom window!

Prospecting young swifts usually begin to arrive in mid-May, so it's worthwhile starting to transmit the calls from then. (Make a note in your diary for next year!) I am informed that playing calls during the second half of June and the first three weeks of July gives the most positive results. Play the calls from just after dawn until just before dusk. Early and late seem to be best, though any time of day in fine weather can be successful. Although a loud volume is ideal for swifts, it is not for your neighbours. Apparently it doesn't have to be very loud to be heard by swifts.

Consider your neighbours: explain to them why you are playing the calls (if they can hear them) and maybe encourage them to install a swift box, too, if they haven't already done so.

By the time you read the next edition of the Harbury News in August, the swifts will have begun their autumn migration back to Africa!

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
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
