
FROM THE RECTOR

As the church year progresses, we move once more into Lent. A season which coincides with springtime and the rebirth of nature and new life which we see all around us. Lent provides an opportunity for each of us to grow spiritually and perhaps experience a reawakening of our relationship with God during its forty days. Both Harbury and Ladbroke churches will be hosting Lent lunches this year, where we can share a simple meal together and donate what we might otherwise have spent to charity, this year the devastated communities of Turkey and Syria. At Harbury this will take place in the Tom Hauley Room each Friday in March at 12.00, and at Ladbroke on Thursday 23rd March and Wednesday 28th again at 12.00. Please contact myself or one of the Ladbroke wardens for the location of these events.

We know times are tough at present, and the temptation might be for us to become too inward-looking, and lose sight of the needs of others. Lent reminds us of our dependency on God, and Jesus teaching that we should put others before ourselves. 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FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

The year is zooming along and Lent is upon us. We are hoping to raise funds for the Turkish-Syria Earthquake Appeal (DEC) in March by holding Lent Lunches.

These will be on Fridays in March - 3rd, 10th, 17th, 24th & 31st - and will be held in the Tom Hauley Room from 12.30 to 1.30pm. This will be a simple lunch of soup, bread and cheese provided by volunteers followed by a short time of reflection. Everyone is welcome, there is no set price and it is up to you what you wish to donate.

A new activity for Harbury Church takes place on the last Sunday of the month. This is called Muddy Church and the first one took place in freezing weather in January. A group of youngsters, led by Andy & Jenny Dean, met at 10.30 at the start of the church service and were taken out around the churchyard where Muddy Church took place. Later they joined the congregation for communion and much needed hot drinks. Like Messy Church, Muddy Church takes place all over the country and "is a space for wandering and wondering with God. Communities exploring faith together in adventure and outdoor spaces."

Work continues on the installation of the new heating system in church and John Stringer has written an article elsewhere in the magazine. We now have new LED lighting in the Tom Hauley Room which the art group greatly appreciates as they can see what they are painting. It will save on electricity costs as well as improving artwork!

Our Annual Parochial Church Meeting will be held on Sunday 16th April following the 10.30 All age service. Members of that council are elected then along with churchwardens so please consider joining that council. We need a new PCC secretary and a new Electoral Roll officer. Thank you to Sally Stringer and Vikki Hall for respectively taking on these roles for the last few years. If anyone is interested in volunteering for either of these roles, please contact us or Rev Andy to find out more.

Messy Church will be held on 2nd April (Palm Sunday) instead of the usual second Sunday 9th April as that is Easter Sunday.

Action at last

All Saints Church, Harbury, is a building site - literally. Inside is a mass of scaffolding, stretching to the roof. Heating panels, like those successfully installed in the Tom Hauley Room, are being fitted to radiate heat on to the congregation. The original

panels will have to be adjusted to fit, and although we may not see the church open for Easter, we hope that the work will be completed by the end of April.

Two new boilers have been fitted. Alone, each one produces two-thirds of the heat needed on the coldest day. In milder weather, only one boiler is needed to raise the temperature to comfortable. The two together will easily heat the church on a freezing Christmas Night. Both are adaptable from gas to hydrogen, a fuel whose introduction is imminent.

Delays for which we are not responsible have meant a late start to the project, with resulting increases in materials and labour costs. Frustratingly, we cannot yet afford to install efficient and effective LED lighting, like that in the Tom Hauley Room. Where costs are concerned, we are running against the wind. One challenge is that fitting the lighting will need scaffolding erected again, when it would have been much more efficient to combine it with the heating work.

We have not yet received approval for essential stonework repairs, despite having listed, measured and photographed every stone we intend to replace.

You can guess where this is leading to. We need more money. The church is already approaching major donors, and a fresh appeal will be launched in the village. The first appeal was astonishing. Village people, including but not exclusively from the congregation, have been enormously generous. To complete the works, and secure our church for generations to come, we need a further two hundred thousand pounds. We gave this - and more - to the first appeal. We can do it again.



Unfortunately, February's listed speaker was unable to be with us, but a quirk of fate in the form of a teachers' strike enabled Chris to take the meeting. She took us on an interesting journey, looking at the observance of Lent through history. Various Christian traditions have used different ways of focussing our own Faith walk on a reflection of Christ's 40 days in the wilderness. Discussion followed with a general agreement that the idea of giving up smoking, alcohol or chocolate could be relevant if the time and money saved was redirected thoughtfully. Most useful, perhaps, is using the time to examine our own ways of living for others and hence for Him.

We shall, as usual, be preparing daffodils for Mothering Sunday on 19th March.

At the March meeting we will have been delighted by Kath Chinn and her Ukrainian eggs. So our next meeting will be on 5th April in the Tom Hauley room. After the communion at 2pm, there will be a talk on Victorian Housekeeping by Ruth Smith from the Children's Society. If you might find this of interest, do please join us. Visitors are always welcome.

He touched on the 'goings-on' involving the notorious Countess Daisy but also the good things she did including the organisation of the annual Dispensary Ball to pay for the Dispensary in Castle Street for the sick and poor of Warwick.

I can't begin to do justice to the wealth of interesting information and stories he told. I urge anyone booking talks for a group to contact him.

There was a packed Village Hall at our open meeting on 7th February to hear Gray and Nicky Lewis talk about their recent excursion on The Silk Road through Kyrgyzstan and Uzbekistan. Tables at the front of the hall were set out with silk, felt and ceramic artefacts which provoked much interest during the interval and at the end of the evening.

Gray explained that The Silk Road westwards from Eastern China was not one road but a series of routes leading to Europe. Merchants with camels would transport goods, ideas and culture stopping at inns termed caravanserai. Gray, Nicky and friends followed part of the route through Kyrgyzstan then Uzbekistan, staying sometimes in hotels and sometimes in yurts in various degrees of comfort! The food, including a lot of horse meat and fermented goats' milk, was apparently also an acquired taste. Gray explained about the history and political situation in each country which was brilliantly illustrated with photographs of buildings and Nicky used videos to explain the processes involved in the craft making.

It was a thoroughly good evening and we can't wait to hear where they are going next.

LADBROKE HERITAGE — HERITAGE Nícky Lewís & Jackie West

Repairs

You may remember we had a ground investigation late last year. It was no surprise that, like most old buildings in Ladbroke and elsewhere, the church has minimal foundations. The buttresses examined stand on clay (+/- a thin weak limestone layer part way down) until about 1.5m below ground level, where there is a solid layer of limestone. At 1m the clay was rather desiccated - probably a combination of the weather last year and the roots of trees in the churchyard. Movement depends on how much the volume changes rather than absolute water content so for now we will just fill the crack in the south aisle wall to keep it weather tight, rather than anything more drastic.

Activities

Regular and recurring events popped up throughout last month and the Heritage and Friendship group restarted. These get-togethers, once a month on a Wednesday morning in the Village Hall have refreshments and a theme; people sometimes bring photos an or object to show others but it's all very informal and undemanding. The group is targeted at people who don't have the opportunity to go out much, perhaps because of their age, health or caring responsibilities and it is dementia friendly too. But no-one is excluded and in February, regulars were joined by a number of other people specifically attracted by the theme of Gardens and Gardening. A few days later we welcomed a group of people from Galanos House to church who wanted to see and find out about Ladbroke Church. Our new portable ramp and sturdy wood chairs with arms meant that everyone was able to come into the chancel and sit down easily to hear a potted history of the building before capturing some of the sights on camera. What was particularly interesting for us was that one visitor's mother had been a live-in servant at Ladbroke Hall about a hundred years ago.

And then it was back to school! We have been disappointed by the lack of interest from local teachers in what we offer, but several from far away have been keen to invite us for Rocks and Fossils sessions. In February Jackie and her samples trekked over to Heron School in Abbeydale, a 1970s suburb of Gloucester. LADBROKE DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE -

Budget

It is that time when the District Council sets its budget and a series of scrutiny meetings are presently leading up to the full council decision on 27th February. The Conservative administration's proposals suggest a council tax rise of £5 for a band D property applied to the district council element of council tax. It is worth noting that the District Council gets its funding from a variety of sources - council tax makes up about 48% and business rates about 24% - the rest comes from various 'pots' of money from central government. One problem for the Council is the difficulty of forward planning these days because the government that used to give 'settlements' for the next three years expenditure, now only gives one year. With many other variables this makes it hard for councils to plan for the future.

The Council does have other sources of income, for instance, because the council has something like £10 million of revenue reserves, increasing interest rates are benefitting the council. Green bin users will have noticed the charge has gone up this year and it is the ruling administration plan for it to go up again for the next five years, year on year. The Lib Dem opposition will propose a review of this and of the collection of 'medical' waste in the grey bins for residents with extra need. The opposition are also proposing more resources to improve planning enforcement. The budget already includes provision for climate change (although we need to see how this is spent), cost of living, and improvements to the housing department processes.

NHS

There has been a small amount of progress on the provision of the Doctor's Surgery at Upper Lighthorne in that the NHS have now acknowledged the need. However at a recent meeting, a date of July 2027 for the permanent health facility emerged. Previous impressions given were mid-2025. Some mechanism needs to be found to deal with the interim period, as patients are registering in the surrounding practices as far away as Southam, placing additional strain on those facilities.

I have been working with GP Practices locally because the additional houses over the past few years and added population naturally increases demand. 1323 houses have been built in the Council wards in and around Southam since 2011 with another 263 approved. Anybody who has queued up at the Southam Chemist will have noted problems, although I suspect there are some other reasons on top of increased demand. I am looking into this.

Postal Voting - Voter ID

I remind residents it is a good idea to get a postal vote to avoid photo ID problems at the polling station for the next election at the beginning of May. There has been some confusion about the last date to apply, which was previously said to be 18th April. It seems that because of the extra pressure the government has caused with these (unnecessary) extra rules, the actual deadline date might be a couple of weeks earlier than before to give election staff more time for processing applications. I recommend that residents apply for a postal vote in good time. More details here:

South Warwickshire Local Plan

This will set future planning policy. I have been in touch with the council about how difficult the public consultation is to understand and use. In response an additional document has now been produced which is intended to help.

This is much more user friendly than the main 1200 page document which is still on the council website for reference. www.southwarwickshire.org.uk/swlp

One thing to look out for is the option of new settlements with some suggestion of sites around this area, among very many other alternatives. Responding to the questions is probably better on the interactive online version so you can dip in and out and focus in on the sections that interest you. You don't need to answer all questions. The 'Issues and Options' questionnaire is about ideas and potential solutions. The council do say they want to hear people's views and no decisions have been taken yet. The Deadline for comments is 6th March.

become the main planning policy for this area until 2050. The parish council will be making its own response to the consultation in due course.

New Flagpole

We have installed a new flagpole at the village hall in time for the Coronation celebrations. The old one was very dirty and we looked into having it professionally cleaned and overhauled but it was going to cost almost as much as a new one with no guarantee that it would be successful.

Cemetery Fence

We have received many positive comments about the new fence at the cemetery but a few people have also raised concerns about the removal of the hedge. We have tried hard to maintain the hedge over the years; it was cut twice a year and was also wired to try and prevent it from growing outwards and obstructing the path but despite our best efforts, it was causing a real problem because pedestrians were unable to use the footpath. The council would never consider removing a hedge that is valuable to the

environment but in this case, the hedge was species poor, i.e. just privet, and there was no evidence of any birds using it for nesting. It was dry and barren and deemed to have little value as a wildlife habitat. There is now the possibility of planting a new hedge using native mixed species on the inside of the fence. The council has not made any decision about this yet but the option is there and may be considered in the future. The removal of the hedge has revealed the steep bank on which it was planted. This is just loose earth at the moment but will be

grass seeded to bind it together and should soon look much greener again.

Bus Shelter at Binswood End

The council recently received a petition for a bus shelter to be installed at Binswood End. We are currently working on this. We need to make sure we have the relevant permission from WCC Highways and check whether planning permission is required as this is within the conservation area.

No Mow May?

We are currently considering the possibility of re-wilding small sections of some of the village greens. Allowing the grass to grow longer and remain uncut for a longer period of time will benefit pollinators, insects and birds in the area. This year, we would like to pilot the idea on part of the greens at Binswood End, the Old New Inn and Manor Road. Should these small areas be successful, then next year we will look at carrying it out on a larger scale. We have written to the residents who live nearest these locations to obtain their thoughts on this but anyone who has an opinion they would like to share with us, please email or write to the clerk stating your name and address and whether you support this proposal or not and giving your reasons.

Budget 2023/24

The parish council recently approved its budget for the coming year beginning on 1 April 2023. Just like everyone else, we have had to take into account rising prices and balance the cost of these against the services we provide to the village. We have been able to reduce spending in some areas but nevertheless, the overall result is an increase in the precept from £119,677 in the current year to £128,900 for next year. This represents an increase of 7.9% on the annual Band D rate from £99.58 to £107.45. The increase is greater than it has been in recent years but is still less than inflation. It's important to remember that every penny raised from the parish precept is spent here in Harbury and Deppers Bridge for the benefit of our residents. A more detailed summary of the budget will be published in due course.

January 2023 Meeting Report

Public Participation - there was quite a number of speakers who had an item on the agenda, which the Council dealt with as they arose.

A villager spoke about the number of stiles there are on various footpaths radiating from the Village and wanted them replaced with kissing gates to help access. The Council agreed to contact the County Rights of Way Officer regards this, as this is a WCC responsibility. The School PTA was requesting a £3000 grant to fund the purchase of reading books for the School - this was agreed to. David Bristow from Harbury Energy Initiative told the meeting that the Group was planning an Energy Saving Fair on Saturday 11th March in the Village Hall. This would provide information and ideas on how households could save energy. As well as seeking financial support, HEI was also hoping for an endorsement for the day from the Parish Council - both were agreed to in principle.

The Harbury & Ladbroke News had submitted a bid for funding the printing costs (£265.00) of the 2023/25 Harbury Directory, again the Council said yes. John Crossling from the local CAMRA Branch spoke about how last year's Beer Festival had had lower numbers attending. One significant factor being the loss of the late night Friday and Saturday buses to and from Learnington. He wondered if anything could be done about providing an evening bus service on those two days? The Council was sympathetic and agreed to contact both the County Council and Stagecoach regarding this. Finally, the Sealed Knott are planning a re-enactment weekend centred on the Playing Fields on the 24th/25th June and were asking for permission for this. The Chairman asked if they had the necessary insurances, which they have, and the Council agreed to their request.

Other Organisations

The Chairman reported that the Library was embarking on a project to improve the insulation of the building and to renew the heating system. Councillor Harris reported on the recent agreement for there to be a healthcare facility on the Upper Lighthorne housing development. Although, it would not be ready until 2027 and, until then, residents living there would have to register with local GP surgeries. Orbit Housing Association is having issues with its plumbing and heating contractor and Cllr. Harris said if any tenants were having problems with repairs to contact herself.

Councillor Kettle drew attention to the Local Plan consultation, which runs to the 8th March. He reiterated how important it was for the PC to respond, as this would set out areas for housing and other developments for the foreseeable future. The PC would consider this at its next meeting, after a SDC briefing due in mid-February. He was pleased to report that in a recent countrywide survey on roads maintenance and pothole repairs, Warwickshire had come top!! Although he was aware of one recent local pothole-damaged car!!

Planning

Councillors made no representation to applications to fell a cypress at the Manor House, conversion of an agricultural unit at Harbury Fields Farm and landscaping at land off Bush Heath Lane. They decided to object to the felling of an Ash at Harbury House, although noting that the Tree Officer had not yet visited the site. The Chairman reported on a meeting with Linfoot Homes who want to build 12 two bedroom 'local market' houses on land behind Hall Lane. The Council felt this would be a positive development for the village.

A conifer tree in the Chapel Street Memorial Garden will be felled (after necessary permission obtained) then the paving will be attended to. Under the 'No Mow May' initiative, areas of the Binswood End green, Manor Road and the Old New Inn greens will not be mown during the early part of the summer. The Council will look at the style, costs and exact siting of a bus shelter at Binswood End.

Finance

The Cemetery Burial fees are going up, although the Chairman said it was still cheaper to be buried in Harbury than at other local cemeteries!! The Parish precept for 2023/24 would be £128,900, equating to an increase of 7.9% on a Band D property. The Councils costs are rising, with their Electricity bill doubling this year.



HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

I have been spending some hours during the cold winter months researching the Victorian era and in particular what it may have been like to have lived in Harbury during the 19th century. The word 'Privy' has cropped up and may need further explanation. 'Privy' an adjective or noun with more than one meaning.

So in this case, the 'privy' in question refers to 'a toilet located in a small shed outside a house or other building'. This would often be shared with neighbours and certainly all members of the family would use it. The privy would often be built a good walk from the house which made it a difficult or impossible journey at night time for the young, elderly or infirm. In this case, a chamber pot would be employed overnight and duly emptied in the morning - into the privy.

Most houses in Victorian times would not have had indoor plumbing, in fact no plumbing at all. The outer reaches of Harbury did not have mains water until the late 1930s / early 1940s and main sewers later than that.

The most basic of privies were built with wooden planks (later brick or stone was used) with a 'tin' roof. A large hole was dug underneath for the 'waste' to collect into; when the hole filled up the structure was moved to another part of the garden, Dry privies relied upon household ash to deodorise human excrement.



There was no toilet tissue, at best squares of newspaper were used as these would decompose. Progress was seen when the waste products were collected instead of 'fertilising the garden'.


I found the following article in a pile of articles donated to the Heritage collection - it was written by village photographer Mike Bloxham and is dated October 1978.

'Souvenir of an Unpleasant Task'

"Just an old galvanised bucket corroding with age, life nearly over, in one of the gardens along Ivy Lane, used for protection and to encourage rhubarb growth. Life was not always so peaceful, memories of thirty years ago, seem like yesterday.

The bucket, condition then bright new, played an important part in collection of village night soil. In those days most toilets or lavatories in Harbury, with the exception of a few large houses, were outside, some distance from the dwellings.

Built rather like a sentry box in size, door on front, open space above door. Bucket placed inside and encased under hinged wooden lid seat. Outside, screened by rambling rose, creeper or shrub, lavender bush near.

During twilight hours, torch or candle considered handy to light way, umbrella when raining, quickness in Winter.

On behalf of Southam R.D.C. the gentleman responsible for the weekly night soil clean out for Harbury, was the late Mr William Marlow and son, along with one or two other good folk mucking in together, a horrible but essential job.

The vehicle used for collecting the night soil was an oval shaped metal tank cart; between the shafts providing traction was a large old shire horse named Dolly. She knew the journey, travelling almost on her own, with minimal guidance.

On collection day, the band of merry men gathered in one of the pubs to replenish with ale before commencement of duty, permitted only after 10pm. On warm nights windows would be closed, people stayed indoors while collectors walked the streets and entered back yards.

Sometimes a mishap occurred; in bad weather, frost and ice under foot and possibly excited by beer. This would result in strong language! After the round was complete Dolly would make her way homeward to Churchlands for storage and treatment of the night soil. Fine tomato plants could be obtained on request from there.

Bill Marlow, well-known local character stocky build, wore a trilby hat; capable of a tune or two from his concertina, in demand at Christmas time. He lived and carried on a small-holding business at Clifton Cottage next door to the Old Chapel House in Mill Street. His front garden always looked nice, showed nasturtium flowers, an arch of roses and a picturesque well which provided lovely drinking water. Among the outbuildings he kept pigs and earth scratching poultry produced free range eggs, pet cats roamed around the site. There were fruit

trees and a walnut tree, alas all gone, three detached houses now stand on the site.

The Marlow's also farmed 'Churchlands' at the Ufton end of the village near to the railway cutting. The red brick barn still stands there. Here the family tended livestock, including horses and several mixed breed cows. There was arable land where the grain crops were threshed in the old-fashioned way. The cows were hand milked, and regular customers were supplied with fresh milk measured from the pail into your own container. This was delivered daily on a bicycle which was pushed rather than ridden."

Long-time Harbury resident, Tony Ceney recalls that "if you were cheeky to Bill Marlow he would throw the contents of the bucket at you - hence small pieces of newspaper 'flowing' down the street". He also recalls that Bill's son Albert was an exceptional athlete and the 'collection' sometimes took place during the day! Tony remarks, 'he was an interesting character and the soil was collected during the day as well!' Max Wilkins, who lived in Farm Street, referred to the Privy as the 'dry closet'. He writes, 'the dry closet was at the end of the garden, most daily papers ended up here, torn into small square pieces. If one disagreed with political statements, one had the remedy in hand'. Thank goodness for modern times!'

I cannot find any record of Bill Marlow in the burial register; the 1939 register shows his date of birth as 9th August 1890, the 1911 census records him as living at 12, Cooperative Terrace (Ivy Lane) with his parents, two sisters and a brother. His occupation is listed as farm labourer; he died in 1968. Bill's wife Rose died in 1944 aged 62 and is buried in Harbury Cemetery. He left a healthy legacy and Clifton Cottage and its land were sold off. Later the cottage was demolished and three detached houses built on the plot.

We will also be explaining the Government's Eco4 and Eco+ schemes that should come on stream sometime from April this year. At the time of writing full details have not yet been released, but it is likely that they will be for lower income householders, in houses and flats in lower council tax bands, and that have lower Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) ratings. There are also grants for specific measures like heat pumps and electric vehicle charging points.

As you know, HEI is a voluntary group. The expenses for this event have been paid by the Parish Council, and our speakers have agreed to provide their time and knowledge free so that people can understand what may be possible for their individual homes and circumstances, either now or in the future. Some of our speakers are from commercial companies, but HEI will not benefit financially from any of them. There is plenty to do this month if the weather isn't frosty or snowy or too wet. If you have to delay some of the jobs it won't be the end of the world, in fact sometimes it is better to wait a while.

Roses will need pruning, remove any dead or weak growth and add some well-rotted manure if you can get it. Sow sweet peas. Sow lots of hardy annuals such as marigolds, cornflowers, love-in-the-mist to give colour and to attract bees and butterflies. With a bit of luck these will self-seed so you will have them each year. Plant summer flowering bulbs such as alliums, galtonia, crocosmia.

Last month would have been a good time to cut back clematis (the late flowering ones), ornamental grasses and any other perennials, if you didn't do it then there is still time now. Also prune any winter flowering shrubs when the flowering has finished ie. Viburnum, Lonicera fragrantissima and willows.

It is time to plant garlic, onion sets and shallots. Sow some broad beans but try to protect from hungry mice. I grow mine in cell trays balanced on something the mice can't get to then,



when they are a couple of inches high, I plant them out. Also sow some peas, salad onions and parsnips.

Don't forget to prune your forsythia and flowering currant shrubs when the flowering is over, cut out some of the older stems almost down to the ground to encourage new growth.

Meanwhile I am continuing the soul destroying process of adding many dead plants

to the compost bins. Those that I moved into the tunnels are fine but I wasn't able to move them all. This is a repeat of what happened in the winter of 2010/2011.

If you are a keen gardener there is always something to do but you can just stand (or sit) and gaze and admire how plants grow either with or without your help.

NATURE NOTES

As spring approaches and it starts to get a little milder, one of our favourite sounds in the early evening is the croaking of frogs in our pond. During the winter months, common frogs have been spending their time resting in the mud at the bottom of the pond, under piles of logs or in our compost Then, in early spring, when the heap. breeding season begins, they emerge and become active to find a mate. Individuals can live for 5-10 years in the wild and usually return year after year to the pond in which they were born. The males tend to arrive first and there is often strong competition amongst them.

The croaking of males is to attract a mate and to compete against other nearby rivals. When a male finds a suitable mate he will attach himself tightly to the female using 'nuptial pads' on his front feet (a condition known as amplexus) and the two individuals may remain like this for many hours during which time the eggs will be laid

and fertilized. Each female lays one or two clumps of frogspawn among marginal vegetation. We have noticed that in our pond this usually takes place around the 15th March. Sometimes we get a maelstrom of mating frogs in the pond because there are so many. Ours is a wildlife pond so we don't have fish, which would otherwise eat the tadpoles, and having the frogs in the garden helps keep slugs at bay.

The common frog is found throughout Britain and Ireland, although its numbers are thought to be in decline because of the disappearance of its usual breeding places and the introduction of disease, so having a small garden pond is helpful to them. But to help reduce the risk of the disease spreading from one pond to another, it is best not transfer spawn or adults between ponds. It's better to let them find your pond without this assistance.

It is remarkable how quickly wildlife will find a new pond to colonise. In addition to frogs, we also have toads and newts, as

well as a whole array of invertebrates. The toads are not as common as the frogs and a few usually arrive later. They have shorter legs and tend to walk or crawl rather than leapfrogging. Another difference is that toadspawn is laid in long strings, whereas frogspawn is in large clumps, so you can tell the difference if you find eggs of these amphibians in a pond.

Being mainly nocturnal, common toads are best spotted at night during the spring, when they too will return to the pond they were spawned. You may see them on their way but do take care when driving on a wet evening because they often cross roads to get to their pond. We know that many make this perilous journey over the road between Temple End and Chesterton Windmill.

The newts in our pond are the smooth newts, one of the three newt species in the UK and much commoner in this part of the country than the palmate newt and the great crested newt. Newts lay their eggs singly wrapped in the leaves of aquatic plants. Their tadpoles are quite distinctive with feathery-looking external gills and, unlike frogs and toads, they develop their front legs first before the hind ones when they are metamorphosing to adults. Adult newts are quite voracious predators of the other smaller inhabitants of the pond and it is fascinating to watch them stalking their

prey among the waterweeds!

How did you get on with the Big Birdwatch this Garden vear? We had more goldfinches than previously but fewer house sparrows and starlings, both of which have declined in abundance over recent vears. However we were pleased to see a couple of lesser redpoll on our bird feeders. This small finch has streaked brown and beige wings and upper parts, and a small black 'bib'. They get their name from the distinctive red forehead (hence

the name 'red poll'), which is more obvious in the male. Their bills are particularly short and conical, adapted for eating small seeds. They are becoming more frequent garden visitors, particularly to feed on nyger seed. This is of considerable interest and importance because lesser redpolls are a species of high conservation concern. You can read more about them on the link below.

FOOD CADDY WASTE -

Following a query from a resident please see the response below.

The Biffa crews collecting your food caddy waste, should use 240 litre red bins as slave bins to empty the food into prior to it going into the truck. The red bins make it obvious to residents that the food isn't going into the garden waste stream. During a recent collection Biffa said that the red bin had broken so they were using what would appear to residents a 'garden waste bin' as a slave bin.

The crews can't empty the smaller 25L caddies straight into the lorries, this would cause serious health and safety issues. If food does end up in the garden waste bin it is still recycled, but the preference is that it goes separate so it can be anaerobically digested at the plant.

THE WINDMILL RESTORATION

By the time you read this, the scaffolding will be going up around the Windmill. Knowing this is a treasured building in the village I thought readers might like to know what is going on.

The replacement of the

The Windmill, towering over the village for another few hundred years



cap 40 years ago undoubtedly saved the mill, but the soft wood that was used on the facias and shingles has now exceeded its workable life and needs to be replaced. It will be replaced with cedar as approved by Stratford & District Council.

Around the same time as the cap was replaced, a considerable quantity of modern hard engineering bricks were used to replace old bricks and fill holes left by the platform poles. After extensive research, we have identified a softer brick to replace these, again with SDC's approval. Any cement pointing will also be replaced with lime mortar which is more appropriate for solid walls.

On the inside, the walls of the top four levels are also covered with cement which is not letting the solid walls breathe as they should, so this will be removed and replaced with a lime plaster with thermal properties.

All the internal workings have been wrapped in clingfilm to protect them during the work



A drone survey showed the wooden roof shingles and facias in need of replacement and modern hard engineering bricks in use

In the last few years, the bottom two levels have been repointed inside and out and so this work on the top four floors and cap, which will last about six months, will mean that the whole mill has undergone renovation in the last three years and should last at least another few hundred.

The amazing original features inside the mill will all be preserved.



WEDNESDAY WALKERS

As walkers, we have been very pleased that "February Filldyke" did not live up to its reputation. From being frozen at the start, the mud has steadily dried up. The snowdrops at Learnington Hastings were later than last



year, but already, with the aconites in that pretty village, putting on a brave show. And we've enjoyed flocks of redwings and fieldfares, seen the splendid park at Coombe Abbey, as well as Upton House.

Next month, on 8th March, we plan to share a pub meal, for those who wish, after a walk at Long Itchington.



Harbury's swift nest boxes are being constructed as I type! I am told that they will be ready by the beginning of March, in perfect timing for installing them before the swifts return to Harbury in early May.

The Parish Council is in charge of the installation process and the details of this will be confirmed in due course. After this, people will be contacted to discuss delivery and fitting.

Swifts feed on flying insects and a lack of insect food is another main reason (apart from lack of nest sites) why swifts are in danger. According to the Natural History Museum, the UK's flying insects have declined by 60% in 20 years, with a major cause of this decline being related to agriculture. It is the use of pesticides and fertilisers that is killing insects, but not just in our fields. A recent study by the University of Sussex has shown that gardeners who use pesticides are also contributing to the decline of British songbirds. Professor Goulson of the School of Life Sciences, at the University of Sussex explains:

"The UK has 22 million gardens, which collectively could be a fantastic refuge for wildlife, but not if they are overly tidy and sprayed with poisons. We just don't need pesticides in our gardens. Many towns around the world are now pesticide free. We should simply ban use of these poisons in urban areas."

In the UK, gardens cover an area of about 400,000 hectares (988,421 acres), an area greater than all of our national nature reserves! So gardeners have an important role to play in the fight against biodiversity decline. The scientists at the University of Sussex have urged people to stop "spraying their gardens with poison" in order to halt bird decline and instead adopt wildlife-friendly practices. Additionally, the Royal Horticultural Society, the UK's leading gardening charity, agrees that the use of pesticides and herbicides should be avoided if possible and they should only be used, if ever, in small and targeted applications.

Apart from not using pesticides, there are a variety of steps that everyone can take to support insects. Growing insect friendly plants in gardens and even window boxes can help provide food for flying insects and so increase food availability for a variety of bird species, including swifts.

Cutting your grass less frequently is another way to make the world more insectfriendly. Not only does this save time and effort, but it promotes the growth of the wildflowers that insects depend on. Giving over an area of your garden to long grass and creating log piles can provide space for insects to lay their eggs, and increase in numbers.

So, providing nest boxes is one way that, over time, we can help to increase swift numbers. Another way to help them (and other birds) is by boosting their insect food supply through simple measures in our gardens.

Improvements Works Update

Good news for the neighbours of the Harbury Parish District where the road improvements are taking place and progressing well.

Following the resident's forum held in October 2022 at the Harbury FC, WCC & Montel Civil Engineering provided a detailed overview of the new road layout and proposed time scales. We are now delighted to share with you further updates on the progress to date.

The long-awaited works have begun with initial site clearance works, removal of vegetation together with the completion of trial holes.



We are pleased to confirm that on 23rd January the Montel site team relocated their welfare cabins and site to a permanent site compound courtesy of The Learnington Football Club.

The diversion of statutory services commenced and has progressed well with both Western Power and Vodafone on site.

Following the diversion of utility services earth works will duly commence followed by the removal of kerb lines thus enabling piling works to commence and finally the good news - the carriageway to be widened.


Project overview

To summarise, the works will include the upgrade of a new signalised junction on the Harbury Lane / Chesterton Road crossroads.

The following works will be carried out:

General Arrangement Plan

- · Existing utility diversion works
- · Carriageway widening
- Carriageway resurfacing and road markings
- · Drainage works
- Construction of retaining structures
- · Footway construction
- · Landscaping works
- Installation of traffic signal apparatus, road signs and street lighting



The works are necessary to satisfy planning conditions associated with the Taylor Wimpey and David Wilson/Barratt Homes housing development to improve the safety and the capacity of the road junction.

Traffic Management

The four-way temporary traffic light system is now in place and is set up in one of four configurations to suit the location of the works at the time.

Please note - This is being monitored daily to ensure the continued flow of traffic along the carriageway.

Traffic management may be required for the duration of the works however, we will endeavour to remove the temporary signals whenever safely possible.

You said, we did

Following the Community Meeting held on Monday 24th October in Harbury, a number

of residents raised concerns around the initial design of the traffic signal junction to be commissioned within the road layout. Following significant discussion with residents, it was requested by the Elected Member (CIIr Kettle) and supported by a number of residents that Harbury Lane and Chesterton Road would be safer if the proposed design could accommodate separate signal stages to minimise the conflict in the middle of the junction.

Please be advised that the traffic signal design has been amended to address the concerns raised during the meeting. Harbury Lane and Chesterton Road will now have separate signal stages as part of the re design agreed.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your patience and understanding whilst we continue to make good progress.

We look forward to providing you with further news - updates will be provided in Spring/ Summer 2023 by Montel Civil Engineering in association with WCC section278 Team.

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
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
