LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting on 13th September started with an update on HS2 works by Simon Davis, from EFKB, the civil engineering contractors working on the line south of Southam:

The **one way traffic lights on the A423** near the entrance to Starbold Farm were linked to the relocation of the high voltage electricity line which involves the deep excavation close to the carriageway. The hole will be temporarily filled and those lights removed while parts are awaited to finish the job.

The **A423 overbridge** is progressing with the south abutments and ramp in place; some work on the north side will wait until the power line move is completed. There will lots more to do in 2024 so the earliest date for the tie-in to the existing road is predicted to be late 2024. SPOILER ALERT - this tie-in, and therefore closure of the A423 will take longer than one weekend, as previously stated. This news did not go down well with the councillors, who while not wishing to "shoot the messager" emphasised that they expect a serious effort against extra traffic coming through the village. Closure(s) of the A423 must be scheduled when there is negligible working traffic and tightly managed. Councillors also wanted to get an understanding of the duration of the closure, whether more resources would shorten it, if it would be weather dependent, whether there an option to have some extra temporary tarmac laid to keep the traffic flowing etc. There were concerns too regarding heavy traffic over the weak bridge in Church Road and some debate as to

whether limitation on use by heavy vehicles is because of environmental concerns (which can be paused by the Highways Authority) or due risk of damage from weighty vehicles using it.

Other road closures

Work on the green overbridge between Wormeighton and Priors Hardwick means that Stoneton Lane/Leisure Drive will be closed for 18 months to two years; this will impact Hill Farm, The Butchers Arms etc from November. Travel between Fenny Compton and Chipping Warden will be affected by various road closures as well. The Wormleighton Road will be closed for four weeks, starting in October. Catteralls, who will need to change the school bus route serving Ladbroke, are aware.

Noisy sheet piling (corrugated sheets to support the banks) is about to start on the Oxford Canal Viaduct. This will be in daytime only and is expected to start by early October and last two to four weeks.

In Radbourne they are working on the viaduct and farm overbridges, called accomodation overbridges.

The mobile engagement unit is elsewhere at present but expected back here next year.

WCC

Cllr Kettle had sent in a written report so this only covers what was actually said at the meeting. He started by saying we should "Hold HS2's noses to the grindstone" and insist they go through in detail changes affecting us.

Regarding anti-speeding measures in Ladbroke, marking the road surface should be completed within the next two weeks but the proposed gateways will not happen.

The delays installing traffic lights at the Harbury Lane crossroads are for two reasons: moving the utilities and extra work requested by SDC because of the impact on an occupied house of the piling needed. Thus a seven month job is expected to take a year.

Each year county councillors have a £8000 grant fund for their communities, Cllr Kettle has £1500 remaining for this year.

There is only one WCC - maintained school building with RAAC which has already had mitigation works and re-opened, two academies are also affected (Myton and Aylesford) and the extent of RAAC used in Fire Stations and other public buildings is still being assessed.

There is a new school bus schedule this year for Priors Marston to Southam (including Ladbroke) which seem to be working well but if there are problems let Cllr Kettle know.

WCC and SDC have financial challenges but neither are near the point of a 114 notice when a council is significantly at risk and the Finance Officer has to become a whistle blower, as happened at Birmingham Council and others.

SDC

Cllr Ostander reported the creation of the "Eastern 7" group, the seven ward members representing this side of the county, as the full council is Stratford-centric with regard to policing, transport, infrastructure and less interested than us in HS2.

She had given the chairman of Ladbroke Millennium Green Trust ideas about sources of funding (CIL being the largest) and offered to support grant applications.

SDC are drawing up a new council plan for the next four years which is out for consultation.

National government has a massive agenda and local government will have to facilitate changes but there is also a desire to get information flowing from grass roots in the other direction. Cllr Ostrander will be speaking to the clerk of the parish council to find out about Ladbroke issues and is keen to meet community groups. She was immediately invited to the Harvest Brunch and a Heritage & Friendship Group session as these provide good opportunities to meet Ladbroke residents.

Electricity costs

Streetlight energy costs are very high, the council will investigate if assumed consumption should have been reduced when we changed to low energy lights, also the clerk was authorised to change supplier provided the contract does not restrict changes in future.

No electricity supply is needed for the phonebox as there is no light or equipment in it.

Planning

The "stable block" at the end of Windmill Lane is likely to go to the Planning Committee during October; pro bono advice for objection has been sought. It was noted that roadworks are planned in Windmill Lane to bring electricity in to the site.

Website & email

Almost all the content is now loaded onto the new website, ladbroke-pc.gov.uk Hugo Fox have introduced charges for Parish Council websites. Ladbroke are using the cheaper option without planning permission functionality so this page (currently misleading) will be replaced with a link to the SDC planning webpage. The clerk's email is now clerk@ladbroke-pc.gov.uk and each parish councillor has one too.

The public, including your HLNews volunteer, then left the meeting for a confidential section on contracts.

INSPIRING WOMEN LADBROKE & DEPPERS BRIDGE WI Carol Lane

There was a bumper turnout on Thursday7thSeptemberinLadbroke Village Hall to hear our home grown speakers Geoff (Timms) and Jo (Horne) 'In conversation'. They didn't disappoint!

Geoff began by relating his early life from his birth in Brook Cottage, which became Sarah's Cottage, in Bridge Lane. He attended Ladbroke School from the age of five but as there was an influx of evacuees, the school room was not large enough and the boys were taught in the Village Hall. As there was neither mains water nor electricity in the village, the room was warmed with



coke stoves which didn't give off much heat.

Both Geoff and Jo recounted their experiences of the Coventry Blitz: Geoff witnessed the red sky from Windmill Hill but Jo, living in Wolston, just outside Coventry, heard and felt the bombing and vividly remembers the devastation which she witnessed when her she and her mother went to the railway station the next day. Geoff and his friend saw a training plane from Wellesbourne in trouble and heard the crash as it came down in Hodnell, killing all seven Canadian airmen. Geoff and his friends set off at a run to get as close as they could to the scene.

Geoff took the 11+ but no-one from the Southam area passed as there were no vacancies in either Warwick School or Leamington College. However he seemed to have enjoyed life at Southam School recounting a prank when he and his friends used the whitewash from the cricket pitch lines to paint the headmaster's bicycle. The ringleader was caned but Geoff said he would have remembered if he had been!

As soon as he was 14, he went to work in a garage in Learnington for £1 per week. Offered an apprenticeship two years later, would have meant cycling to Coventry in the evenings after a day's work so as there was a vacancy for a gardener at Ladbroke Hall where his father had responsibility for a herd of Guernsey cows, he worked there for the rest of his working life.

Jo, born in Wormleighton, took us further afield with stories of the Spencers of Althorpe and the changes in the owners of Ladbroke Hall. Jo became a makeup artist learning under the famous Mr Teasy Weasy, working at film studios in London and the Midlands where she had her own salon.

She met her future husband, Derek, when she drove her golf ball into him on the golf course. He complained about her - then married her 10 weeks later, the start of 56 years together. They brought up their four children and others in need of care at Christmas Hill Farm in Bishops Itchington. Derek died in 2013 and Jo moved to her present home in Ladbroke.

In the Business meeting Dianne gave a brief resume of the finances. She expressed her gratitude for the Tom Hauley Room coffee mornings, thanked Heather for organising the monthly raffle and Sue Moore and Sue Dargan for the recent monthly Bring and Buy initiative.

At the Warwickshire Federation Annual Meeting in the Spa Centre, the speakers were Nick Bailey, the TV gardening expert talking about colour in the garden and James Squire from the Warwickshire Police Cyber Unit.

Thirteen members had enjoyed the guided tour of Hill Gardens in Warwick.

The WI have traditionally had the responsibility for the flower tubs outside the village hall which have been tended to by Jenny for many years. Volunteers were requested to take on this job, either singly or in a rota.

LADBROKE PHOTOGRAPHY Kíp Warr

We were back in the village hall for our September meeting where John Lewis (not a retailer!) gave a talk titled "Making Colour Work in Photography". Colour photography dates back to 1861 when James Clerk Maxwell demonstrated a coloured image of a tartan ribbon. Academics are still happily disputing whether it was really colour photography and anyway it was too complicated to be practical. Further complex systems were developed until Kodak produced the first popular colour film in the 1930s.

We like colour photographs because they portray the world as we humans see it (birds see more colours, cats see fewer and insects see

different colours). Colours can affect our feelings, even taste (blue chips or black tomatoes, anyone?). We can use red in photographs to portray passion or energy, blue for coolness and green for tranquillity. Warm colours tend to stand out while cool colours recede.



The best times for outdoor photography are the 'Golden hours' around sunrise and sunset when the light is soft and warm, or the cooler 'Blue hours' when the sun is just below the horizon. And then there is colour harmony which John illustrated with the colour wheel. Colours that harmonise or contrast, depending on their relative positions on the wheel. For example colours opposite each other on the wheel are complementary whilst those that are adjacent harmonise. He showed how great artists used these relationships in

their paintings - I don't think we are quite up to that standard yet.

Manor House Visit

To celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Harbury Society it was thought fitting to arrange a visit to the Harbury Manor House, the iconic building that galvanized many members of the community to oppose its demolition in the 1970s. The success of this campaign led to the formation of the Harbury Society which has since been instrumental in monitoring planning with the aim of preserving the culture and character of our village. On Tuesday 22nd August, the current owners of the property, Brendan and Frances (Fran)



Watts generously opened their doors to Society members. They were then given a guided tour of the Manor led by Fran, who pointed out many of the interesting features of this lovely property. Following this, tea with home baked scones, served with jam and cream, gave members the opportunity to refresh themselves. The weather was kind to us that day, so we were able to sit outside in the delightful Manor garden soaking up the sunshine that has been all too scarce this summer.

The building has been modified, extended and altered many times over the years but some of the earliest parts are thought to date from the Tudor period, and the fact that it all sits together so well is evidence of the thought and effort that has made it happen.

Society chairman, Ed Wilson, presented Fran and Brendan with a Heritage Medal for taking on the challenge of maintaining the Manor House. Having seen at first hand the work they have done since acquiring the property, Harbury Society couldn't be happier that, after their efforts to save this special building all those years ago, the Manor has now found itself in some very capable and loving hands.



The Last Man in the World

Our new season of talks kicked off on Tuesday 19th September to a full house with a presentation by Peter Walshe, with an account of his life as an actor.

He was born in Newport, Wales and, when he was 18 months old, his family moved to South Africa. Travelling in a flying boat they made an overnight stop in Egypt where Peter narrowly escaped being dropped into the Nile. He spent the next 14 years in a village called Hillcrest near Durban. Peter returned to England at the age of 15 and managed to secure a place at Bromley Grammar School, where he pursued his love of the stage. Mrs Franklin was the drama teacher and awarded him the part of Ross in the play about Lawrence of Arabia after Peter had impressed her by describing his performance of Oedipus in South Africa. He had played the part so effectively, that a member of the audience had fainted during the scene where Oedipus blinds himself.

Following school, Peter performed with the National Youth Theatre at the Scala Theatre in a production of Anthony and Cleopatra which also starred Helen Mirren. In 1969 he was playing several parts in a version of Henry IV part 1 where he had to exit the stage and then make his way underneath it while explosions were occurring above, he would then reappear as a different character. During one performance, Peter's timing went awry resulting in him being too close to the explosions and rendering him temporarily deaf. He couldn't hear what the other actors were saying and he couldn't hear the prompt either, resulting in extreme confusion.

However, these performances helped him to audition for a place at the The Royal Central School of Speech and Drama. During the audition Peter managed to trip up the steps to the stage making everyone laugh - this obviously impressed the judges because he was awarded a place. He graduated in 1970 and his first job was in Midsummer Night's Dream which also starred Brian Cox. Peter's part was 'Mustard Seed' and difficulty with the costume led to him being painted yellow all over with just a piece of material glued on to protect his modesty. The intention was for him to assist with lifting Titania while singing her to sleep. Unfortunately the strength of the adhesive failed and the modesty patch pinged off rendering Peter unable to assist with the lifting as he attempted to cover his embarrassment.

He appeared as a waiter with Tom Courtenay, who he said was the nicest actor imaginable, in a production of Peer Gynt, where he had to hand Tom a cigar to smoke. During one performance, someone persuaded Peter to use a gigantic cigar, smuggled up his sleeve. After handing it over, without a moment's hesitation, Tom Courtenay asked if he had anything larger.

For an information film for Hillingdon Hospital, Peter was cast as an ill patient and, as a result, was heavily made up. During a break the director handed over some money and asked Peter to go to the canteen for refreshments for the cast. Whilst in the queue at the canteen, suspicions were raised and Peter was consequently escorted to the psychiatric ward by three orderlies and his situation had to be explained by the film crew before he could be released.

Peter continued with numerous anecdotes about his performances, working with actors like John Hurt in the Naked Civil Servant and many others. He went on to explain the precarious nature of the business - he estimates that 90% of actors are out of work at any one time and that only 5% make a living entirely from acting.

The Last Man in the World were two episodes of Doctor Who that Peter had a part in and he showed some clips. Tom Baker had the part of Doctor Who and, during filming, he fell and broke his collar bone and had to be hospitalized. Upon hearing that he was going to be replaced he discharged himself at midnight and arrived at the set the following day, heavily bandaged. This was disguised using a prop, a large scarf which went on to become a feature. Peter was playing the part of an alien, chosen because he could



speak with a South African accent, which the director thought sounded quite alien.

After nine years of acting he became involved in the market research field, joining a small company called Millward Brown and moving to Harbury with his wife Beverley where their two sons Doug and Benn were both born and raised. As Millward Brown progressed to become a global leader, Peter was promoted to become the Global Brand Director. With his acting background, he became the spokesman for the company and appeared on many TV and Radio programmes and was interviewed by John Humphrys for the Today programme.

He is now retired but continues to volunteer for e-Wheels and Peter and Beverley's sons now both work in the media.

After some questions and answers, Peter was warmly thanked by Chairman Ed and was enthusiastically applauded by the audience.

Harbury WI resumed their monthly meetings on 14th September. Members were congratulated on their success at the village show particularly Maureen Handle who won the WI cup; Maureen had also won 1st and 3rd prize in a Warwickshire WI photographic competition.

Our speaker for the evening was Judy Warner who is a volunteer with Zoe's Place Baby Hospice in Coventry. The first Baby Hospice was set up 30 years ago in Liverpool and there are now Hospices in Middlesbrough and Coventry as well. The Coventry Hospice is based on land adjacent to Exhall Grange School which Warwickshire County Council gave to the hospice for a peppercorn rent in 2009.

The strap line for the hospice is "a home from home for babies with life limiting and life threatening conditions". It costs 1.5 million pounds for each hospice per year; they receive 10% from the government and the rest is very much dependent on a range of fund raising.

Although the hospice can have 40 children on their books they only accommodate six children at a time. Zoe's Place provides Respite, Palliative and End of Life Care for children 0 to 5 years.

The main service is giving respite care either in the form of day care or for a couple of days and nights. They also try to support the family - parents need a break and also need to give time to siblings.

The Hospice employs highly skilled nurses and play workers. They take their patients on outings and have visitors such as therapy dogs, alpacas and even snakes.

They have a Graduation Wall and a graduation party for children who are discharged from the hospice which hopefully gives hope to families.

Judy described the wide range of fund raising that has to be undertaken including a recently produced cake recipe book and being part of Children in Need. This was a really moving talk enlightened by a visiting grandmother who confirmed the support that Zoe's Baby Hospice had given to her family.

Our annual Harvest Supper was held in the Village Hall on 22nd September. A meal was enjoyed by members and guests provided by a group of members. The speaker was Alan Rogers MBE who gave an amusing talk describing his life as a local policeman. He became a cadet in 1971 and worked in Warwick, Leamington and Kenilworth areas for about 30 years taking on various roles.

At our next meeting on 12th October we shall welcome Pam Kallender from the Glass Barge who is going to talk about Fused Glass Art.

We look forward to a WI lunch at The Crown on 26th October.

The next Rural Cinema will be held in the Village Hall on Saturday 21st October when the film will be "The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry." The film stars Jim Broadbent and Penelope Wilton - the story of a man who sets off on a remarkable Journey. 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



GARDEN JOTTINGS

Does your garden look dreary through the winter months? Having a few splashes of colour can lift your spirits on dark days. I wouldn't be without Lonicera fragrantissima. This is a shrubby honeysuckle which has creamy scented flowers for weeks and attracts bees. Viburnum farreri 'Nanum' is a slow growing shrub with small pink flowers from mid to late winter. The shrubby wallflower, Erysimum 'Bowles Mauve' is a mass of purple flowers almost all year round. One of my favourite shrubs is Cornus alba 'Elegantissima', the red stems show up well from October til March. To see a wide range of colourful plants do try to visit places such as Anglesey Abbey in Cambridgeshire where there is a wonderful, much photographed winter garden.

One of my favourite roses here is one called Sally Holmes, she has masses of flowers and is completely disease-free. I intend taking lots of hardwood cuttings this month. Books tell you to dig a trench outside and put your 6-10 inch cuttings in it but it would get waterlogged so I put them in deep pots round the edge and keep them in the tunnel. They don't all root but any that do are very pleasing. I never get tired of propagating plants, it is so satisfying.

On our local walks we have been watching the leaves starting to change colour as Autumn approaches. Before the trees and hedgerows lose their leaves it is worth taking a closer look to see what might be hidden among the leaves and branches. Oaks in particular are regarded as having more associated species of wildlife than any other native trees in England. These organisms range from fungi, lichens, mosses and invertebrate animals to birds and mammals. During the year oaks support over 280 different insect species, such as moth and butterfly caterpillars that feed on the leaves, and beetles that burrow under the bark.

There is also one group of insects that have a fascinating relationship with the oak trees. These are the gall wasps - very tiny insects, unlike the much larger yellow and black wasps that bother us in the garden. The gall wasps cause the oak to develop odd-shaped growths on the foliage, flowers, acorns and stems of the tree. Female gall wasps insert eggs into the appropriate part of the oak tree, such as buds or acorns. On hatching, the legless grubs begin secreting chemicals that cause a reorganisation of the oak's normal growth processes. Instead of producing normal oak tree tissues, the gall structures are created by the plant around the developing grubs, which then eat the inside of the gall. There are around 70 different gall wasps of oak in Britain and each species produces distinctive galls. Some have two generations a year each producing a different type of gall.

We found several different galls in the local hedgerow oaks this year. Perhaps the most well-known is the oak apple; a large and spongy, pale green growth on the oak twig. In the summer they become cream/pink or red, and then brown later in the year. Inside are multiple larval chambers each with a developing gall wasp. The appropriately named artichoke gall is formed in buds at the shoot tips, which become greatly enlarged during the summer. Their second generation (in spring) develops small hairy pale green or brown galls on the male catkins. Also look out for the curious knopper galls on



the oak acorns. Instead of the normal cup and nut, the acorn is converted into a ridged woody structure in which the gall wasp larvae develop. The gall is initially yellowish green and sticky but later becomes greyish brown. The knopper gall wasp became established in Britain during the 1960s and is now found throughout England, Wales and as far north as Scotland. This month



these galls will drop from the trees in huge numbers, crunching underfoot on the pathways.

Look on the underside of some oak leaves and you might see spangle galls. These are saucer-shaped, yellowish-green or pinkish-red discs up to 4mm in diameter. Each gall contains a single larva that pupates during the winter while the galls are on the ground and the tiny wasp emerges the following spring.

The oak marble gall wasp causes hard woody spherical galls up to 25mm in diameter on the stems. Marble galls are initially green but later become brown and can persist for several

years. Marble galls have a high concentration of tannin and when extracted, and combined with iron sulphate, produce oak gall ink. The earliest recipes for oak gall ink come from Pliny the Elder at the time of the Roman Empire. Many famous and important manuscripts from the middle ages were written using oak gall ink and Leonardo da Vinci used it for his drawings.

Gall wasps use many other plants as their hosts. One particularly conspicuous is the robin's pincushion. This widespread and common gall can be found developing on the stems of dog-roses during late summer. The gall is surrounded by a dense mass of sticky branched filaments. This structure gives the appearance of a ball of moss; starting off green and then passing through pink and crimson to reddish brown as it matures in autumn. A large specimen can be up to 10 cm (4 in) wide and hold many grubs, which feed on the gall tissues throughout the winter and emerge in spring as adults. We saw many of these galls at Ufton Fields nature reserve recently.

It is always good to hear from people who have been spotting local wildlife. We have heard a number of records of hawk-moth caterpillars being found in gardens around the village. Hugh Tottle sent us a photo of a privet hawk-moth caterpillar: lime-green with purple-and-white streaks

on the side and a big, blackish hook at the tail end. These caterpillars feed mainly on privet, but also on ash and lilac leaves. Several people have also seen elephant hawk-moth caterpillars this year. Terry Hunt sent of a photo of one, clearly showing the two spots behind its head, which look like eyes but are just patterns that swell up to scare off predators. The caterpillars mainly feed on willowherbs and bedstraws, although Susie Dronfield found several of these caterpillars feeding on the fuchsias in her hanging baskets!

HARBURY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

After the summer break I am enjoying getting back to the Parish Council meetings and providing help and support where I can. One major irritation for many is the delay on the installation of the traffic lights at the Fosse crossroads. There is some good and some bad news associated with this so I will start with the good: there is no cost to the taxpayer as this is a fully externally funded project. It is being funded by a private developer as part of their planning development conditions.

The bad news is that due to delays caused by the utility companies and environmental concerns over noise and dust from the piling work for adjacent homes, the project will not be completed until early 2024. This is unacceptable and I know that your County Councillor Chris Kettle is chasing this as it is a highways issue and thus ultimately comes under their remit.

Other points of interest for residents:

Council Plan

The Council Plan detailing the priorities for the new administration in our district will soon be ready for public consultation. This is the result of many hours of careful and considered work by the Council's Cabinet, Staff, and all Councillors. Public Consultation will begin on or around 21st September and we welcome your views and comments. See www.stratford.gov.uk

Armed Forces Covenant

The Council's Cabinet recently considered a proposal that the Council should join the Armed Forces Covenant. In fact, the Council has been a signatory to this protocol for some years, but the Cabinet decided to improve upon this by appointing a Councillor - Cllr Dominic Skinner (Lib Dem Quinton) as Covenant Champion. Dominic is a member of the armed forces reserve.

Also, it was decided that the Council will apply for the Bronze Award under the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme and recommend this to the full Council for ratification to show support for our service veterans. Consideration will be given towards the requirements for the Silver Award.

Shopmobility

Many people will be familiar with the Shopmobility service that provides mobility support for the less able in shopping centres across the country. In Stratford town centre the council's funding was due to cease in March 24 and the Cabinet was keen to ensure its continuity. Various options were considered to ensure the future delivery of the service and it was decided to make an arrangement with a provider for a one-off contribution from the Council of approximately £25k.

This proposal gave good value for money, increased opening hours and an extra location within the town from which to deliver support. This adds to the existing location at the Bridgefoot car park on the one-way system where the road from the M40/Warwick direction enters the town.

There is also a Shopmobility service based in the Royal Priors carpark in Learnington - Editors




