FROM THE RECTOR

During the run up to the General election, all the political parties will have the chance to win your vote. Perhaps you're excited, or just feel a sense of weariness. Maybe you are hopeful about what the prospect of a potential change in government may bring, or fearful of what such a change might mean. Christians should be engaged in the national debate because Jesus told us to love our neighbour and, if we care about them, we care about the laws and policies that come out of Westminster and the impact they have on all of our lives.

Voting is a chance not only to hold MPs to account, but it also provides space for us to engage directly with local candidates and contribute to the common good of society. While we don't yet know the outcome of this election (although the bookies seem to have a pretty clear idea) we do know that all human authority comes directly from God. That means we should cover this election in prayer, and vote with faith and prayerful optimism.



Each year, on appointment as churchwardens, we have to attend a special service in order to be 'sworn in' to the role. This year, one of the services in the Coventry Diocese was held here in Harbury, and on 12th June we had 130 Churchwardens, Clergy and others at a lovely service. Liz and Ruth ran a Messy Church stand at Harbury Carnival. We loved seeing so many young people come and enjoy sand art, painting with broccoli and decorating shortbread. The next Messy Church is on Sunday 14th July at 3pm where the theme will be the Olympics.

On 16th June two of our teenagers were Confirmed at St James', Southam. Confirmation is a special service, led by a Bishop, where individuals confirm promises made at their baptism and invite the Holy Spirit into their lives. There was no 10.30 service in Harbury that day so that members of the congregation could go and support. It was a very uplifting service led by Bishop David Evans.

In fact it was fascinating. We were the guests of David Jesset at Slot Car Scenics in Kineton. They produce scale models of everything to go with a model car race track (think Scalextric) from buildings and tyre walls to pit crews and miniature photographers with long



lenses. Some of their clients order complete layouts with track, scenery and spectators, and with lighting for night racing.

They even take 3-D scans of people at races and reproduce them at 1/32 scale (they will make you a thumb-sized model of yourself if you like). David obliged us with day and night track lighting and drove a car round so that we could catch the blur of its movement.

First, a big thank you to the ten volunteers who came along on Saturday 8th June to the **Churchyard Tidy Up** and double thanks to those who said they would return and do more. No longer will walkers on the footpath through the churchyard get their hair inadvertantly brushed by the overhanging foliage. Various bushes and encroaching elder were cut back and the gravel and some graves reclaimed from the weeds. One volunteer, having no relatives buried nearby, offered to look after a grave in Ladbroke churchyard in future, an offer we readily accepted. There are many more graves that would would benefit from regular TLC so if any readers would like to do likewise and "adopt a grave" please have a word with Jackie or Sue M.



The fish in the **Phone box** have now swum away and some fantastic butterflies, bees and dragonflies have appeared, do take a look when you are passing. There are colouring sheets in the church porch and, given the number taken so far, I think there must be a lot of colouring in progress. Please hand in the finished pictures plus any other 2D or 3D creations, so they can be installed in the new exhibition.

There was a real buzz at our June meeting of the **Heritage and Friendship Group** as people shared their personal and family memories of the First and Second World Wars. Alan brought along his grandfather's medals which included the military medal and a letter, now more than a hundred years old, explaining to his fiancée and her father what he did to receive it - he had rescued an officer under fire.

Closer to home, we discovered that during WW2 not one but two of our regulars, then just school boys, had gone inside the same British bomber plane that made an emergency/ crash landing in a field at the edge of Deppers Bridge, before it was transported away. Geoff remembered Ladbroke being full of refugees, especially after the Coventry Blitz. There were so many children they didn't all fit into Ladbroke School building, consequently some classes moved to the Village Hall. In fact, Don only came to Ladbroke because the family home in Leamington was damaged/destroyed the night of the Coventry Blitz. Luckily he and his parents were in a neighbour's bomb shelter at the time.

People may remember loud bangs at our next meeting too, but much happier ones as our theme is Circuses and Fairs. That meeting is on Wednesday 3rd July, 10.30 - 12 noon at The Old School. For more information or to let us know you are coming please phone 814175.

Finally, for those who like to get dates in the diary early, Ladbroke Church will once again be taking part in Heritage Open Days in September. There will guided tours on Saturday 7th September and a small exhibition from Friday 6th - Sunday 8th. More details next month. Notes of the Annual Parish Meeting held on Thursday 9th May

Chairman - Tim Lockley began his report with a plea for volunteers to join the Parish Council. With Jess Dominick unfortunately having to resign her seat, there are now two vacancies on the Council. The PC had provided input to the District Council's local Plan. However, the Chairman was concerned that whilst the Plan identified areas for housing development, these, in many cases, were well away from suitable supporting infrastructure – major roads and certainly railways lines. Tim also updated on the latest delay to the Harbury Lane traffic lights – waiting for the power supply to the street lighting to be connected!! Apparently, fixed traffic lights cannot be operational without illumination during darkness.

Planning - Cllr Allen noted that there was to be an equalisation on the housing target between Stratford and Warwick District Councils. Also Coventry's population growth had been revised down by 30,000. This would lead to a reduction in the number of houses that Warwickshire would have to provide to cater for the overspill from Coventry. The developer of the proposed industrial units at Sharmer Farm on the Fosse wished them to be as energy efficient as possible. They wished to meet with Harbury Energy Initiative to discuss this further.







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www.modernhomesleamington.co.uk info@modernhomesleamington.co.uk 37 Longfield Road, Leamington Spa, CV31 1XB **Environment** - Cllr Potter reported that in the year, some semi-mature trees had been planted on the green in Frances Road and up at the Five Ways junction at the top of Bush Heath Lane. A number of stiles had been replaced with gates on Footpath SM27 leading to Ufton fields. In the near future the Council would be checking on hedges/trees spreading onto pavements in the village and where necessary asking the owner to cut the growth back.

Properties - the year had seen the purchase of the Hall Lane allotments. A report on the condition and suggested remedial works to the boundary wall had just been received. Agreements with the allotment holders were being put in place. The extension to the Village Hall car park had recently been completed, however, the finish was not wheelchair or pram friendly and a solution to this was being looked at.

Finance & General Purposes - the Council is saving funds in order to be able to purchase a plot of land for a new cemetery in due course. There was concern about the maintenance of the Village Street lights – the PC pays Warwickshire CC to maintain them on its behalf. However, there was concern about the poor service and lack of repairs to reported faults.

There were then a number of reports from Village organisations. Liz Ball, on behalf of the Library & Biblio's, advised that there was now a new Chairman in place. The first aim was to look at the Governance of the Library. It was hopeful that work on replacing the heating system could commence during the summer.

Harbury Twinning - Sharon Hancock advised that a party from Samois were due to visit in May. Sadly, the membership on both sides of the Channel is getting older and younger villagers don't seem to be interesting in joining in.

E-wheels noted that numbers using the service has not returned to pre-covid levels. A number of the Swift boxes fitted on houses in the village were being used by starlings.

From the Primary School - Head teacher, Lucy Bosley, stressed the importance of the community links that existed with the Library, Heritage Centre and the Church. She thanked the Parish Council for its grant towards the creation of a nurture area for the children. The school was looking at ways to make itself more sustainable.

District Councillor Ostrander gave a summary of her first year as a councillor. A key role she had found was as a communication link between villagers and other departments within Stratford District and Warwickshire County Councils. She had attended the Council's Planning Committee and planning issues took up much of her time.

Annual and Ordinary Meetings of the Parish Council held on 23rd May 2024

Annual Meeting

Each May the parish council holds two meetings back to back, the first being the **Annual Meeting of the Parish Council** which is its AGM. The first item of business was to elect the chairman for the forthcoming year and Cllr Tim Lockley was unanimously re-elected for this position. Cllr Julie Balch was unanimously elected as vice-chair. The council then considered its representatives on the various working parties: Planning, Properties, Environment, Climate, Finance & General Purposes and Staffing. It was agreed that these should remain unchanged with the exception of Cllr Allen transferring from Environment to Climate and Cllr Gard becoming the lead on Climate. The representatives from the council to various outside bodies such as Harbury School were also left unchanged. Having briskly concluded these items the Annual Meeting concluded at 7.36pm and we were able to move on to the main business of the evening.

Ordinary Meeting

Vacancy for a Parish Councillor: Following the resignation of Cllr Dominick, the council now has two vacancies for parish councillors. Anyone who feels they would like to take on this important and interesting role should contact the parish clerk – clerk@harbury-pc.gov. uk

Public Participation: It was agreed to move the discussion on the surfacing of the car park extension from further down the agenda. Paul Quinney from the Future Energy Group explained several councillors had met to on site to consider the Grasscrete surfacing and the potential problems it may pose for pram and wheelchair users. They had agreed that the best solution would be to ask for extra filling across a roughly nine hole wide strip down the centre, in effect creating a path. It was also noted that WCC will go out to tender in June for the remaining infrastructure for the project – the EV charging points and battery.

"Is the Neighbourhood Plan still fit for purpose?" was the next question that the council faced as a member of the public pointed out that several recent planning applications had potentially breached the settlement boundary; was the Plan still robust enough to protect the village against such applications or did it need to be updated? Cllr Allen replied that any new neighbourhood plan would need to align with the South Warwickshire Local Plan which will not be ready for 3+ years so there would be no point in updating local plans at the moment. In the meantime, our Neighbourhood Plan continues to be used as supplementary planning guidance when considering applications.

Other residents were in attendance about planning applications or to raise concerns about noise and lack of signs reminding people that the car park is in a residential area and agreed to wait until their items came up on the agenda.

Grant Application: The council agreed an application from the newly re-formed Toddler Group for £60 for a play parachute.

SDC & WCC: District Cllr Ostrander had attended a quarterly meeting of the Safer Neighbourhood Team which is an opportunity for councillors to raise concerns and improve communication with the police. She urged other councillors to attend if possible.

County Cllr Kettle had attended a meeting with the senior engineer at the Fosse Way crossroads and had been assured that it would be fully open with working lights and streetlights (and no bollards) as **soon as possible**. Delays had been caused by the lighting poles not being wired up to the National Grid. Cllr Kettle had also met with the construction commissioner responsible for overseeing HS2 and had raised concerns about communication with and inconvenience to local communities caused by the work. The commissioner was also concerned and had agreed to raise this with the Member of Parliament.

Cllr Kettle assured the PC that the work to extend the 40pmh speed limit on Bush Heath Road would start "very shortly". The contract has now been outsourced due to a lack of resources at WCC. Cllr Lockley asked if the parish council could be refunded the money it had paid for this due to the continual delays and poor level of service! Cllr Kettle did not think this was likely.

Planning: the following planning applications were considered in the meeting – the council also has the power to return planning responses under delegated powers (outside of the meeting).

Stapenhall Farm, Orchard Cottage, Deppers Bridge – Proposed detached garage: No representation.

Land North of Hall Lane – outline application for self-build dwelling: it was noted that this house would be built outside the settlement boundary and also does not meet the criteria for self-build as the application is from a developer not the eventual owner of the house. For this reason, the council resolved to object to the application.

The Homestead, Crown Street – rebuild damaged section of stone boundary wall: no representation.

13 Manor Road – ground floor extension and first floor extension above existing ground floor – no representation.

Montgomery House, Mill Lane – T1 Monterey Cypress – fell. The PC had previously made a holding objection to this application under delegated powers. However, a report from the Tree Preservation Officer, stated that it does not meet the criteria for a Tree Preservation Order and is unstable. Reluctantly, members acknowledged that it was probably unsustainable and changed their official response to no representation with the proviso that new planting is put in as mitigation.

31 Deppers Bridge – single storey rear extension: no representation.

Future Energy Project: It was noted that the new hedge had been planted next to the car park extension but this will take time to grow and reach maturity; it was agreed to monitor its condition. The final invoice to the PC for the project was agreed and the council formally gave Warwickshire County Council permission to proceed with the remainder of the project: installing the charging points and battery.

Properties

Skatepark Refurbishment: it was agreed to take this off the agenda for the time being as, following Cllr Dominick's resignation, there is no one at present who can take it forward.

Car Park Signage: The request for signs stating that the car park is in a residential area was considered. Cllrs were unconvinced how effective such a sign would be. However, it was agreed to contact the village hall about the possibility of having a sign stating that CCTV is in operation and also to contact the sports clubs with a request to remind people to be considerate when picking up their children.

Allotments: Cllr Balch reported that the well-being project now has a greenhouse, a shed and a donated mower and tools. Warwickshire CC (who own the land at Pineham Farm) had sent the PC a rent increase notice which would take the annual rent from £650pa to £950pa. The clerk had informed them, however, that they had not given the required 12 months' notice of the increase so could not enforce it this year. It will need to be budgeted for next year and will have an impact on allotment rents. The survey of the stone wall at the front of the Hall Lane allotments had highlighted that some remedial work was necessary although as Cllr Lockley pointed out, it was "unlikely to fall down". The council needs to find a builder with experience of historic brickwork to provide a quote for this.

Environment

Replacement of Stiles at Bridge End Farm: The work has not yet been carried out and the village contractor will fit it in when he is able to.

Climate Change: It was agreed to pause the work of the working party allowing time for new councillors to be recruited who could share the workload.

Finance & General Purposes: The budget report and bank reconciliation had been circulated to council members. It was agreed the risk register would be updated and ready for members to approve at the June meeting.

The next meeting of the parish council will be on **27th June**, **7.30pm in the Village Hall**.

History tour of Leamington Spa

On Friday 24th May, 12 Harbury Society members enjoyed a tour of the old part of Leamington Spa. The guide was Paula Fletcher from the Leamington History Group, who began by giving a brief history of Leamington which began life as Leamington Priors and was a small village until about 1800. Queen Victoria had visited the town as a princess in 1830 and as Queen in 1858. She granted the town a 'Royal' prefix in 1838 and Leamington Priors was then renamed Royal Leamington Spa.

A mineral spring was first recorded in Leamington in 1480 which, apparently, made good bread, cured ailments and preserved meat but it wasn't until the late 18th century that more springs were discovered. Baths were built around some of them to exploit the fact that wars were raging across continental Europe at this time which prevented the upper, wealthier, classes in this country from travelling abroad so their attention turned inward to find another outlet for their leisure time. In 1782, two friends, Benjamin Satchwell and William Abbotts found the second spring in Leamington and the baths opened in 1786. There were eight baths, the charges for which were 2/6d for a hot bath, 1/6d for a child, 3/- for a marble bath and 1/- for a cold bath. This coincided with a 19th century trend for 'taking the waters' and marked the start of a considerable increase of visitors to Leamington.

Having started the tour from the Visitor Centre, which is housed in the Pump Rooms, the first stop was outside All Saints' Church. This is on the site of a Norman church and is one of England's largest parish churches. It has gothic-style architecture and the magnificent

stained glass rose window is a copy of one in Rouen, France. In 1842 the church was rebuilt, overseen by the Rev. John Craig who, according to local tradition, dismissed 11 architects during the church's construction and eventually appointed himself as Clerk of Works. John Craig died in 1877, 25 years before the church was finished, and his funeral is said to have been the largest ever seen in Leamington. Benjamin Satchwell and William Abbotts are both interred in All Saints' Church.

A sculpture, Blue Springs, marking the site where Lord Aylesford built a small stone building over the original well in 1803, is situated to the west of All Saints' Church.

The next stop was in Bath Street to take note of a building called The Parthenon which, in 1821, was called the Royal Assembly Rooms. The upper part consisted of a luxurious ballroom and the lower rooms contained a library and reading room. James Bisset was one of the key figures in the development of Learnington as a spa town. He moved to Learnington in 1811 and wrote a guidebook and verse promoting the new spa resort and its attractions.

The Learnington Spa Mission in George Street was the next stopping point. This was built in 1822 and became a chapel in 1828 and was the first Catholic church in Learnington.

Samuel Lockhart (born 1851) started out, with his brother George, as a bareback rider, clown and acrobat in various famous-named circuses around the UK, France and the USA until George fell from his horse and broke his hip. Sam returned home but got work in Sri Lanka on a tea plantation. There he learnt how to train elephants and, with the money he acquired, he was able to buy elephants and form an elephant act. His work took him all over the world including Learnington Spa which has several areas named after his most famous group of elephants, 'The Three Graces'. Elephant Walk is a sloping walkway to the river Learn where, it's rumoured, the elephants regularly bathed but there is no evidence of this at all.

William de Normanville was born in 1843 and travelled to Australia in 1860 where he was employed in the Civil Engineers' Department of South Australia as a chief engineer for 5 years. Back in England he was Leamington's Borough Engineer and Surveyor from 1882 until his retirement in 1917. He achieved a very impressive catalogue of imaginative design and of expertise in the use of iron. The combination of the Weir and the Mill Suspension Bridge is considered to be his masterpiece.

The next area to be explored was Jephson Gardens which began as farmland belonging to Edward Willes. The original gardens, laid out in 1834 at the request of the landowner, covered 10 acres and there was free entry to anyone between 7am and 10am. Only paying customers and patrons of the nearby bath house had access after that time. It wasn't long before the gardens were enlarged and in 1836 Willes leased the land to a local consortium for £30 per year.

In 1846 a local committee meeting agreed that the gardens be renamed The Jephson Gardens in honour of Dr Henry Jephson who had helped to promote the healing properties of the spa waters and built houses for the town's poorer residents. In 1849, a Corinthian-style temple was added to the gardens and inside it was placed a large marble statue of the doctor. The gardens, which became nationally known,

were a very popular venue for the wealthy to 'take the air' and 'be seen'. Most of the work in developing the gardens was undertaken by poor labourers who were given employment by another of the town's philanthropists, Dr John Hitchman. A fountain bearing his name was erected in 1869, in recognition of his efforts. In 1875, a grey granite obelisk was erected as a memorial to Edward Willes.

A link the gardens have to WW2 is the Czech Memorial Fountain, unveiled in 1968. This honours those who served in the Czech Free Army, which was based in Leamington, 7 of whom were parachuted into Czechoslovakia with the task of assassinating a leading Nazi general, Reinhard Heydrich. However, by the 1990s the gardens were looking 'tired' and in 1999 a £3m Heritage Lottery grant was awarded to rejuvenate the area.

The Royal Pump Rooms, which are located on The Parade, were opened in 1814 and were so popular that the building soon needed extending. One of the most interesting parts of the development were the pumps and they also included the world's first gravity fed piped hot water system. When the Napoleonic wars came to an end in 1840, the spa industry in the UK went into decline as people once again travelled abroad. As a result, the Pump Rooms closed in 1860 with the prospect of them being demolished and the land sold.

However, a group of local investors got together and, after spending £17k refurbishing the building, the Pump Rooms re-opened in 1863. Sadly, it proved impossible to operate at a profit and it was sold to the local Board of Health in 1868. Since then it has remained in the public sector and in 1997 work began on a major project to reuse it as a cultural complex.

This replaced a smaller hall which had been built in 1830. The foundation stone for the new building was laid by the mayor, Henry Bright, in 1882. Designed by the architect, John Cundall, it incorporates elements of both the Tudor style and the French baroque style. It was officially opened by the then mayor, Sidney Flavel, in 1884.

Many other facts and figures, too numerous to mention here, were brought to the group's attention during the tour. At the end, Paula was thanked for such an interesting and informative walkabout – and it didn't rain!

Harbury Twinning (for all Francophiles) - New members welcome

Harbury is twinned with Samois-sur-Seine a lovely town/village about 60km south of Paris, close to Fontainebleau; in fact the residents boast of Samois having its head in the forest and its feet in the Seine. It is certainly a wonderful place to visit, with plenty to see in the area, and the people are incredibly welcoming. The Jazz musician Django Reinhardt lived there until his death, and the village is now famous for its annual Jazz Festival (all types of jazz – gypsy, blues, big band – you name it) which is held the last weekend in June at Fontainebleau. Musicians and fans congregate there from all over the world – a superb atmosphere.

The Twinning Association was formed in 1997 and in November of that year a small group (eight people) paid their first visit to Harbury – a great success. This was followed by the official inaugural ceremonies in Samois in March 1998, and in Harbury in October 1998. Since then a coach full of twinners has crossed the Channel in one direction or the other almost every year since and during that time firm friendships have been made, and lots of individual visits taken among the twin families.

The twinning visits usually take place in April/ May (one year French come here and the next year the English go there) covering one of the Bank Holiday weekends but sadly the number of people wanting to make the journey is dwindling on both sides – age plays a big factor in this unfortunately. However we hope to continue visits with smaller numbers.

We also try to arrange various social functions during the year such as film evenings (in French with sub-titles), trips to vineyards, Christmas parties, quizzes etc as well as regularly celebrating the Fête des Rois (Twelfth Night) in January, and Bastille Day (14th July), pétanque afternoons, skittles and so on. There is no doubt that the carnival at the start of June was a great success. The playing field was packed with people of all ages enjoying the entertainment, refreshments and the sunny weather.

I have written about the history of the carnival before; it is a popular annual event. In 1972, the then chairman of the Playing Fields Committee, John Smith, and his team were raising funds to extend the facilities on the extensive playing fields vested in the Parish Council and situated at the rear of the Village Hall.

Fetes and fairs have also been held in Sutcliffe Pastures (now Sutcliffe Drive etc), and on the land just past the Police House on South Parade. Going back even further the vicar would hold garden parties on the land at the rear of the vicarage in Church Street. He even invited the navvies (the men who dug the railway cutting), to one party, providing that they did not bring or drink any alcohol when attending the event.

We can all enjoy the facilities surrounding the village hall and as a community we are very fortunate to have football pitches, floodlit tennis courts, a netball court, a children's playground, skateboard / BMX track, also to maintain our fitness, exercise machines and a tarmac path that surrounds the perimeter of the field which can be used at all times of the year. The most recent external addition is the newly extended car park.

I wouldn't attempt to list the variety of activities the Recreation Ground / Playing Field is used for during the year but big village events such as the carnival and bonfire party are certainly popular annual attractions that take place on the land.

The land on which the playing fields and village hall is situated in South Parade was purchased in 1936 from the 'vendor' Mary Meddoms Griffin of Napton by the Parish Council of Harbury for the sum of £450. In the heritage collection we have a copy of the deeds (HM - 1576), detailing the formal conditions of sale. The land was part of the estate of Thomas William Griffin, who died in 1922. His widow Mary and Mr Stuart Page, a farmer from Easenhall were Thomas's trustees. The two 'closes' of freehold land known as 'Linnels Close' amounted to about 10 acres. The land at one time had been owned by local nobleman John Flecknoe and later Richard Paine before presumably being purchased and used for farming.

The land was considered as 'desirious of providing a Recreation Ground for the said parish' and had the approval of both the parish council and the Warwickshire County Council. The deed is signed by the two trustees; Edward Mole and John Parker and signed on behalf of the parish council in the presence of Mr W Beven who was the Clerk of the P. C. at the time.

In more recent times events such as 'The Heart of Harbury Games' 2011 and 2012 and a demonstration by the civil war enactment group 'The Sealed Knot' have made good use of the area of open space in the centre of the village. It would be fair to say that it is used every day of the year by individuals and groups. It is certainly very popular with dog owners!



As we know the Village Hall was built on the land later in 1962, again after a significant amount of fund raising by the local community.

Other News from the Heritage Centre

On carnival day we shared a stall with the Harbury Society and our theme was the 80th Anniversary of D-Day. Thanks to all those who had a go on our games.

The next day (Sunday 9th), we gave the Lighthorne History Group a tour of the village and followed up by providing a cream tea back at the Centre.

Look out for more visitors learning about the history of Harbury on Saturday 20th July when we have a visit from the Warwickshire Local History Society.

We will be open the following day to the general public, Sunday 21st from 2 to 4pm.

Do pay us a visit we have lots of interesting things to look at and a new display 'Harbury's Lost Cottages'.

GARDEN JOTTINGS

The results of the endlessly wet winter are that some plants have been saturated for too long and are now dying including some roses, a viburnum and a ceanothus. Inevitably, these were ideal conditions for slugs to breed and everyone is now plagued with them. They are destroying many plants which I'd normally say are bomb proof. Asters are dwindling, lupins are shredded, even some clematis have been eaten down to the ground. I've



tried beer traps which were more or less ignored, bought some eco friendly slug pellets with slightly better results and most effective is the bucket of soapy water into which I put any slugs or snails I find lurking under pots. There are also plenty of toads, frogs and birds which I hope are doing their bit to reduce the problem. I wonder what your best remedy is?

There are other things to do if you have any time left after hunting these pests.

Pick peas and beans before they get too big, pick sweet peas to help get more flowers rather than letting them set seed, take cuttings of shrubs such as mock orange and physocarpus, dead-head roses or cut flowering stems to take into the house to encourage more flowers, early potatoes can be harvested, bearded iris can be split up and the old rhizomes discarded. Arrange for a friend or neighbour to water your plants while you are on holiday.



NATURE NOTES

Disused industrial sites are often surprisingly rich in wildlife, and there are a number locally that are worth a visit. We have been to the Bishop's Hill nature reserve, just north of Bishop's Itchington, on a number of occasions this year. Up until 1970, it was part of the Harbury cement works. The hill itself is not a natural feature, since it was formed from the waste limestone products from the nearby works that had accumulated since the quarry was



opened in 1852. At the time it was in operation an aerial ropeway transported the waste material from the quarry into the mound we find today. The remains of the metal winding gear are still at the top of the hill; a monument to its industrial past, and there is a great view across the surrounding countryside towards Northamptonshire and Leicestershire.

The soil covering the waste material forming the mound is low in nutrients and supports a range of lime-loving plants. When we visited

earlier in the spring there were many Cowslips growing on the reserve. A very familiar spring flower, Cowslips thrive on dry, lime-rich soils and flower between April and May. Their flowers provide an early source of nectar for various insects including bees, beetles and butterflies such as the Brimstone. Cowslips were once common in traditional hay meadows, ancient

woodlands and hedgerows but the loss of these habitats between 1930 and 1980 caused a serious decline. Fortunately there are signs of recovery and Cowslips have begun to return to unsprayed verges as well as colonising the banks of new roads; the embankments along the side of the M40 now hold large expanses of these plants, visible as bright yellow swathes in the spring. (Though if you're driving that way in the coming weeks, the banks are now overtaken by drifts of snowy white Oxeye Daisies.)

On our most recent visit to the Bishop's Hill

reserve we noticed another yellow-flowered plant dominating various areas. This was the Kidney Vetch, a member of the pea family, another plant of lime-rich soils. Kidney Vetch has round clusters of small flowers that are mainly yellow, but can also be orange and red. Below the individual flowers there are many small hairs, which together give the flower clusters

a woolly appearance, and its leaves are divided into narrow leaflets that are silky and white underneath. Its flowers could be mistaken for Bird's-foot Trefoil, another member of the pea family, and both are attractive as nectar sources for adult butterflies.

Kidney Vetch is an important flower on the reserve because, as well as providing nectar, it is the sole foodplant of the caterpillars of the Small Blue butterfly. This is our smallest resident butterfly and easily overlooked because of its size and lack of strong blue colouration. These butterflies tend to live in small colonies throughout Britain and Ireland but are rare and localised. The species has declined by over 40% since the 1970s in most areas, so we are







fortunate to have these colonies near to us; one of only a handful of sites in Warwickshire where this scarce butterfly can be found.

The male Small Blue has a dusting of blue near to the body, otherwise it is a dusky grey-brown butterfly with pale, silver-grey under wings carrying small black dots. The female is similar, but without the blue markings on the upper wings. Adults fly from May to August when the males set up territories in sheltered places and the females lay their eggs singly, tucked into the partially open flower heads of Kidney Vetch. The emerging caterpillars feed on the developing anthers and then the seeds of the flower heads. Only one larva can mature on a single flower head so females do not normally lay in flowers where an egg is already present. When the caterpillars are fully grown they descend to the ground and spend the winter in soil crevices or under moss until they pupate in the spring.

Kidney Vetch and other lime-loving plants on the reserve face a constant challenge from more aggressive plant species, and so the site needs to be managed in order to keep the diverse range of flowers, such as the Bee Orchids and Common Spotted Orchids that we can see there. It is also necessary to occasionally remove the scrub plants, such as hawthorns, which would otherwise take over the area. Warwickshire Wildlife Trust manage the main part of the reserve and there is also a small adjacent area, The Yellow Land, which is a community nature reserve, supported by the Bishops Itchington Parish Council. Both reserves are open all year and there is access off Ladbroke Road in the village or at the car park in the Bishop's Hill housing estate. It is a great place for a walk and a picnic but please keep your dog under control, particularly when ground-nesting birds, like the chiffchaff and willow warbler, are breeding. We heard many of those warblers singing among the

bushes and woodland on the lower slopes when we last visited.

Finally, a tale of a titanic struggle. Sue and David Turner told us that while watching a toad by their garden pond a large grass snake appeared and grabbed their friendly toad. David bravely wrestled with the (non-venomous) snake and removed the toad from its jaws. The snake, no doubt rather shocked and embarrassed, slithered off through the undergrowth. We are still waiting for news of the toad, but hopefully it survived.

HARBURY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Election

The administration formally handed over to the majority Liberal Democrats in an Annual Council meeting on 24th May 2023. Some of you may be interested in how the Council is run. Employed staff operate the day-to-day services of the Council, whereas strategic direction and policy are set by the elected Councillors. In many ways it is like national government where there is a Leader (Prime Minister) and Cabinet. In the case of Stratford District, the Cabinet now has a Leader and six other members drawn from the majority Liberal Democrat group. At the formal handover from the Conservatives, Dr Susan Juned was appointed Leader of the Council. Nigel Rock, previously District Councillor for some of this ward, has been appointed Deputy Leader. Funding for Community Projects

Up until the 14th July Stratford District Council is inviting project submissions to be considered for two alternative funding streams. These are, firstly, the Shared Prosperity Fund (SPF)/Rural Shared Prosperity Fund and, secondly, the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Fund. The themes for the SPF include projects for Community and Places and Support for Local Business. CIL income is generated from a levy on new development such as housing. Applications are expected from statutory infrastructure providers and not-for-profit organisations such as state schools, community groups, parish councils and registered charities for projects that demonstrate a wider community benefit. Projects must relate to infrastructure and meet six other mandatory criteria.

HS2 News

We have been notified of a road closure for ecology surveys to be carried out. The B4452 (the road from Bascote crossroad to Harbury) on 3rd and 4th July 9.30 - 3.30.

In some positive news relating to HS2, it has been reported that HS2 has moved over 10 million tonnes of materials over two years, far exceeding its targets to reduce freight from our roads. This represents a very significant cut to carbon emissions which is welcome news.

Chesterton Windmill Update

The sails were removed in November 2021 as they developed a large crack in two of the sails and one stock. This work needed to be done quickly to avoid the risk of one of the sails falling off and hurting someone. As the structure is a Scheduled Ancient Monument, Historic England have been consulted regarding permissions for the replacement of the sails. This process has taken some time as consideration must be given to both the historic perspective, with a number of different sail designs in use, as well as maintenance and safety. Shortly, Heritage & Culture Warwickshire will submit their preferred design to Heritage England for consideration, which will then take a few months to approve. Once this is agreed they can begin sourcing the wood to undertake the building of the sails. This may take up to 1-2 years as wood was previously sourced from Russia (now not possible!) and there is a shortage of the type of wood required. The wood will also then require seasoning. Unfortunately, the result of this is that it may take up to 2 years to see the sails back on the Windmill.

I have had some queries regarding the type of wood and sourcing it which I am currently following up. I am disappointed to be reporting this delay.

Contacting your Councillor

I will be attending as many Parish Council meetings as possible; there are four in this ward. Unfortunately, some in July fall during a time when I am on a holiday (8th July - 22nd July) that was booked before I decided to run for District Council. This will affect Ladbroke and Harbury PC meetings.

PALACE GARDEN PARTY



HARBURY SWIFT VILLAGE - UPDATE -

July marks a significant period for swifts, as it is not only the height of their breeding season but also a time when they start to prepare for their impending migration back to Africa. On warm summer days, the skies can come alive with their acrobatic displays, and screaming calls, creating a spectacle that is both mesmerizing and a vital part of our

natural heritage. Swifts are not just birds; they are marvels of the avian world, spending most of their lives on the wing, reaching up to 69mph in level flight, mastering the air currents with their scythe-like wings. In just a year, a swift can fly up to 200,000 miles - that's nearly as far as flying to the moon! These are just some of the amazing facts about our 'Super Swifts'

that the young members of Harbury School's Green Team learned about last month before making their own life-size swifts and forming a screaming party of swifts around the school grounds!

The return of swifts is a herald of the summer season and a cue for all of us to look up and admire their high-speed aerial antics. However, as readers of these articles will know, the swift's presence in the UK is under threat. To combat this, the RSPB Wildlife Charity organizes Swift Awareness Week, which in 2024 runs from Saturday 29 June to Sunday 7 July. This event is a clarion call for swift enthusiasts to engage in activities such as walks, talks, and events aimed at raising awareness and enjoying the company of these extraordinary birds.

As July progresses, the presence of swifts becomes even more pronounced. Their fledglings need to reach the minimum weight for migration, 40g, about the same as a creme egg. Then they can take to the skies, joining the adults in preparation for their journey back to Africa. This period is a critical window for all swifts, as they must build up their strength for the long migration ahead. The swifts' departure from the UK typically occurs between late July and early September, marking the end of their brief but vibrant presence in the UK's summer skies.

The plight of the swifts is a reminder of our shared responsibility to protect our wildlife and as I mentioned last month, you don't need to be an expert to help these aerial superstars. Providing suitable nesting sites and ensuring a healthy insect population are steps we can all take to ensure that the swifts continue to dance in our summer skies for generations to come.

As July unfolds, let's not forget these incredible birds, who, after their brief sojourn with us, will once again embark on their long journey back to Africa, leaving behind a sky a little less vibrant by their absence. It is our collective effort that can ensure their return year after year. Let us be swift in our actions to ensure that these magnificent birds grace our summers for generations to come.
