

You may have been inside our church many times before and already know about Ladbroke's connections with the Jurassic Coast, the Normans and the Gunpowder Plot but come that weekend and find out how we are linked to the Atlantic Ocean, an explorer, St Pancras Station, a Derbyshire coal mine and the Royal Shakespeare Company at Stratford.

We'll leave the displays up until the 15th, so you can you drop in the following week any time when the church is open (10am - 4pm daily), if you are busy 6-8th September. Perhaps you will be away visiting other places you have seen on www.heritageopendays.org.uk, there are literally thousands, all FREE.

Last month's theme "Home grown and home made" was very popular with photos and treasures brought for us to admire. There were pictures of paintings and of a flower-filled garden, embroidery done at school and a book holder that had started as a very long piece of wood but was much diminished in size by the time the teacher approved the joints.









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
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We also saw a jumper knitted decades ago; it was in pristine condition as the recipient had hardly worn it. Don brought a collection of ironwork he'd made ranging from a griddle for cooking drop scones to various tools including a paperknife with an intricate ram's head. His collection was accompanied by a file of drawings and hand written instructions for each item - apparently the sequencing is critical so that one step does not damage another.

I also discovered from the designs in the file, that he had fabricated the wrought iron stands at church made for floral displays and used to hold the donation plate at weddings etc.

We meet again on Wednesday 4th September at the Old School between 10.30am and noon for a cuppa, cake and chat. Our theme that day will be "Clothes, hats and hairstyles". I'm looking forward to hearing about the fashions people have lived through, seeing lots of photos and perhaps some originals that have been lurking at the back of wardrobes! #### Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council – 25th July 2024

**Co-option of Councillor**: Members resolved to co-opt Robert Stockdale onto the council from the September meeting following completion of the necessary paperwork. Robert has a background in HR and a particular interest in traffic issues around the village.

**Reports from Outside Bodies**: Harbury Primary School: Governors and staff have recently been very pleased by the excellent SATS results received by pupils at the school.

**Planning**: There were no planning applications to discuss in the meeting, however the council had made the following responses outside of the meeting under delegated powers:

Sharmer Farm Cottage, Fosse Way: Proposed demolition of existing buildings and construction of office/light industrial buildings, road improvements, parking associated infrastructure and landscaping – no representation.

Hurdiss Cottage, Bush Heath Road: extension to the north east at first floor level and a rear single storey extension and replacement porch – no representation.

**Future Energy Project**: There was nothing to report at present on the creation of a path through the Grasscrete surface on the new section of car park.

#### **Properties**

**Perimeter Path:** Cllrs Lockley and Mulley had spent some time trying to clear the overgrown parts of the path but had concluded that, unfortunately, it is beyond their ability and a man with a machine is needed. A quotation for such a man had been received of £300 per day – it is estimated that it will be roughly two day's work. The quote was agreed.

**Pineham Farm Allotments**: Cllrs reconsidered the proposed rent increase for the allotments but decided, on balance, that the decision to increase the rent to £50 per full plot and £25 per half plot should stand as per last month's meeting. It was noted that there had been some vandalism at the allotments with sheds broken into and tools stolen. It was also agreed that Cllrs Balch and Mulley will judge the allotments for the village show this year.

**Hall Lane Allotments**: One quotation has been received for the repair to the wall but it was noted that another two quotes need to be sought before a decision can be made. The council has now identified 26 plots of varying sizes, quite a few of which are vacant. It was agreed that a decision on an appropriate level of rent should be deferred until the spring to allow the council to carry out necessary work to bring the site up to standard.

#### **Environment**

**Hedgehog Highway**: It was noted that the school already has lots of the signs for the highway and does not need the PC to buy any more. The clerk will liaise with the school on what they do need to get the project up and running.

**Tree Planting**: Cllr Potter has reviewed the tree planting plan that the PC commissioned a while ago. He reported that potentially three trees could be planted on the Pound, four on Middle Road and up to nine at Temple End. He has created a task card for each site and will forward this to WCC for approval particularly for those trees which border the highway. The budget for this project will come from monies received from the Eastfield Solar Farm.

**Climate Change**: Cllr Gard reported that the working party has been looking at replacing all the remaining old-style lights in the streetlights with LEDs. Although this would be expensive it is hoped that grant funding may cover some of it. The group is also hoping to run the eco-fair again at the carnival next year.

**Finance**: Cllrs approved the budget and the bank reconciliation. A quote of £650 for a new laptop for the clerk was also approved.

**Appointment of new Cllrs to Working Parties**: It was agreed that the two new cllrs should join the following working parties;

Cllr Chris Bradley – Properties, Environment and Climate

Cllr Robert Stockdale – Environment, Staffing and Climate

**Great Western Public House**: The council agreed to submit the application on behalf of the Friends of the Great Western to make the building an Asset of Community Value. There is no charge to submit the application.

The next meeting of the parish council will be held on Thursday 26th September at 7.30pm in Harbury Village Hall.

#### **Tour of Avon Dassett**

Sixteen Harbury Society members met with Dr. Sarah Richardson, a local historian, on a perfect summer's afternoon at Avon Dassett on Wednesday 17th July for a walking tour of the village. It started at St. John the Baptist Church where Sarah gave a potted history of Avon Dassett saying it had been one of the wealthier parishes of England since Norman times which is when the original Anglican church was built. The wealth came from farming and the sheep/wool trade in particular. In the 19th century, several important families came to settle in the village. The population has stayed more or less the same over time – 200-250 people. It rose in the 19th century to 350 but now stands at 211.

The original church of St. John the Baptist was Norman with a modest square tower but, following the arrival of the Catholic Knight family into the village, a new Catholic church, St. Joseph's, was erected in 1854.

A tall octagonal spire was added to St. John's in 1868 making it visible for miles around. The interior of St. John's largely dates from the Victorian period but one survivor from the


medieval church is an effigy of a deacon, thought to be Hugh, Rector of the church, who died in about 1240. The church was declared redundant in 1983 and is currently managed by The Churches Conservation Trust. A major restoration of the spire, costing £750k, took place in 2007-8 but now the bell tower needs restoring.

After passing the Old Rectory, one of the oldest houses in the village, with the front dating from the 17th century but having an older north wing dating from the 13th century, we arrived at Bitham Hall. This was built around 1850 by Joseph Knight. The Hall has gardens on 7 levels and contains exotic plants and trees which Knight, who had been a nurseryman in Lancashire, had had planted and which also contains a glasshouse which had been designed by Joseph Paxton, the head gardener at Chatsworth and the architect of the Crystal Palace. After Knight's death, the estate was inherited by Thomas Perry who had married Joseph Knight's niece, Helen. He was a leading member of the Warwickshire gentry, a

magistrate and Lord Lieutenant of the county. Bitham Hall was converted into flats in the 1980s.

Having walked down the driveway of Bitham Hall, the next stop was at St. Joseph's Catholic church. It has 16 stained glass windows which were designed by the John Hardman firm in Birmingham. This church has also been redundant since 1983. Next door to the church is the Presbytery which was built around the same time as St. Joseph's. At one time this was a school and later a convent and orphanage which was run by the Sisters of Charity of St. Paul from 1876-1910.

Across the road from the Presbytery stands The Yew Tree public house. This was formerly known for many years as the Red Lion changing its name in the 1970s when it became The Avon. In the 1990s it was called the Prince Rupert but soon reverted back to The Avon. It became a community-owned asset in 2017 and the name was changed again, this time to The Yew Tree.

Before heading to the Reading Room for tea and cake, the Society members were taken along a private drive to, what can only be described as, a magnificent surprise which is that of Avon Carrow. The land was bought from Thomas Perry in 1895 by Cecil Boyle who had the house built as a hunting lodge in the style of an Oxford University quadrangle but which, subsequently, became the family home. After the death of Boyle in a battle with a force of Boer sympathisers in South Africa in 1900, the family continued to live at Avon Carrow until selling it to Baron Albert Profumo in 1926. Profumo's eldest son, John, became the youngest Member of Parliament in 1940. The property is now made up of 16 apartments numbered according to the order in which they were sold!

Having had a very enjoyable outing, tea and a delicious selection of cakes were served in the Reading Room. The room had been conveyed by Thomas Perry as a gift to the Parish Council in 1898 for the benefit of the parish (men only!) and the following rules had to be observed:

To be opened every evening except Sundays

To be under the control of one of the committee

*No books or papers to be taken from the room* 

No discussion on religion or politics

No swearing, obscene or other bad language

No smoking

Games to be permitted at the discretion of the committee

Everyone agreed that it had been amazing to learn as to how many grand buildings were to be found in such a small area.

#### HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

The windmill is an iconic building in our village and thanks to its benevolent owner, Jeremy Atkins, who commissioned and oversaw its renovation recently, it will be there for a long time to come. The change for the windmill to a residential dwelling took place in 1988. At that time, it had been used as a light engineering factory together with the adjacent building (once the granary).

The granary unit was replaced with a brick built, three bedroomed cottage adjoining the windmill. At present 'Granary Cottage' is being modernized. Until recently it was the home of much loved Harbury resident Mary Shelley, a retired school teacher who moved there from 'Mill House' on the other side of the windmill. Mary, husband Ron and their two sons Matthew and Toby moved into Mill House in the 1960s. It was believed to be haunted and the ghost could well have been George Verney, the miller who was tragically killed in an accident at the mill in 1893.

Matthew, who now lives in Scotland, was in touch recently and he mentioned that he had a 'wonderful little booklet' which he believes belongs in the Heritage Collection. The booklet, consisting of 16 pages, was written by William Verney, the father of the ill-fated George. In

the 1891 census, William is aged 67 and his occupation is listed as 'Farmer/Miller'. The booklet is titled simply, 'The Jubilee Book' the cover of which is shown opposite. Matthew believes that he bought the booklet in an antique shop in the 1980s.

William Verney, aged 73 in 1897, when the booklet was published, offers an 'Extension of Knowledge' in machinery, and almost every art and science that has taken place during the reign of Victoria. He challenges the work of Sir Isaac Newton, talks about the solar system and the signs of the zodiac, linking them to the Bible, of which he quotes several passages. He even remarks on the 'great earthquake shock' which occurred on the morning of the 17th December 1896.

He concludes as follows, 'Trusting I have said enough to make my view clearly understood by most of my readers, and I hope they will be more interested than alarmed at the wonderous works of nature'.

The cost of the booklet was one shilling, a considerable sum in the late Victorian era. Interestingly, there is mention of a 'Jubilee Book' in a newspaper article reporting on the Golden Jubilee in 1887, but no mention of this one presumably written around the time of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee some ten years later.

Matthew describes William Verney as 'a man of immense intellectual curiosity and wide reading'. We are extremely grateful to Matthew for sending us the book to add to the Harbury Heritage Collection.

village' followed by tea and cakes in the Heritage Centre. It was great to have such an enthusiastic group of individuals visit us and find out more about Harbury's history.



#### 'Old and New'

By the time you read this, contractors will have taken over the library building and will be preparing to install our new heating system, having completed the work required in the preschool. The library work will conclude on Friday 20th September. We will re-open on Wednesday 25th.

If you borrowed books just before we shut down, don't worry, your loan period has been extended to 2nd October. Also, if you want to borrow more books during the closure, the County Mobile Library service will be at the Village Hall on the 16th and 23rd September, 10.00am-1.00pm.

The final switch-on of our new heating system will occur a few weeks after we re-open - we need to wait for National Grid to install an upgraded power supply. The old boiler gets a few more weeks before retirement! As do the radiators, for until then we cannot remove the radiators and their associated pipework.

We're looking forward to getting back into the building as I am sure our regular user groups are. Lots of other activities planned: results of the children's story writing challenge with prizes and readings at a Sunday afternoon 'family concert' (watch out for notice of date); we have a 'murder mystery' evening in November; more Sheep Dip Sessions with national and international acoustic musicians; we will be welcoming regular sessions from the NHS Health & Wellbeing coaching service and the National Childbirth Trust which, with our newly established 'carers' group', add to the provision of events in health-related areas. #### **GARDEN JOTTINGS**

Until recently I used Humax\* peat-based multi-purpose compost with added perlite to grow my cuttings and seeds in. This was mostly successful except for a few shrubs which tended to be more difficult.

Viburnum bodnantense 'Dawn' was one of them, I'd be lucky to get 10% rooted cuttings. When this product was withdrawn I started to use John Innes No1 with some perlite (with some trepidation) and am really delighted to tell you that I've had an 80% success rate. This is a winter flowering shrub which attracts bees and is such a good, easy plant for the garden.



\*Humax peat-free seems to be mainly wood fibre, it is lightweight and looks floofy as one customer described it. I suggest people use John Innes No3 mixed with it for any container growing.

Reminders for the month.....plant more bulbs (there is always room for a few more), pick peas, beans, lettuce, carrots and courgettes (select the best and enter into the village produce show and win prizes) and bring houseplants back into the house.

This summer we were fortunate to holiday in the Canadian Maritimes on the Atlantic coast. While we were there we were able to visit several national parks and saw the way they were dealing with some conservation issues facing their wildlife.

Between the Canadian provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick lies the Bay of Fundy. The two land areas act as a funnel that has a significant effect on tides in this bay, with the

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result that it has the highest tidal range of anywhere in the world; a difference of about 16 metres (53 feet) between low and high tide. As the tide recedes it exposes vast areas of mudflats, rich in many aquatic animals, such as Mudshrimps. There can be as many as 40,000 of these tiny shrimps per square metre of mudflat.

The shrimps form the vital food resource for shorebirds, like the small, exquisitely marked Semipalmated Sandpiper. Over two million of these Sandpipers – roughly three



quarters of the world's population – stop in the Fundy region for just a few weeks in July and August to refuel during their annual migration from nesting grounds in the Canadian subarctic to wintering areas in South America. There is considerable research into the Fundy ecosystem because the Mudshrimps are vulnerable to exposure to various toxic materials, such as organic wastes, pesticides and heavy metals that all wash into the marine environment.

The deeper waters of the Bay of Fundy itself have abundant krill, another tiny shrimp-like animal, which form the main food of several whale species. While we were there we saw two species of krill-feeding whales, Minkie and Humpback Whales.

They have specialised structures in their jaws that sieve out the krill from great mouthfuls of water. In the past, the whales of Fundy were endangered species because of over-exploitation. However, their populations are now increasing because of action that various nature conservation agencies have taken. Minkies are no longer on the endangered list, although Humpbacks are still of some concern.

Research and monitoring has shown that more intervention is needed to secure their populations for future generations. Certain areas in the Bay of Fundy are now designated as Marine Protected Areas where human activities are limited to minimise disturbances. Efforts are also being made to reduce pollution, such as controlling plastic waste and chemical runoff. In addition, we saw photographs of whales that had died or were injured after becoming entangled in discarded fishing nets from the commercial fisheries. There are now regulations about the type of fishing gear that can be used and ship speeds are restricted in certain areas to prevent collisions, which are a major cause of whale mortality.

Further north in Nova Scotia we stayed in the Cape Breton Highlands National Park. Here we saw how the complex interplay between various species was causing significant conservation challenges to this area's native pine and spruce forest. In the 1970s, a severe outbreak of the Spruce moth devastated much of the park's boreal forest. The moth's larvae feed on the needles of spruce and fir trees killing a large number of them. This loss of mature trees left an environment conducive to the growth of



young trees and shrubs, which are prime food sources for Moose.

With an abundance of food and no natural predators, the Moose population in the park surged. This overpopulation has led to overgrazing, where Moose feed heavily on young trees and seedlings, hindering forest regeneration. As a result, approximately 12% of the park has changed to grassland and the native forest lost. To address these issues, the Canadian National Park authority has introduced a management plan to



restore the balance in the park's ecosystem, including fenced enclosures to protect young trees from Moose, and prescribed burns to encourage forest regeneration.

In a public garden we saw how local people were contributing to the conservation of the Monarch Butterfly. This spectacular insect breeds in North America and Canada, where its larvae feed on the Milkweed plants. The Monarch is famous for its annual mass autumnal migrations to Florida and Mexico to overwinter in huge numbers. However, since 2000, Monarch butterfly numbers have decreased very dramatically. It is listed as an endangered species in Canada and is legally protected. Urban development and agricultural expansion, as well as the widespread use of herbicides have reduced the availability of Milkweed and other native pectar-rich flowers on which the adults feed.

Climate change has also had an impact: temperature and weather irregularities can disrupt migration routes and affect the growth

of the Milkweed. It was heartening to see the way local community action was involved in these conservation efforts to raise awareness such as campaigns to encourage people to avoid using herbicides and to grow Milkweed in their backyards. There are citizen science projects to help fill knowledge gaps about Milkweed distribution and Monarch breeding. Efforts are also focused on planting Milkweed and other native species that provide nectar for migrating butterflies. In the gardens we saw 'Monarch Waystations' where Milkweed and other nectar sources had been planted – they were full of Monarch Butterflies, which was a spectacular sight.

The plight of butterflies is a concern closer to home as well. July and early August this year saw the Big Butterfly Count in the UK. This citizen science project is organised by the Butterfly Conservation charity. It began in 2010 and involves people throughout the UK and Ireland recording the butterflies they see over a short period of time in a particular area. The results are easily captured on a mobile phone app. With contributions of over 150,000 records, this will form an invaluable set of data about the number and distribution of our butterflies. Several people in Harbury and Ladbroke have contributed to the survey. It will be very interesting to see the final results once the data has been analysed.

#### HARBURY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE

I hope this newsletter finds everyone well and enjoying some early Autumn good weather. Just a few updates from me this month:

#### **UBUS Service**

UBUS is for anyone who is stuck for transport to travel locally on Mondays to Fridays. The service is useful if you cannot access public transport because of mobility problems or other health issues; or live in an isolated location with limited public transport or no bus service at all. UBUS can be used for any prebooked journey between the hours of 10.00am and 7.00pm, except between 2.30pm and 5.00pm on school days. This is a very important service complimenting the great service provided by Harbury e-wheels. Of course not all villages in the local area have a service like e-wheels.

Stratford District Council's Cabinet have agreed that from 1st September, Stratford-on-Avon District Council (SDC) and Warwickshire County Council's (WCC) joint UBUS service will be replaced by a new Demand Responsive Transport Service (DRT) run by WCC.

After a great deal of negotiation, SDC secured extra services over the original proposal from WCC which would have delivered a reduction in services. The Cabinet agreed a further sum of £70k funding for WCC to procure an additional vehicle and retain the late afternoon and evening service between 4.30pm and 7pm across the whole District. The outcome is a service that remains accessible to as many residents across the District as possible.

#### **Home Upgrade Grant (HUG2)**

Although it may still be warm and sunny it is worth considering if you are eligible for this grant that could help you save money and keep warm over winter. The Home Upgrade Grant (HUG2) is for people who don't use mains gas to heat their homes. However, households are still eligible for the scheme if they are connected to mains gas for something other than heating (such as cooking).

The Grant will pay for a range of energy efficiency measures including insulation and heating upgrades.

#### Are you eligible for funding?

You and your home will need to meet all of the following criteria:

- Your home does not have gas central heating
- Your home has an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) of D, E, F or G (If your home does not have an EPC, then it will be arranged free of charge)
- The whole household has a combined annual income under £36,000 (gross)

#### HARBURY SWIFT VILLAGE - UPDATE -

By the time you read this, Harbury's swifts will have probably reached sub-Saharan Africa, specifically in the tropical forests of Central Africa and the Congo. Here they will be enjoying the plentiful insects that come with the rainy season.

I have been asked why the nest boxes that were installed last year by the Parish Council have yet to be used. Swifts can be slow to take up residence in new boxes and the Harbury Swift Village Project has always been one for the long term. Breeding swifts are site faithful, and adults will return to the nest site that they used the previous year, coming back year after year. So it is the juvenile birds that will be looking for new nest sites and this takes time, partly because the young birds aren't mature enough to breed until they are four years old.

Swift call boxes are an effective tool to attract newly mature swifts to breed in the nest boxes. Swift call boxes play recorded swift calls, which mimic the sounds of a colony. The calls are played for a few hours each day, in the early morning and late evening when swifts are most active. By using a timer the calls can be scheduled to play at times thought best to attract swifts and, of equal importance, avoid disturbing the neighbours. The calls do not have to be played at a high volume for swifts to hear them.

The recorded calls can attract swifts flying nearby, as they are social birds and are drawn to places where they hear other swifts. When prospecting swifts hear these calls, they are more likely to investigate the area. This increases the chances of them discovering and using the nest boxes provided. Once swifts are attracted to the area and find the nest boxes, they may start using them for roosting and eventually breeding. Since swifts tend to return to the same nesting sites year after year, once they start using a nest box, they are likely to come back in subsequent years.

So setting up a swift call box could be a rewarding way to attract swifts to our Harbury nest boxes. In order to increase the chances of these endangered birds nesting in the wonderful Parish Council Swift nest boxes installed around the village, I am aiming to raise funds to purchase up to six Swift Call Sound systems. I hope to have raised sufficient funds to have these installed in key locations around the village before the birds return to breed next year.

The brand that I have been recommended by the Swift Local Network, (a group of knowledgeable swift enthusiasts and experts) is supplied by Peak Boxes and costs £47.50 per call box. Each unit is supplied with a waterproof speaker, 10 metres of cable, a USB stick with one pre-recorded swift call and a power cable. For six units, I will need to raise around £300 in total to cover delivery costs as well as the call systems themselves.


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
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












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
